Henry C. Rizzo, Chairman, called the meeting of the Jackson County Legislature to order.

#### 1 ROLL CALL

#### 3 APPROVAL OF THE JOURNAL OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

Bob Spence moved to approve the journal of the previous meeting held on 6/12/2006. Seconded by Eugene Standifer Jr..

The motion passed by a voice vote.

#### 4 HEARINGS

Henry C. Rizzo, Chairman, welcomed Woody Cozad and Fred Dreiling, lobbyists for Jackson County.

Fred Dreiling said they were successful in the retention of dollars for Bartle Hall and the stadiums. The other items in the budget remained flat which they considered a victory. He said medicaid continues to be a main driver of the budget, despite the cuts. Any extra income went to medicaid and higher education. He said it was a victory to hold the line on most budget items.

Woody Cozad said higher education received a 2% increase, which was better than the year prior. He said next year they need to take the \$3 million set aside for the stadiums and extend the commitment to match the term of the new leases. Currently, it is matched to the term of the old leases. Also, next year they will work to increase the per diem for prisoner because it is well below its all time high. Finally, next year they will work on the Jackson County Community Mental Health Fund which was cut.

Fred Dreiling said with regards to the prisoner per diem they were successful in increasing the amount for the line item which has been under funded for several years. He said they lessened supplemental appropriation which will allow the county to receive their money faster. One of the priorities for Jackson County is E-government. He said they worked with the County Executive and the Recorder of Deeds and now Jackson County is a model for redaction of information on recorded documents. He thanked Bob Kelley, Recorder of Deeds and Katheryn Shields, County Executive, for their work on this legislation. Senate Bill 932 was passed to accomplish this task and was sponsored by Senator Scott. House Bill 1707 also was a portion of the bill. He said now people can look up deeds on the Internet and their personal information is not available to the public. Another major success was the Kansas and Missouri Regional Investment District Compact. This bill authorizes the local political subdivisions to create a regional transit district. He said hopefully through Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) and other organizations this will come to fruition.

Woody Cozad said Kansas has not passed a similar statute but we are hopeful that it will pass. Jackson County was also successful in passing the tax for the Truman Sports Complex. The legislation passed in Jefferson City to prevent the proceeds of the tax from getting Tax Increment Financed for other purposes in the future. The stream of revenue is protected for the purpose of which the voters passed it.

Fred Dreiling said this is an election year and there are currently 23 Republican Senators and 11 Democrats. He thinks the Democrat number will inch forward after the election.

Henry C. Rizzo asked about legislation that would allow Jackson County to have a 911 surcharge on cell phones. He said it is a priority for the county.

Fred Dreiling said phone lobbying is powerful in Jefferson City. He said this year legislation will be introduced regarding 911 surcharge on cell phones.

Dan Tarwater, County Legislator, said the lobbyists did a good job and he appreciates the work they did regarding the stadiums.

Terry Warner, employee in the Finance Department, received a 25 year service pin.

Joe Gray, employee in the Facilities Management Department, received a 15 year service pin.

#### 5 COMMUNICATIONS AND REPORTS OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE

Katheryn Shields, County Executive, said the Parks Department produced their second series of commercials last week on Jackson County parks, the beaches, marinas, golf course, etc. She said last year was the first year and two commercials were done in early June. She reported that revenues last year in the parks increased over \$300,000.00. It was the largest increase over the past 12 years. Initially we were spending \$70,000.00 per year for the insertions in the newspaper that were sent out twice a year with a list of the county park programs. The county spent an additional \$5,000.00 last year on commercials and increased revenue. So it has been a successful program. The new commercials will begin around July 1st and will focus on the summer and fall activities in the parks. She thanked the Legislature for their support for the commercials. She thinks the commercials have been hugely successful not only in terms of money but in terms of a number of people participating in our parks.

Dan Tarwater, County Legislator, complimented Katheryn on the brochure in the Kansas City Star with park information because it was very helpful. Katheryn Shields said Saturday, June 24, 2006 is Lake Fest at Lake Jacomo. There will be live music, boat rides, fireworks, contests, prizes, food and drinks.

Katheryn Shields and Henry Rizzo participated in the Children Against Violence Art Contest. Reggie Gant, a 5th grader in the Kansas City School District, won first place. She said over 100 children participated and McDonalds on the Plaza generously provided food and drink for the occasion.

Katheryn said the Indirect Cost Allocation Plan that Troy Thomas, Chief Financial Officer, has been working on with Maximus, the auditing firm, has been completed and will be submitted to the State of Missouri. The county will receive the appropriation of funds in October at which time we will bill the State of Missouri for costs dating back to January 1, 2005, plus the amounts through September 30, 2006. For 2005, Jackson County should collect indirect costs in the amount of \$260,000.00 from the Prosecutor's Family Child Support Program and \$62,000.00 from the General Fund from the Courts. The money can go back in the General Fund and be used next year for funding. She said Maximus will be present next week to answer any questions and give a direct report.

Dan Tarwater said \$24,000.00 for this study was a good expenditure of taxpayers dollars. Katheryn said it was quite beneficial.

Katheryn Shields said Jackson County is now live on e-recording. Banks or title companies can now record deeds electronically. It is a savings of time to the institutions, individuals as well as Jackson County staff.

Henry C. Rizzo said he knows someone who recorded their deed on Monday and it was posted on the Internet by Thursday. He was very impressed.

Katheryn said only two percent of the counties in the nation have electronic filing. Jackson County is a leader in this program. Katheryn thanked the County Legislature for their financial support in the annual budget for this project.

Resolutions #15905 and #15906 were adopted at this time. See page 6 for details.

Ordinance #3779 was discussed at this time.

Scott Burnett, County Legislator, moved to amend Ordinance #3779 to identify the funding source as the Back Tax Fund within the Prosecuting Attorney's budget, so it will not have any impact on the General Fund. Seconded by Eugene Standifer, Jr.

Katheryn Shields said she was not opposed to the raises for the Prosecutor's Office as long as they did not come out of the General Fund. The money in the Back Tax Fund is the Prosecutor's money to spend as he wishes. The Back Tax Fund balance is between \$350,000.00 - \$400,000.00 which would be enough to pay for the raises. She said she was perplexed that the Prosecuting Attorney was not present to advocate these raises for his employees.

Dan Tarwater said these raises were part of the Memorandums of Understanding that were passed last year. The County Legislature is just trying to satisfy the agreements.

Katheryn Shields said with regards to the Back Tax Fund, that the State of Missouri has arrangements with most Prosecuting Attorney's offices to collect back taxes on income tax. Under State law, the fee from collecting back taxes are sent to a fund held by Jackson County but the Prosecuting Attorney is responsible for disbursing the funds. It is not taxpayer dollars, it is made up of fees collected and specifically set aside by state law to be spent at the discretion of the Prosecuting Attorney. Scott Burnett asked the county counselor to assist with the language for the amendment.

Jay Haden, Deputy County Counselor, said the money is in the Prosecutor's control. The Prosecuting Attorney will send an Employee Change Authorization (ECA) indicating that the raises should be given from a specific fund. The purpose is authorized for this fund and the money is not subject to appropriation by the County Legislature. The ordinance would not have any legal effect but could suggest what the Prosecuting Attorney should do with the money.

Bob Stringfield, County Legislator, said he is for giving this to them. He said he will need something in writing or he will abstain from voting on Ordinance #3779, unless he receives a fiscal note.

Katheryn Shields said it does not have a fiscal note because it was initially drafted to take the money from the unappropriated surplus. She explained that once the Legislature appropriates 95% of any fund, which the County Legislature did in the budget process last fall, no more money can be appropriated without the approval of the County Executive. She is not willing to give that agreement because she believes if General Fund money is spent it will have repercussions as to how the money balances next year, requests from the courts and how other employees feel. She will not agree to use unappropriated surplus to pay for this raise for the Prosecutor's office. If the Prosecutor uses the Back Tax Fund, she does not have a problem.

Fred Arbanas said Katheryn is giving her blessings as long as we do not use money from the General Fund. He suggested the Legislature proceed with the agenda and wait for Jay to draft an amendment to Ordinance #3779.

The Legislature agreed.

J.D. Williamson, Presiding Judge, said Ordinance #3779 provides raises for the Prosecutor's office but not for circuit court employees or other employees of Jackson County. The County Legislature needs to look at the fundamental fairness in selecting a small group for a raise and excluding the majority of Jackson County employees. He said his employees view this as unfair. He asked the County Legislature to recognize that all employees are entitled to consideration of these raises. He asked them to consider his comments before voting on the ordinance. Judge Williamson thanked them for the opportunity to speak.

Henry C. Rizzo explained that money for the raises will come out of the Prosecutor's budget, not the General Fund.

Judge Williamson said that was not his understanding. However, if the County Legislature endorses a pay raise for a small number of employees, he thinks the affect is the same.

Dennis Waits, County Legislator, said the Prosecutor can do this without the County Legislature's approval. He said the Legislature is concerned about other employees but we must comply with the Memorandum of Understandings (MOU's). We are waiting on revenue reports to see if there are additional revenues so that we can consider raises or bonuses at some time in the near future for other employees.

J.D. Williamson said his concern is that when this body acts it makes a public statement. He said last year the courts did not have money in their budget to give raises and there was a morale question. He said he hopes that the Legislature can find a way to extend raises to other employees as it will express good faith and will be a morale builder.

Henry C. Rizzo said the message we are trying to send is that we would like to get County employee salaries comparable to those in the private sector. He said this is the Prosecutor's call since he is taking the money out of his budget.

Dan Tarwater, County Legislator, said one of Jackson County's greatest assets is the employees. The Legislature would like to find money for raises for all employees.

Bob Spence, County Legislator, said this is not fair, the MOU's are not fair. He said after the raises the Prosecutor's office employees received last year plus the raises they are going to get this year, there is no way the Legislature can bring the rest of the employees up to par. He thinks it is unforgivable on the part of the Jackson County Legislature. He said no department should be singled out for these kind of raises and then ignore the rest of the County employees.

The Legislature took a 5 minute recess.

The Legislature reconvenes.
