

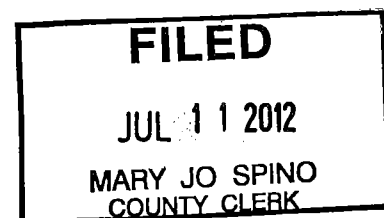
**COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT**

**AN AGREEMENT** by and between **JACKSON COUNTY, MISSOURI**, hereinafter called "the County" and **SAMUEL U. RODGERS HEALTH CENTER, INC.**, 825 Euclid Avenue, Kansas City, MO 64124, a not-for-profit corporation, hereinafter called "SURHC."

WHEREAS, the County deems it to be in the best interests of its citizenry to support the SURHC mission to improve access and quality of care to racial and ethnic minorities, pregnant women, children, people living with chronic diseases such as asthma and diabetes, and those who would otherwise go without care; and,

NOW THEREFORE, the County and SURHC agree, in consideration of the following mutual promises and valuable consideration, as follows:

1. **Services.** SURHC shall provide the Jackson County Health Care for All Project. This program will promote health education and screenings through targeted community outreach to increase the number of low income and uninsured Jackson County residents who receive health care services, increase the number of low income and racial and ethnic minority Jackson County residents who receive screening and early detection of chronic diseases, and prevent excessive morbidity and mortality among low income, racial and ethnic minority Jackson County residents as is more fully described in the proposal and budget attached hereto as Exhibit A.
2. **Additional Services.** SURHC shall employ the following:



a) Community Relations Director – responsible for overall administration of the Jackson County Health Care for All Project.

b) Health Educator – responsible for all health education materials, events, and activities.

c) Volunteer Special Projects Coordinator – responsible for enhancing the volunteer program.

d) Patient Care Coordinator – responsible for coordinating internal and external referral for the SURHC's breast and cervical cancer program and assist in the provision of access to services.

e) Breast Care Coordinator - responsibility for coordinating internal and external referrals for the Health Center's breast and cervical cancer programs and direct Health Center services.

f) Administrative Assistant – ensures all records, documents, correspondence and related material are developed, distributed, stored and maintained in a timely and accurate manner at all times.

3. **Terms of Payment.** The County shall pay to SURHC a total amount not to exceed \$337,488.00 under this Agreement which shall be used to provide services in the amounts listed on the attached Budget. One quarter of this sum, or \$84,372.00, shall be paid to SURHC on a quarterly basis provided that SURHC has submitted to the County the report(s) required under Paragraph 4 and Paragraph 5 hereof. Payment for the first quarter will be issued within 30 days after the contract has been executed by all necessary parties. The County, through the Legislative Auditor, may approve

adjustments to line items listed in Agency's budget/proposal contained in Exhibit A, in an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the total amount of the Agreement, so long as there is no additional total cost to the County.

4. **Reports.** Within 30 days after the conclusion of each calendar quarter under this Agreement, SURHC shall submit a quarterly report, including a statement of budgeted and actual expenditures, and any other documents requested by the Director of Finance and Purchasing, to establish that the funds provided pursuant to this Agreement were used for the purposes set forth herein. The report for the first quarter shall be submitted within 30 days after the execution of this Agreement. The last quarter's report shall include an annual report which shall summarize all of SURHC's activities pursuant to this Agreement. SURHC's failure to submit this annual report shall disqualify SURHC from future funding by the County.

5. **Submission of Documents.** No payment shall be made under this contract unless the contracting agency shall have submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing (1) a written proposal setting out in detail the intended use of the County's funding, including the target population to be served; (2) the agency's IRS Form 990, from the previous fiscal or calendar year; (3) a statement of the agency's total budget for its most recent fiscal year; and, (4) a detailed explanation of actual expenditures of County funds (pertains to final payments and payments on contracts for future years.) If an agency has previously received County funding, to be eligible for future payments, an agency must submit either an audited financial statement for the agency's most recent fiscal or calendar year, by March 31 of the following year, or a certified public

accountant's program audit of County funds, by January 31 of the following year. Any document described herein which was submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing as a part of an application for funding need not be resubmitted to qualify for payment. No payment shall be made if the contract agency is out of compliance on any other County contract.

6. **Equal Opportunity.** In carrying out this Agreement, SURHC agrees and assures that no person eligible for services shall on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination for any service funded by this Agreement. Furthermore, SURHC agrees and assures that it will provide equal employment opportunities to applicants and employees and will not discriminate against them on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age.

7. **Audit.** The County further reserves the right to examine and audit, during reasonable office hours, the books, and records of SURHC pertaining to its finances and operations.


8. **Default.** If SURHC shall default in the performance or observation of any term or condition of this Agreement, the County shall give written notice setting forth the default and the correction required. If said default shall continue and not be corrected by SURHC within ten days of its receipt of said notice, the County may, at its election, terminate the Agreement and withhold any payments not yet made. Said election shall not in any way limit the County's right to seek legal redress.

9. **Conflict of Interest.** SURHC warrants that no officer or employee of the County, whether elected or appointed, shall in any manner whatsoever be interested in or receive any benefit from the profits or emoluments of this Agreement.
10. **Severability.** If any covenant or other provision of this Agreement is invalid or incapable of being enforced by reasons of any rule of law or public policy, all other conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect and no covenant or provision shall be deemed dependent upon any other covenant or provision unless so expressed herein.
11. **Liability and Indemnification.** No party to this Agreement shall assume any liability for the acts of any other party to this Agreement, its officers, employees or agents and SURHC shall indemnify, defend and hold the County harmless from any and all claims, liabilities, damages, costs (including reasonable attorney's fees directly related thereto) including but not limited to violation of civil rights and/or bodily injury to or death of any person and for damage to or destruction of property if and to the extent caused by the negligence, willful misconduct or omissions of SURHC during the performance of this Agreement.
12. **Term.** This Agreement shall be effective January 1, 2012, and shall terminate on December 31, 2012. This Agreement may be terminated prior to that date by either party upon written notice, delivered thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination. If this Agreement is terminated by either party, the County shall pay only for those services actually performed by SURHC as verified by the County's audit.
13. **Incorporation.** This Agreement incorporates the entire understanding and


agreement of the parties.

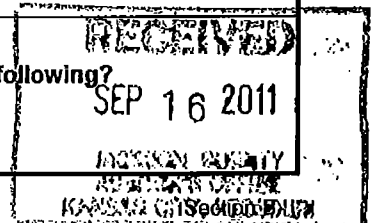

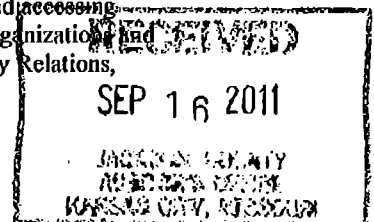
One (1.0 FTE) Community Relations Director: responsible for overall administration of the Jackson County Health Care for All Project including supervision and management of the Health Educator, Breast Care Coordinator, Volunteer Special Projects Manager, Patient Care Coordinators, and the Administrative Assistant to ensure grant outcomes are met. The Director manages all aspects of SURHC's health education, prevention and awareness programs that address the health care needs of residents of Jackson County, with a priority focus on the underserved population. The Director designs and implements targeted community events to increase access to health care services. The Director facilitates educational forums and special events to conduct community health screenings and education activities. The Director may serve on various community committees and boards to promote Samuel U. Rodgers Health Center's (SURHC) services, represent SURHC in collaborative community-wide health activities, and foster and develop positive working relationships with community agencies, County of Jackson County, and other health care organizations. The Director will develop and implement strategies to promote the SURHC's mission through ongoing networking and interaction with community and local leaders. The Director is responsible for managing the reporting processes for the Jackson County grant and collaborates with the Chief Officer to oversee all promotional materials and activities funded by the Jackson County grant to ensure that the County is properly recognized as a sponsor.

One (1.0 FTE) Health Educator: The Health Educator is responsible for all health education materials, events, and activities. The Educator will supervise all community education and prevention activities on disease prevention topics including: breast health, teen health, nutrition, asthma, COPD, child health, immunizations, prenatal care, and wellness lifestyles. The director will implement strategies to increase access to medical services, provide a variety of health screenings to achieve early diagnosis and prevention, assist Patient Care Coordinators in helping patients to overcome barriers to self-care, medications, and medical care. In addition, the Health Educator will provide education and screenings at targeted community events within Jackson County; educate patients on disease prevention, Glaucoma screenings, and referrals to the Health Center. The Educator conducts health screening and assessments; provides health education presentations to schools, shelters, churches, and other community groups. The Educator will also be responsible for compiling reports for screenings, diagnostic results, treatment plans and follow-up of outcomes for the Breast Health program and submit report to the Director of Community Relations on a monthly, quarterly, and annual basis.

One (1 FTE) Breast Care Coordinator, under the supervision of the Director of Community Relations, will be responsible for coordinating internal and external referrals for the SURHC's breast and cervical cancer programs and assist in the provision of access to services. The Breast Care Coordinator will assist patients in navigating the Health Care system for follow-up care for abnormal findings. The Coordinator will be responsible for establishing access points to inform and educate Jackson County residents on breast health education and making appointments for Mammograms and well-women services at the SURHC. The Coordinator will also be responsible for compiling reports for screenings, diagnostic results, treatment plans and follow-up of outcomes for the Breast Health program and submit report to the Director of Community Relations on a monthly, quarterly, and annual basis.

One (0.5 FTE) Patient Care Coordinator-: The Care Coordinator will serve as liaison to bridge the cultural and lingual gaps and help eliminate health care barriers for Jackson County residents. The Care Coordinator will assist new and returning patients to navigate the health care system and secure the services patients need to achieve healthy outcomes. The Coordinator will respond to general health inquiries; schedule appointments; send reminders; arrange transportation; provide interpretative or translation services as needed; provide patients with information and assist with the completion of Medicaid and Medicare applications in their preferred language; and assist patients with other health care forms. The Care Coordinator will coordinate medical and dental services with daycare centers, schools, and assist the Health Educator with Glaucoma and other screenings and health presentations at churches and community events. The Care Coordinator will be present at off-site locations within the community to provide pre-registration for clients who need to schedule an appointment for medical and dental services at the Health Center.

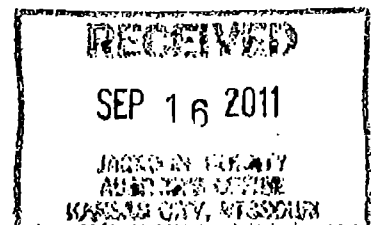
One (1.0 FTE) Volunteer Special Projects Manager (VSP) Manager: will be responsible to enhance our volunteer program to include recruitment and retention of volunteers; developing and accessing appropriate projects for volunteers; and development of contacts with other agencies, organizations, and community groups. The VSP Manager will also interact with the Director of Community Relations,

SURHC's grant writer and other department managers within the Health Center to determine current volunteer needs. The VSP Manager will be responsible for recruitment, training and establishing an internal referral system for Departments to request volunteers. The VSP Manager will evaluate the efficiency and effectiveness of the volunteer services and is responsible for maintaining a database of volunteers and hours completed.

One (1.0 FTE Administrative Assistant ensures all records, documents, correspondence and related materials are developed, distributed, stored and maintained in a timely and accurate manner at all times. The AA orders all supplies and ensures all supplies, office equipment, files, and related materials are available and in working order for other members of the department. The AA is responsible for all correspondence to and from the department and is responsible to tabulating any and all data to support the reporting requirements,

### Proposed Program

#### Detail functions to be performed by each program.

Samuel U. Rodgers Health Center (SURHC) provides a diverse range of medical care services to the poorest and most vulnerable residents of Jackson County. SURHC Jackson County patient population is low-income and 73% minority which puts them in a category that is at high risk for chronic illnesses, asthma, COPD, low-birth weight, and they experience multiple health disparities that result from social and racial inequalities. They live in severe poverty and struggle to pay for basic needs. It is critical that SURHC increase awareness and health knowledge and provide access to life saving services for these and other Jackson County residents. The prevalence of chronic diseases in the community that go undiagnosed and untreated leads to the use of emergency rooms for primary care and often results in preventable hospitalizations.

In Jackson County according to the County Health Rankings: 2010 Missouri report, Jackson County ranks an alarming 97th out of 115 counties in health outcomes based on mortality and morbidity. Jackson County ranks 99th in social and economic factors and 98th in health behaviors. While the data is county-wide, SURHC's service area has high levels of poverty and a prevalence of vulnerable populations, suggesting that these health outcomes are impacting more individuals in SURHC's service area than in the general community.

SURHC will improve the health of Jackson County residents by: (1) actively screening and educating Jackson County residents on a variety of health issues, providing information on services, and referrals for treatment to SURHC's health services, (2) increasing access to health care by removing economic, transportation and lingual barriers, (3) providing preventative health services and increased awareness through community events, (4) and providing breast and cervical cancer education, early detection, and access to treatment. These activities will not only impact individual's lives, but also will reduce inappropriate use of emergency rooms and preventable hospitalizations. In 2008 alone, diabetes was responsible for 1,290 emergency room visits and 1,087 hospitalizations in Kansas City.

The Health Educator will provide outreach health education and screenings services to ensure that individuals are aware of their condition and have access to medical care. The Health Educator, Breast Care Coordinator and Patient Care Coordinators will: (a) refer persons with abnormal results for SURHC for follow-up care; (b) conduct educational outreach activities and presentations related to diseases prevalent in the community; (c) provide education regarding the condition; (d) assist the patient in accessing medical care, and in addition, (e) provide community education and presentations on disease prevention topics, breast health, teen health, nutrition, asthma, COPD, child health, immunizations, prenatal care, and wellness lifestyles at community events, local high schools, shelters, churches, and other community groups. blood pressure, diabetes, cholesterol, and glaucoma screenings will be provided at these events. (f) increase access to health care among new and returning patients by helping them to navigate the often complex health care system, overcome barriers to care; (g) remain engaged with their treatment; (h) schedule appointments, send reminders, follow-up if appointments are missed; (i) arrange transportation; (j) schedule interpretive and/ or translation service; (k) assist in the completion of MO HealthNet (Medicaid) applications for all members of the family, as appropriate; and Patient Care Coordinator will coordinate medical and dental services with day care centers and schools, assist the Health Educator with community outreach, and schedule SURHC appointments onsite at community events.

The Breast Care Coordinator will be responsible for coordinating patient care in the SURHC's breast and cervical cancer programs from internal and external referrals. The Care Coordinator will: (a) educate SURHC patients and women in the community regarding breast care, (b) recruit women from the community to come in for mammograms and well-woman exams, (c) schedule appointments for women ages 25-64 for mammograms and well-woman exams, (d) assist women with abnormal results in accessing follow up care and treatment for breast or cervical cancer. For women without the economic means to qualify for other breast programs due to age, screening funds will be used to provide these services.

<p>Approximately 63% of the SURHC's patient population of over 18,600 individuals reside in Jackson County, MO. More than half are uninsured, 97% live at or below 200 % of the poverty level, and over two-thirds are they are racial and ethnic minorities. Over 76% are women and children. Nearly 50% require interpreters. SURHC serves a disproportionate share of newly arrived Americans and refugees that often present without a clear understanding of their disease or condition or what constitutes a healthy lifestyle, and are unfamiliar with preventive health screenings and immunizations. SURHC's patients have a high prevalence of illnesses and often go without treatment due to economic limitations. When it comes to breast cancer, the most at-risk are racial and ethnic minority women with low incomes who do not obtain screening mammography on a regular basis and are more likely to experience an aggressive form of breast cancer that causes death at younger ages. Given a patient population that faces economic and cultural barriers to health care, includes a high percentage of women and children, and who experience high rates of diseases, SURHC has chosen the three areas of focus outlined in the Proposed Program section.</p>

### Approach & Method

1. Improve the health of Jackson County residents by providing health education and awareness of prevalent diseases through the provision of health education classes, screenings, referrals to health care at SURHC, collaborations with community organizations, or other appropriate resources, increase community awareness through a variety of seminars, media, print materials, and other activities.

2. Increase access to health care by removing barriers to care: Patient Care Coordinators will help new and returning patients navigate the health care system, overcome barriers to care, stay engaged with Health Center providers; coordinate medical and dental services at day care centers and schools; and help participants at community events to schedule appointments for primary, preventative and dental services at the Health Center. Under the direction of Volunteer Manager, trained volunteers will assist Patient Care Coordinators at community activities and for participants that made appointments, they will make follow-up calls to remind them of their appointments and address any additional needs identified by the participant prior to their appointments.

3. Increase access to breast and cervical cancer education, early detection, and treatment: The Breast Care Coordinator will educate Health Center patients and women at community events, shelters, churches, etc. regarding breast self awareness, care, including instruction on the breast self-exam using a model; educational presentations, recruit women ages 25 to 64 from the community obtains mammograms and well-woman exams. For patients with abnormal findings the Breast Care Coordinator collaborates with Truman Medical or other providers to decrease any barriers that may exist including: providing interpreters, transportation, and moral support as needed.

Detail specific methods you will use to achieve these objectives.

The Health Care for All Program team will employ strategies that increase access to care as follows: provision of interpreters for non-English speaking clients and patients; transportation to appointments; educational information and presentations in native languages; scheduling appointments at community events to access care; providing screenings to make them aware of any medical concerns that made need further care; assist clients and internal patients to navigate the health care system to utilize other appropriate Health Center services; and assist eligible patients to apply for MO HealthNet Insurance (Medicaid). Trained volunteers assist in all these endeavors.

Beginning in late 2011, a new strategy will be implemented in which Health Center staff will use a family-based approach. Upon entry to SURHC's system by mother, father, child, or youth, staff will inquire about additional patient or family needs and refer to appropriate services.
