COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

AN AGREEMENT by and between JACKSON COUNTY, MISSOURI, hereinafter called "the County" and SAMUEL U. RODGERS HEALTH CENTER, INC., 825 Euclid Avenue, Kansas City, MO 64124, a not-for-profit corporation, hereinafter called "SURHC."

WHEREAS, the County deems it to be in the best interests of its citizenry to support the SURHC mission to improve access and quality of care to racial and ethnic minorities, pregnant women, children, people living with chronic diseases such as asthma and diabetes, and those who would otherwise go without care; and,

NOW THEREFORE, the County and SURHC agree, in consideration of the following mutual promises and valuable consideration, as follows:

- 1. **Services.** SURHC shall provide the Jackson County Health Care for All Project. This program will promote health education and screenings through targeted community outreach to increase the number of low income and uninsured Jackson County residents who receive health care services, increase the number of low income and racial and ethnic minority Jackson County residents who receive screening and early detection of chronic diseases, and prevent excessive morbidity and mortality among low income, racial and ethnic minority Jackson County residents as is more fully described in the proposal and budget attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- 2. Additional Services. SURHC shall employ the following:

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- a) <u>Community Relations Director</u> responsible for overall administration of the Jackson County Health Care for All Project.
- b) <u>Health Educator</u> responsible for all health education materials, events, and activities.
- c) <u>Volunteer Special Projects Coordinator</u> responsible for enhancing the volunteer program.
- d) <u>Patient Care Coordinator</u> responsible for coordinating internal and external referral for the SURHC's breast and cervical cancer program and assist in the provision of access to services.
- e) <u>Breast Care Coordinator</u> responsibility for coordinating internal and external referrals for the Health Center's breast and cervical cancer programs and direct Health Center services.
- f) <u>Administrative Assistant</u> ensures all records, documents, correspondence and related material are developed, distributed, stored and maintained in a timely and accurate manner at all times.
- Terms of Payment. The County shall pay to SURHC a total amount not to exceed \$337,488.00 under this Agreement which shall be used to provide services in the amounts listed on the attached Budget. One quarter of this sum, or \$84,372.00, shall be paid to SURHC on a quarterly basis provided that SURHC has submitted to the County the report(s) required under Paragraph 4 and Paragraph 5 hereof. Payment for the first and second quarter will be issued within 30 days after the contract has been executed by all necessary parties. The County, through the Legislative Auditor, may

approve adjustments to line items listed in SURHC's budget/proposal contained in Exhibit A, in an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the total amount of the Agreement, so long as there is no additional total cost to the County.

- 4. Reports. Within 30 days after the conclusion of each calendar quarter under this Agreement, SURHC shall submit a quarterly report, including a statement of budgeted and actual expenditures, and any other documents requested by the Director of Finance and Purchasing, to establish that the funds provided pursuant to this Agreement were used for the purposes set forth herein. The report for the first and second quarter shall be submitted within 30 days after the execution of this Agreement. The last quarter's report shall include an annual report which shall summarize all of SURHC's activities pursuant to this Agreement. SURHC's failure to submit this annual report shall disqualify SURHC from future funding by the County.
- 5. <u>Submission of Documents</u>. No payment shall be made under this contract unless the contracting SURHC shall have submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing (1) a written proposal setting out in detail the intended use of the County's funding, including the target population to be served; (2) the SURHC's IRS Form 990, from the previous fiscal or calendar year; (3) a statement of the SURHC's total budget for its most recent fiscal year; and, (4) a detailed explanation of actual expenditures of County funds (pertains to final payments and payments on contracts for future years.) If an SURHC has previously received County funding, to be eligible for future payments, an SURHC must submit either an audited financial statement for the SURHC's most recent fiscal or calendar year, by March 31 of the following year, or a certified public

accountant's program audit of County funds, by January 31 of the following year. Any document described herein which was submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing as a part of an application for funding need not be resubmitted to qualify for payment. No payment shall be made if the contract SURHC is out of compliance on any other County contract.

6. Appropriation of funds. SURHC and the County recognize that the County intends to satisfy its financial obligation to SURHC hereunder out of funds annually appropriated for that purpose by the County. County promises and covenants to make its best efforts to appropriate funds in accordance with this Agreement. In the event no funds or insufficient funds are appropriated and budgeted, or are otherwise unavailable by any means whatsoever for payment due hereunder, County shall immediately notify SURHC of this occurrence and this Agreement shall terminate on the last day for which appropriations were received, without penalty or expense to the County of any kind whatsoever, except as to the portions of the payment amounts herein agreed upon for which funds shall have been appropriated and budgeted or are otherwise available, or at any time after the last date that County has paid for the Services, if earlier.

County further agrees:

- a. That any funds authorized or appropriated for services rendered under this Agreement shall be applied to the payments hereunder until all such funds are exhausted.
- b. That County will use its best efforts to obtain authorization and appropriation of such funds including, without limitation, the inclusion in its annual budget, a

request for adequate funds to meet its obligation under this Agreement in full.

- 7. **Equal Opportunity**. In carrying out this Agreement, SURHC agrees and assures that no person eligible for services shall on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination for any service funded by this Agreement. Furthermore, SURHC agrees and assures that it will provide equal employment opportunities to applicants and employees and will not discriminate against them on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age.
- 8. <u>Audit</u>. The County further reserves the right to examine and audit, during reasonable office hours, the books, and records of SURHC pertaining to its finances and operations.
- 9. <u>Default.</u> If SURHC shall default in the performance or observation of any term or condition of this Agreement, the County shall give written notice setting forth the default and the correction required. If said default shall continue and not be corrected by SURHC within ten days of its receipt of said notice, the County may, at its election, terminate the Agreement and withhold any payments not yet made. Said election shall not in any way limit the County's right to seek legal redress.
- 10. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. SURHC warrants that no officer or employee of the County, whether elected or appointed, shall in any manner whatsoever be interested in or receive any benefit from the profits or emoluments of this Agreement.

- 11. Employment of Unauthorized Aliens Prohibited. Pursuant to §285.530.1, RSMo, SURHC assures that it does not knowingly employ, hire for employment, or continue to employ an unauthorized alien to perform work within the State of Missouri and/or Jackson County, and shall affirm, by sworn affidavit and provision of documentation, its enrollment and participation in a federal work authorization program with respect to the employees working in connection with the contracted services. Further, SURHC shall sign an affidavit, attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit B, affirming that it does not knowingly employ any person who is an unauthorized alien in connection with the contracted services.
- 12. <u>Severability</u>. If any covenant or other provision of this Agreement is invalid or incapable of being enforced by reasons of any rule of law or public policy, all other conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect and no covenant or provision shall be deemed dependent upon any other covenant or provision unless so expressed herein.
- Liability and Indemnification. No party to this Agreement shall assume any liability for the acts of any other party to this Agreement, its officers, employees or agents and SURHC shall indemnify, defend and hold the County harmless from any and all claims, liabilities, damages, costs (including reasonable attorney's fees directly related thereto) including but not limited to violation of civil rights and/or bodily injury to or death of any person and for damage to or destruction of property if and to the extent caused by the negligence, willful misconduct or omissions of SURHC during the performance of this Agreement.

- 14. <u>Term.</u> This Agreement shall be effective January 1, 2013, and shall terminate on December 31, 2013. This Agreement may be terminated prior to that date by either party upon written notice, delivered thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination. If this Agreement is terminated by either party, the County shall pay only for those services actually performed by SURHC as verified by the County's audit.
- 15. <u>Incorporation</u>. This Agreement incorporates the entire understanding and agreement of the parties.

Detail functions to be performed by each program.

Samuel U. Rodgers Health Center (SURHC) provides a diverse range of health care services to the poorest and most vulnerable residents of Jackson County. SURHC's patient population and the Jackson County communities we serve are not just "poor," they struggle to provide the bare necessities of life for their families. It is well-documented that poverty is inexorably linked to poor health and numerous studies have linked poverty to higher levels of cancer, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, and many other diseases. Health problems are even more acute in Jackson County for people of color. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) found "In Kansas City, the average life expectancy for people of color is:11 years shorter than for whites; African Americans are 2.5 times more likely to die of diabetes and 1.5 times more likely to die of heart disease than whites; and Latinos are more than 1.5 times more likely to die of diabetes compared to whites." Further data from the KCMO Health Department 2010 Community Assessment, Zone 2, where SURHC is located, reported that 44% of all deaths were premature. These reports demonstrate the severity of the health problems facing Jackson County residents.

SURHC's "Health Care for All" program serves all Jackson County residents, but focuses on those who are low-income and at high risk for chronic diseases, and experiencing multiple health disparities that result from social and racial inequities. In 2011, "Health Care for All" community outreach program identified 1,579 Jackson County residents in need of health care treatment for diabetes or other chronic diseases. SURHC, through a variety of federal, state and city funding provided over \$800,000 in care for these individuals. It was Jackson County Outside Agency funding that enabled us to discover these Jackson County residents that otherwise might have gone undiagnosed and untreated. Eventually these individuals would have ended up in emergency departments, being unnecessarily hospitalized or dying prematurely. SURHC's "Health Care for All" and its ability to identify high risk individuals and provide access to lifesaving services is critical to the health and well being of Jackson County residents. It is imperative that SURHC continue community outreach, screenings, health literacy, and health education.

SURHC will improve the health of Jackson County residents by: (1) actively screening and educating Jackson County residents on a variety of health issues, providing information on services, and referrals for treatment to SURHC's health services, (2) increasing access to health care by removing economic, transportation and lingual barriers, (3) providing preventative health services and increased awareness through community events, (4) and providing breast and cervical cancer education, early detection, and access to treatment.

The Health Educator, Breast Care Coordinator and Patient Care Coordinators will: (a) refer persons with abnormal screening results to SURHC for medical care; (b) conduct educational outreach activities and presentations related to diseases prevalent in the community; (c) assist the patient in accessing medical care; (d) provide disease prevention education and presentations on topics such as breast health, teen health, nutrition, child health, immunizations, prenatal care, and wellness lifestyles in the community at events, local high schools, shelters, churches, and etc.; (e) provide blood pressure, diabetes, cholesterol, and glaucoma screenings at events as appropriate; (f) increase access to health care among new and returning patients by helping them to navigate the often complex health care system and overcome barriers to care; (g) schedule appointments, send reminders, follow-up if appointments are missed; arrange transportation; schedule interpretive and/ or translation service; (h) assist in the completion of MO HealthNet (Medicaid) applications for members of the family, as appropriate; (i) and Patlent Care Coordinators will coordinate medical and dental services with day care centers and schools, assist the Health Educator with community outreach, and schedule SURHC appointments onsite at community events.

Sixty-three percent (12,000) of SURHC's patient population of over 19,000 patients are residents of Jackson County, MO. They come from Blue Springs, Buckner, Grain Valley Grandview, Independence, Kansas City, Lee's Summit, Lone Jack, Oak Grove, Sibley and unincorporated areas of the County. Ninety percent are uninsured or covered by Medicaid or Medicare, two percent are grant funded, and eight percent have private insurance. Ethnically, we serve thirty—nine percent Latinos, seven percent Asian/Pacific Islanders, twenty-five percent African Americans, twenty percent Caucasians, and nine percent other or more than one race. Economically, ninety-nine percent of Jackson County residents served by SURHC live at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. For the 2013 "Health Care for All" program, a special emphasis will be on reaching low-income Jackson County residents at high risk for chronic diseases.

Increase access to breast and cervical cancer education, early detection, and treatment: The Breast Care Coordinator will educate SURHC Jackson County patients and women in the community regarding breast care, including instruction on the breast self-exam; assist women to obtain mammograms and well-woman exams; schedule appointments for women ages 25-64 for mammograms and well-woman exams. For patients with abnormal findings the Breast Care Coordinator collaborates with Truman Medical Center and other providers to decrease any barriers that may exist including: providing interpreters, transportation, and moral support.

The "Health Care for All" project will employ a variety of methods and strategies to increase access to care as follows: provide Interpreters for non-English speaking clients and patients; provide transportation to appointments; multi-lingual educational information and presentations; assist with scheduling appointments at community events to access care; provide screenings to inform participants of any health concerns that need further care or treatment; assist clients and patients to navigate the health care system to utilize other appropriate SURHC services such as Women, Infant and Children services, dental services, and behavioral health services; and assist patients to apply for MO HealthNet insurance (Medicaid) and/or presumptive eligibility for temporary coverage until eligibility can be determined.. Additionally, SURHC uses a family based approach so that when one family member receives services, the "Health Care for All" staff inquires about the health care needs of every family memberand helps to provide appropriate access to care.

The term "business entity" shall include any business entity that possesses a business permit, license, or tax certificate issued by the state, any business entity that is exempt by law from obtaining such a business permit, and any business entity that is operating unlawfully without such a business permit.

Every such business entity shall complete the following affidavit affirming that it does not knowingly employ any person who is an unauthorized alien in connection with the contracted services. The completed affidavit must be returned as a part of the contract documentation.

This affidavit affirms that Samuel U. Rodgers Health Center, is enrolled in, and is currently participating in, E-verify or any other equivalent electronic verification of work authorization operated by the United States Department of Homeland Security under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (IRCA); and, Samuel U. Rodgers Health Center, does not knowingly employ any person who is an unauthorized alien in conjunction with the contracted services.
