

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT
(Hazardous Material)

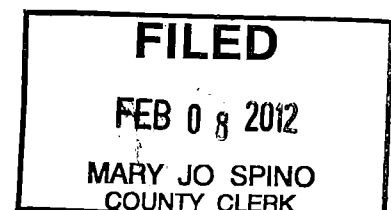
AN AGREEMENT by and between Jackson County, Missouri, hereinafter referred to as "the County" and the **Mid-America Regional Council**, 600 Broadway, Suite 200, Kansas City, MO 64105, a regional planning commission operating pursuant to Section 251.150 et seq., RSMo, hereinafter referred to as "MARC."

WHEREAS, the County deems it to be in the best interest of its citizenry to provide support for hazardous materials emergency response planning in order to discharge responsibilities related to MARC's designation by the County as its **Local Emergency Planning Committee** under the Federal Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (Superfund Amendment and Reauthorization Act of 1986 - Title III); and,

WHEREAS, this Agreement is entered into pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 70, RSMo, dealing with cooperative agreements; therefore,

The County and MARC agree, in consideration of the following mutual promises and valuable consideration, as follows:

1. **Services to be provided.** MARC shall develop and maintain a hazardous materials emergency response plan; work with fire departments and industry to provide training and promote cooperative emergency response; assist industry in complying with reporting requirements to ensure that fire departments are informed of hazardous materials present in their service areas; and develop a list of technical expertise, resources and equipment available from area fire departments for use in responding to



accidents involving the release of hazardous materials, as is more fully set out in the document attached hereto as Exhibit A, and all for the benefit of the residents of Jackson County.

2. **Terms of Payment.** County shall pay to MARC the total sum of \$6,430.00 for such services upon the execution of this Agreement. The County, through the Legislative Auditor, may approve adjustments to line items listed in Agency's budget/proposal contained in Exhibit A, in an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the total amount of the Agreement, so long as there is no additional total cost to the County.

3. **Annual Report.** MARC shall submit an annual report, including invoices and cancelled checks, and other documentation as requested by the Director of Finance and Purchasing to show that the funds paid to MARC by the County were used for the purposes set forth in this Agreement. Said annual report shall be submitted no later than December 31, 2012. Failure to submit said annual report shall disqualify MARC from future funding by the County.

4. **Audit.** The County further reserves the right to examine and audit, during reasonable office hours, the books and records of MARC pertaining to the finances and operations of MARC.

5. **Default.** If MARC shall default in the performance or observation of any term or condition of this Agreement, the County shall give MARC written notice setting forth the default and correction required. Thereafter, if said default by MARC shall continue and not be corrected within ten days of the notice of default, the County may, at its election, terminate the Agreement and take such action in law or equity to recover all

funds given to MARC under this Agreement, but not used for the purposes set forth in the Agreement, as the County deems appropriate.

6. **Conflict of Interest.** MARC warrants that no officer or employee of the County, whether elected or appointed, shall in any manner whatsoever be interested in or receive any benefit from the profits or emoluments of this Agreement.

7. **Termination.** This Agreement shall commence January 1, 2012, and shall terminate on December 31, 2012. This Agreement may be terminated prior to that date by either party upon written notice delivered fifteen days prior to the effective date of termination. If this Agreement is terminated by either party, the County shall pay only for those services actually performed as verified by the County's audit as provided in paragraph 4 above.


8. **Equal Opportunity.** In carrying out this Agreement, MARC shall insure that none of the benefits or services of the program are denied to any eligible recipient on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap or national origin. MARC shall take affirmative action to insure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap or national origin in terms and conditions of employment or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation and selection for training including apprenticeship. MARC shall in all solicitation or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of MARC, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap or national origin.

9. **Incorporation.** This Agreement incorporates the entire understanding and

agreement of the parties.





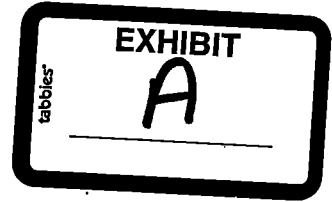

Proposed Program

Detail functions to be performed by each program.

In 1988, MARC formed the Mid-America Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) to assist area counties in planning for response to hazardous materials incidents. Cass, Clay, Jackson, Platte, and Ray counties have asked MARC on an annual basis to provide administrative support to the multi-county LEPC. In 2010, the Mid-America LEPC added representation from the three Kansas counties in the MARC region, ensuring that bi-state cooperation in hazardous materials emergency response continues to be well coordinated.

The LEPC maintains information on the quantities and types of hazardous materials present at facilities throughout the metropolitan area, develops and updates a regional hazardous materials plan, organizes hazardous materials training classes and exercises, and educates the public about hazardous materials safety issues. The LEPC provides an important role in bringing public emergency response agencies together with area industry to reduce risks from accidental or intentional chemical releases that could harm the public. The Mid-America LEPC and MARC have been working with Jackson County departments and other public agencies in Jackson County on related homeland security planning and investments.

The target population is the local first responders and area industry that uses, stores or transports hazardous materials within or through Jackson County and other parts of the Kansas City metropolitan region. The emergency responders include fire service, emergency medical services, public health and other local government agencies. The LEPC supported by MARC conducts public education and outreach to residents of Jackson County and other counties in the Kansas City region, educating them about the safe storage and use of hazardous materials, about the capabilities of the region's emergency responders to address chemical accidents or events, and actions the public should take, such as shelter-in-place if a chemical release were to occur. The LEPC program provides training to first responders, particularly smaller and volunteer fire service and hazardous materials response teams. The program provides data on locations of hazardous materials and planning resource information to local emergency response and emergency management agencies within the county.

The Mid-America LEPC serves the five Missouri counties in the Kansas City region, including Jackson, Cass, Clay, Platte and Ray counties; and three Kansas counties, Leavenworth, Johnson and Wyandotte counties.

Fund Separation

The funds are not measured by individual resident utilization. The program provides training to local emergency response personnel and is able to document the number of personnel trained on an annual basis. In addition, the LEPC holds monthly meetings and records discussions held and actions taken. The meetings are open to the public. Information is maintained on the LEPC website, and the number of visitors to the website is monitored. Public education materials are distributed through public events, and those materials are tracked to determine the number of residents and others receiving information.

Approach & Method

1. Increase the region's capabilities to prevent and respond to intentional or accidental releases of hazardous chemical through effective planning, training and exercises, and resource allocation.

2. Support the Mid-America LEPC's efforts to maintain an up-to-date hazardous materials emergency plan and updated inventory of stored materials to assist local agencies to reduce risks and respond to emergency events involving hazardous chemicals.

3. Increase the cooperation between emergency services agencies and private industry to reduce risks from hazardous chemical incidents.

Detail specific methods you will use to achieve these objectives.

The LEPC brings emergency service representatives together to strengthen relationships, share information important to the community's protection and coordinate activities on a monthly basis. The meetings are open to the public. The LEPC maintains an inventory of locations where hazardous materials are stored and provides that information to area fire departments and districts and emergency managers. The LEPC assists in educating local businesses and the public. The LEPC maintains information on MARC's website for the public and local officials, stores sensitive information and hazardous materials plans and data which can be accessed by county personnel.

The LEPC evaluates the hazardous materials training needs of the county's emergency services agencies and develops and implements a hazardous materials training program based on a prioritization of training needs. The LEPC sponsors a variety of training courses on topics, such as: incident management system, hospital contamination and hospital hazardous materials operations, LP gas emergencies, gasoline truck specialist, rail safety, ignitable liquids, and responding to chemical emergencies.
