### **COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT**

AN AGREEMENT by and between JACKSON COUNTY, MISSOURI, hereinafter called "the County" and HSPCA (formerly known as "Heartland SPCA"), 5428 Antioch Drive, Merriam, KS 66202, hereinafter called "Agency."

WHEREAS, the County and Agency desire to enter into an Agreement to provide funding to be used for its Humane Education and Resources Office (HERO) Program; and,

WHEREAS, the County deems it to be in the best interest of its citizenry to support such programs and activities; and,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and the terms and provisions herein contained, the County and Agency respectively promise, covenant and agree with each other as follows:

- 1. **Services.** Agency shall provide services through its HERO Program, which includes educational programs and low cost spay and neuter services, as is more fully set out in the proposal attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. <u>Terms of Payment</u>. The County agrees to pay to Agency the total amount of \$80,000.00 in quarterly installments of \$20,000.00 each, with the first payment to be made upon execution of this Agreement. The remaining payments shall be made upon the County's receipt of the reports as set forth in paragraph 3 hereof. The County, through the Legislative Auditor, may approve adjustments to line items listed in

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Agency's budget/proposal contained in Exhibit A, in an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the total amount of the Agreement, so long as there is no additional total cost to the County.

- 3. Reports. Within 30 days after the conclusion of each calendar quarter under this Agreement, Agency shall submit a quarterly report, including cancelled checks and/or a copy of the face of the check and corresponding bank statements, invoices, and any other documents requested by the Director of Finance and Purchasing, to establish that the funds provided pursuant to this Agreement were used for the purposes set forth herein. The report for the first quarter shall be submitted within 30 after the execution of this Agreement. The last quarter's report shall include an annual report which shall summarize all of Agency's activities pursuant to this Agreement. Agency's failure to submit this annual report shall disqualify Agency from future funding by the County.
- 4. <u>Submission of Documents</u>. No payment shall be made under this contract unless the contracting agency shall have submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing (1) a written proposal setting out in detail the intended use of the County's funding, including the target population to be served; (2) the agency's IRS Form 990, from the previous fiscal or calendar year; (3) a statement of the agency's total budget for its most recent fiscal year; and, (4) a detailed explanation of actual expenditures of County funds (pertains to final payments and payments on contracts for future years.) If an agency has previously received County funding, to be eligible for future payments, an agency must submit either an audited financial statement for the agency's most

recent fiscal or calendar year, by March 31 of the following year, or a certified public accountant's program audit of County funds, by January 31 of the following year. Any document described herein which was submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing as a part of an application for funding need not be resubmitted to qualify for payment. No payment shall be made if the contract agency is out of compliance on any other County contract.

- 5. **Equal Opportunity**. Agency agrees and assures that no person eligible for services shall on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination for any service funded by this Agreement. Furthermore, Agency agrees and assures that it will provide equal employment opportunities to applicants and employees and will not discriminate against them on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age.
- 6. <u>Audit</u>. The County further reserves the right to examine and audit, during reasonable office hours, the books and records of Agency pertaining to its finances and operations.
- 7. **Default.** If Agency shall default in the performance or observation of any term or condition of this Agreement, the County shall give written notice setting forth the default and the correction required. If said default shall continue and not be corrected by Agency within ten days of its receipt of said notice, the County may, at its election, terminate the Agreement and withhold any payments not yet made. Said election shall not in any way limit the County's right to seek legal redress.

- 8. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. Agency warrants that no officer or employee of the County, whether elected or appointed, shall in any manner whatsoever be interested in or receive any benefit from the profits or emoluments of this Agreement.
- 9. <u>Severability</u>. If any covenant or other provision of this Agreement is invalid or incapable of being enforced by reasons of any rule of law or public policy, all other conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect and no covenant or provision shall be deemed dependent upon any other covenant or provision unless so expressed herein.
- 10. Liability and Indemnification. No party to this Agreement shall assume any liability for the acts of any other party to this Agreement, its officers, employees or agents and Agency shall indemnify, defend and hold the County harmless from any and all claims, liabilities, damages, costs (including reasonable attorney's fees directly related thereto) including but not limited to violation of civil rights and/or bodily injury to or death of any person and for damage to or destruction of property if and to the extent caused by the negligence, willful misconduct or omissions of Agency during the performance of this Agreement.
- 11. **Term.** This Agreement shall be effective as of January 1, 2012, and shall terminate on December 31, 2012. This Agreement may be terminated prior to that date by either party upon written notice, delivered thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination. If this Agreement is terminated by either party, the County shall pay only for those services actually performed by Agency as verified by the County's audit.

#### **Proposed Program**

Detail functions to be performed by each program.

Crealing and implementing programs geared to curb animal sheller intake, and prevent the euthanasia of adoptable animals is the driving mission of Heartland SPCA. In 2010, more than 20,000 animals entered metro shelters, and over 30% of those animals were euthanized. The sad reality is most of the animals euthanized were adoptable, but the shelters simply ran out of space or did not have the resources to provide those animals with a viable outcome. Heartland SPCA is eager to implement supportive programs to aid in the decline of animals entering and being euthanized in Jackson County shelters, while also providing affordable spay/neuter and veterinary wellness services to the community. Our HERO (Humane Education and Resource Office) program will larget areas in Jackson County where we know the mejority of shelter intakes/animal control calls originate.

Since 2007, over 25,000 spay/neuter surgeries have been performed at our facility. These spay/neuter initiatives have prevented thousands of unwanted litters from being born, thereby eliminating the chance that those litters would enter our area shelters. Continuing this trend to increase spay/neuter compliance will not only improve the lives of animals and citizens, but will provide a financial benefit to the city as it relates to decreased shelter intakes. Support in the field to educate pet owners and provide them with necessary resources to keep the pet in the home is an additional program component.


While It is important to recognize the improvements to animal welfare that have been made across the metro the last several years, we still have a long way to go. In 2010, approximately 5,900 animals were euthanized in Jackson County shelters, which accounts formore than 90% of the total number of animals euthanized across the Kansas Cily Metro area (data includes Animal Haven, Independence Animal Control, Kansas Cily, Missouri Animal Control, Lee's Summit Animal Control, and Wayside Walfs). Heartland SPCA has initiated and would like to grow the following programs in Jackson County as a way to drive down the number of shelter intakes and animals euthanized.

The HERO Program is an outreach initiative designed to educate pet owners about responsible pet ownership, provide resources such as food, appropriate outdoor sheller, medical care, and other necessary supplies, while also working with the pet owner to have their animals spayed or neutered. HERO program staff will be out in the field four days a week, responding to calls for assistance, while also targeting zip codes where the majority of animal control calls and shelter intakes occur. This program also targets feral and free roaming cat populations to get colonles spayed/neutered and mitigate nuisance calls/issues.

Our high-quality/low-cost spay and neuter program provides affordable (or free) services to pet owners. In addition, our transport services make it easy for communities or entire neighborhoods to participate. Our staff will pick the animals up, take them to Heartland SPCA Animal Medical Center for surgery, and deliver the animals back to the drop-off location the next day for owner pick-up. In the last year, Heartland SPCA performed spay/neuter surgeries for 1,156 Jackson County animals. We would like to double that number in the next year.

In January of 2011, we launched our high-quality/low-cost veterinary wellness program. This program provides an affordable option for pets who need medical attention, but whose owners have limited financial resources. No longer will pet owners have to consider surrendering their pet to a shelter as an option because they cannot afford medical care. Since the clinic started, we have provided veterinary services to nearly 600 Jackson County pets.

Hearland SPCA is requesting funding to help provide the services mentioned above to cilizens in Jackson County, focusing in particular on the zip codes 64055, 64056, 64057, 64124, 64125, 64126, 64127, 64128, 64130, 64132 in Jackson County. In 2010, the operating budget to support the HERO/Spay and Neuter Programs was nearly \$170,000. 2011 has been in-line with 2010's budget, and projections for 2012 are expected slightly higher. As a result of a grant specifically focused on the feral cat challenge in Independence, we expect to allocate significantly more resources to Jackson County in 2012. With financial support from the county, we can expand the program and create a noticeable impact in Jackson County. We are requesting the county consider providing \$80,000 in funding to support these critical, life-saving programs.



Programs and services provided by Heartland SPCA serve all Kansas City Metro communities. While the HERO program would be targeted specifically to the low income areas of the city, our plan is to focus on those areas of the community where the greatest need is identified. Additionally, in 2012 our goal is to increase our presence in eastern Jackson County, helping to reduce the number of unwanted litters born into this community through our spay/neuter initiatives, increase the quality of care provided to pets by their owners through our affordable velerinary care program, and provide resources necessary to keep pets in their homes with their owners thereby reducing shelter intakes. The primary targeted zip codes in eastern Jackson County for the HERO program, spay/neuter outreach and raising awareness to affordable veterinary care include 64055, 64056, 64057.

#### **Fund Separation**

Every client served by Heartland SPCA is tracked in our computer database. We can generate reports that outline program penetration and success by county. Such reports are reviewed on a monthly basis. All calls for field services (i.e. HERO program) will also be tracked by city/county, and will be reviewed on a monthly basis. Funds received from Jackson County will aid in marketing/promoting programs in targeted Jackson County zip codes, and will allow us to provide low-cost spay/neuter services and veterinary wellness to Jackson County residents. 65% of the funding received from Jackson County will be directly tied to programs and services, and the remaining 35% to support staffing necessary to implement the programs. The staffing component is increased to 2012 as additional staff will be needed to support the increased focus on the program expansion planned for 2012.

## Approach & Method

- 1. Increase spay/neuter awareness and compliance, thereby reducing the number of unwanted litters born, and eliminating the need for those animals to require future housing in area animal shelters.
- 2. Provide affordable veterinary care to the public. There is a significant need for affordable medical care for companion animals. Often times the public is forced to surrender their pet to the shelter, or have him/her euthanized because they cannot afford medical care - even more so given the current economic status. Our programs are geared to help provide the services and resources necessary to keep the pet in the home with his/her owner.
- 3. Educate public on the basic elements of responsible pet care and ownership. We will meet face-to-face with citizens to provide them with the tools they need to provide their animals with the most appropriate are. Our education program will also be centered around feral and free roaming cat iniliatives, providing alternative solutions to current practice of trap, and euthanize.

Detail specific methods you will use to achieve these objectives,

Heartland SPCA has partnered with Entercom Radio to market the programs and services we offer. We will also have an education officer in the field five days a week, to carry out face-to-face marketing and awareness. Our officer will be cultivating relationships in the community to gain support of the program's fundamental goals, as well as to help raise donations for necessary supplies to carry out the program.

Heartland SPCA will also provide volume transport services for communities, neighborhoods, or organizations for which Iransportation is a challenge,

Our facillly has the capacity to perform 80+ spay/neuter services per day, and our doctors can see 16+ appointments per day. The board of Heartland SPCA, our staff, and our volunteers are all committed to doing what is necessary to create a more responsible and humane community for the animals and citizens in the Kansas City Metro.

We also hope to work with the Jackson County Community Development offices to help raise awareness and advertise for program specials offered throughout the year.
