Dear Mr. Sanders,

In 2009, Blitz, a 2 ½ year AKC registered German Shepherd was fully donated to the Sheriff's Office by the Heart of America Kennel Club for use as a K-9 officer. Blitz was initially assigned to Deputy Jeremy Glines from May of 2009 until September of 2012 when he was reassigned to Deputy John Beggs.

Now, at 8 ½ years old, Blitz' handler, Deputy John Beggs, resigned from the Sheriff's Office. In addition, since Blitz is very close to retirement himself as law enforcement K-9s typically have a 'working career' of approximately 8-9 years of age. Therefore, it would not be cost effective to assign Blitz to another handler and retrain both the dog and new handler.

Chapter 11 section 1139 of the Jackson County Code states:

Disposition of Sheriff's Canine Unit Dogs

When the county acquires a dog for use by the Sheriff's Department's canine unit, the county's acquisition cost shall be documented. Thereafter the deputy sheriff assigned as the dog's handler may take ownership of the dog upon reimbursement to the county of its acquisition cost when:

- a) the dog is retired or relieved from duty due to age or injury; or
- b) the handler retires or is transferred or promoted out of the canine unit and the sheriff has determined that retraining the dog for another handler would not be cost effective. (Ord. 2192, Eff. 4/8/93)

Taking all of this into consideration, I believe it is in the interest of Jackson County and Blitz, to allow Deputy John Beggs to retain Blitz. Since there were no acquisition costs associated with Blitz, allowing this asset to be transferred would be at no cost to the county as well.

K-9 Unit Welcomes New 'Deputy'

JUNE 22, 2009 -- Jackson County Deputy Jeremy Glines has a new partner. His full name is quite a mouthful: Blitz Von Der Furcht Innen. Fortunately, you need not call him "Deputy Von Der Furcht Innen." Just "Blitz," will do.

Blitz, a 70-pound German Shepherd, formally joined the Jackson County Sheriff's K-9 Unit May 27, when Sheriff Mike Sharp accepted the dog from the Heart of America Kennel Club during a meeting at The Veterinary Specialty and Emergency Center in Overland Park, Kansas. Blitz, at 2 years old, is young enough to have about a six to eight-year career with the Sheriff's Office ahead of him. Gline and Blitz actually started working together some time ago, having passed their official certification testing May 18.

"Deputy Glines and his new partner, Blitz, have already recovered over 40 pounds of narcotics in their short time as a team," Sheriff Sharp pointed out May 27.

Dual-Propose Dog

A fully trained police dog can cost around \$10,000, and Blitz is a dual-purpose dog, trained in both narcotics detection and patrol support. With the Sheriff's Office being no exception to Jackson County government's tight budgets, Sheriff Sharp was extremely grateful for the Kennel Club's donation of Blitz, saying, "This is incredibly generous. I really can't say thank you too many times."

The Kennel Club used funds raised through its annual dog shows to purchase Blitz. The Club's call to the Sheriff's Office couldn't have come at a better time.

"Blitz is joining our force just as the one dog in our K-9 Unit was retiring," Sharp said. (The Sheriff is exploring potential funding sources for a second police dog.)

Up To The Task

Blitz has big paw prints to fill. Glines' former partner, Aapie Von Austerberg, a female German Shepherd specializing as an explosive patrol dog, is now retired. Aapie, a 9½-

year-old, served the Jackson County Sheriff's Office with distinction for more than six years.

Glines is confident his new partner is up to the task.

Glines and Blitz work four 6:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. shifts a week. They're on call to serve any agency in Jackson County that might need their services.

When off-duty, Blitz lives at Glines' house in an outdoor kennel. As for Glines' old four-legged partner, Aapie, the Jackson County Deputy still gets to spend plenty of time with her. She has retired to a life of leisure inside the Glines' home.
