

AGREEMENT
(Housing Resources Commission)

THIS AGREEMENT, made by and between **JACKSON COUNTY, MISSOURI**, a Constitutional Home Rule Charter County of the First Class of the State of Missouri, acting by and through its **Housing Resources Commission**, hereinafter referred to as "the County" and a Missouri not-for-profit corporation, **MOTHER'S REFUGE, 14400 E. 42ND STREET, STE. 220, INDEPENDENCE, MO 64055**, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor".

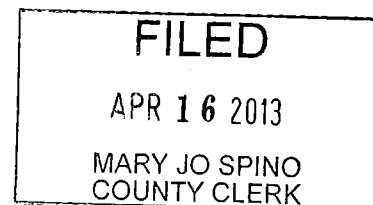
WHEREAS, on June 4, 1991, the voters of Jackson County authorized the County Legislature to impose a \$3.00 user fee on all instruments recorded with the County's Department of Records, the proceeds of which fee is to be used to provide funds for assistance to homeless persons; and,

WHEREAS, the County actually imposed said fee by Ordinance No. 1986, dated June 10, 1991; and,

WHEREAS, by Ordinance No. 2030, dated September 3, 1991, the Legislature created the Housing Resources Commission and designated said Commission as the agency of the County responsible for determining the allocation and distribution of the proceeds of the user fee; and,

WHEREAS, the Commission has reviewed Contractor's proposal for the expenditure of County user fee funds for the purpose of providing assistance to homeless persons in Jackson County; and,

WHEREAS, the Commission has determined that it is in the best interests of the



County's citizens to provide funding to Contractor according to the terms and conditions hereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between the parties as follows:

1. **SERVICES.** Contractor shall use the proceeds of this Agreement solely for the purpose of providing assistance to homeless persons in Jackson County, Missouri. Contractor agrees to use the funds as set out on the Housing Resources Commission Funding Request Form, attached hereto as Exhibit A.
2. **PAYMENT.** The County shall pay to Contractor a total amount not to exceed \$20,000.00 for the purpose of providing assistance to homeless persons in Jackson County, Missouri. One quarter of this sum, or \$5,000.00, shall be paid to Contractor on a quarterly basis for the periods ending March 31, 2013, June 30, 2013, September 30, 2013, and December 31, 2013, upon receipt of Contractor's invoice and supporting documentation, provided that Contractor has submitted to the County the report(s) required under Paragraph 3 and Paragraph 5 hereof. Each quarter's payment will be issued after Contractor has submitted the required invoices and supporting documentation for reimbursement.
3. **REPORTS/OTHER DOCUMENTATION.** Under this Agreement, Contractor shall submit appropriate reports, including copies of invoices and cancelled checks and/or a copy of the face of the check and corresponding bank statements and other documentation, as requested by the Housing Resources Commission staff to show that funds paid to Contractor by the County are being used for the purpose of providing assistance to homeless persons in Jackson County, Missouri. If the reports submitted

do not satisfactorily demonstrate appropriate expenditures of County funds, payments are subject to downward adjustment to reflect the amounts actually spent on allowable services provided during the previous quarter. The final request for payment shall include a Quarterly Report and an Annual Report, which shall set out the program objectives and accomplishments, and a final reconciliation of funds. The Annual Report shall be submitted no later than January 31, 2014. Section 67.1071, R.S.Mo., specifically requires the Annual Report to include "statistics on the number of persons served by the agency, and shall include the results of an independent audit of expenditures of funds received by Contractor pursuant to this Agreement. Failure to submit said reports, including the Annual Report, shall result in the loss of future funding by the County.

4. **MAINTENANCE OF ACCOUNTS.** The parties recognize that this funding by the County serves to improve the quality and effectiveness of homelessness programs in Jackson County, Missouri. It is, therefore, declared as the express intent of the parties that the services to be rendered hereunder shall be in addition to those deemed necessary and required to maintain the efficient and effective operation of Contractor in its normal duties, and that none of the funds paid by the County pursuant to this Agreement shall serve to reduce any funds budgeted, or to be budgeted, by Contractor for operations as they exist at the time of this Agreement. Contractor shall not commingle the County's funds and shall keep funds received under this Agreement separate from all other Contractor funds and accounts until expended as herein provided.

5. **SUBMISSION OF DOCUMENTS.** No payment shall be made under this

Agreement unless Contractor shall have submitted to the County's Director of Finance and Purchasing: (1) a written proposal setting out in detail the intended use of the County's funding, including the target population to be served; (2) Contractor's IRS Form 990 from the previous fiscal or calendar year; (3) a statement of Contractor's total budget for its most recent fiscal year; and (4) a detailed explanation of actual expenditures of the County's funds (pertains to final payments and payments on contracts for future years). If Contractor has previously received funding from the County, to be eligible for future payments, Contractor must submit either an audited financial statement for Contractor's most-recent fiscal or calendar year by March 31 of the following year, or a certified public accountant's program audit of the County's funds by January 31 of the following year. Any documents described herein which were submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing as a part of an application for funding need not be resubmitted to qualify for payment. No payment shall be made if Contractor is out of compliance on any other County contract, or has not paid county taxes on all properties owned by Contractor and assessed by the County.

6. **AUDIT.** The parties agree that the County may, for any reason and at any given time, examine and audit the books and records of Contractor pertaining to its finances and operations. Further, Contractor agrees to establish and adopt such accounting standards and forms as recommended by the County prior to receipt of the County's first distribution of funds under the terms of this Agreement. The forms used to document expenditure of these funds may be changed from time to time by the County.

7. **DEFAULT.** If Contractor shall default in the performance or observation of any

covenant, term or condition herein contained to be performed by Contractor, the County shall give Contractor ten days written notice, setting forth the default. If said default shall continue and not be corrected by Contractor within ten days after receipt of notice from the County, the County may, at its election, terminate this Agreement and withhold any payments not yet made to Contractor. Said election shall not, in any way, limit the County's rights to sue for breach of this Agreement.

8. **TERM.** The term of this Agreement shall commence January 1, 2013, and shall continue until December 31, 2013.

9. **LIABILITY.** No party to this Agreement shall assume any liability for the acts of the other party, its officers, agents, or employees.

10. **CONFLICT OF INTEREST.** Contractor warrants that no officer or employee of the County, whether elected or appointed, shall, in any manner whatsoever, be interested in or receive any benefit from the profits or emoluments of this Agreement.

11. **EMPLOYMENT OF UNAUTHORIZED ALIENS PROHIBITED.** Pursuant to §285.530.1, RSMo, Contractor assures that it does not knowingly employ, hire for employment, or continue to employ an unauthorized alien to perform work within the State of Missouri and/or Jackson County, and shall affirm, by sworn affidavit and provision of documentation, its enrollment and participation in a federal work authorization program with respect to the employees working in connection with the contracted services. Further, Contractor shall sign an affidavit, attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit B, affirming that it does not knowingly employ any person who is an unauthorized alien in connection with the contracted services.

12. **INFORMATIONAL REPORTING.** A representative of Contractor shall attend meetings of the County Legislature and the Housing Resources Commission when so requested by either of the above-referenced entities. The representative shall be prepared to answer any questions concerning payments made pursuant to this Agreement.

13. **TERMINATION.** Except as provided in Paragraphs 7 and 16 hereof, this Agreement may be terminated by either of the parties upon thirty days written notice to the other party.

14. **SURPLUS FUNDS.** Any surplus funds not spent at the end of this Agreement term shall be returned to the County by the fifteenth of the month following the termination of this Agreement. These funds shall not be subject to reappropriation. The term "surplus funds" refers only to those funds that have not been committed for costs or purposes by purchase order, contract, or other formal documentation within the Agreement term.

15. **PERFORMANCE REVIEW.** The performance of this Agreement shall be subject to review by the County or its designated agent. The County's Housing Resources Commission Director shall review the performance of this Agreement according to his/her responsibilities. Contractor agrees to file all required forms with the Housing Resources Commission Director. The Housing Resources Commission may provide to Contractor a list identifying specific areas funded by the proceeds of this Agreement to be reviewed or audited. The Housing Resources Commission and Contractor shall agree on the definition and scope of a review audit of each specific area

identified. Contractor shall conduct internal review of each specific area identified and shall provide its findings to the Commission. The parties recognize that all books, records, accounts, and any other documents in the possession of the County relative to the funding of this Agreement, are public records and open for inspection and photocopying in accordance with Chapter 610, R.S.Mo.

16. **REMEDIES FOR BREACH.** Contractor agrees to faithfully observe and perform all of the terms, provisions, and requirements of this Agreement, and Contractor's failure to do so constitutes a breach of this Agreement. In such event, Contractor consents and agrees as follows:

- A. The County may, without prior notice to Contractor, immediately terminate this Agreement; and
- B. The County shall be entitled to collect from Contractor all payments made by the County to Contractor for which Contractor has not yet rendered services in accordance with this Agreement, and to collect the County's reasonable attorney's fees, court costs and service fees if it is necessary to bring action to recover such payments.

17. **SEVERABILITY.** If any covenant or other provision of this Agreement is invalid, or incapable of being enforced by reason of any rule of law or public policy, all other conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall, nevertheless, remain in full force and effect; and no covenant or provision shall be deemed dependent upon any other covenant or provision unless so expressed herein.

18. **ASSIGNMENT.** Contractor shall not assign any portion or the whole of this

Agreement without the prior written consent of the County.

19. **DISCONTINUANCE OF PROGRAM.** In the event Contractor should elect to discontinue this program, or file for bankruptcy, or participate in a reorganization, or go out of existence, or should a court of competent jurisdiction render a final decision in any way invalidating this Agreement or its purposes, Contractor shall remit any proceeds of this Agreement as are unexpended to the County.

20. **APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.** Contractor and the County recognize that the County intends to satisfy its financial obligation to Contractor hereunder out of funds annually appropriated for that purpose by the County. County promises and covenants to make its best efforts to appropriate funds in accordance with this Agreement. In the event no funds or insufficient funds are appropriated and budgeted, or are otherwise unavailable by any means whatsoever for payment due hereunder, County shall immediately notify Contractor of this occurrence and this Agreement shall terminate on the last day for which appropriations were received, without penalty or expense to the County of any kind whatsoever, except as to the portions of the payment amounts herein agreed upon for which funds shall have been appropriated and budgeted or are otherwise available, or at any time after the last date that County has paid for the Services, if earlier.

County further agrees:

a. That any funds authorized or appropriated for services rendered under this Agreement shall be applied to the payments hereunder until all such funds are exhausted.

b. That County will use its best efforts to obtain authorization and appropriation of such funds including, without limitation, the inclusion in its annual budget, a request for adequate funds to meet its obligation under this Agreement in full.

21. **CONFIDENTIALITY.** Contractor's records concerning the identities of those participating in its programs shall be strictly confidential; the County shall be entitled to examine said records in performing its audit and review functions, but shall not disclose said identities to any third party in any fashion.

22. **COMPLIANCE WITH RFP.** At all times in connection with the performance of its services hereunder, Contractor agrees to comply with and abide by the General Conditions, Specifications, and Guidelines contained in the County's RFP No. 94-12. Failure to comply with the terms of the RFP shall be a breach, remediable under Paragraph 16 hereof. In the event of a conflict between any provision of this Agreement and a provision of the County's RFP No. 94-12, the provision of this Agreement shall govern.

23. **INDEMNIFICATION.** Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold the County harmless from any and all claims, liabilities, damages, and costs (including reasonable attorney's fees directly related thereto) including but not limited to violation of civil rights and/or bodily injury to or death of any person and for damage to or destruction of property if and to the extent caused by the negligence, willful misconduct or omissions of Contractor during the performance of this Agreement.

24. **INCORPORATION.** This Agreement incorporates the entire understanding and agreement of the parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the County and Contractor have executed this Agreement this 16th day of April, 2013.

Agency History/Background

Mother's Refuge has provided a residential home for more than 1,250 homeless, pregnant and parenting young women and babies since incorporating in 1987. We provide shelter, access to medical care, case management, transportation, life-skills training and education to homeless, at-risk teenagers. They can enter our residential program anytime during their pregnancy and remain in our home up to one year post-partum with their baby. We then help them obtain more stable, permanent housing and provide follow-up care in our Aftercare Transitional Living program. This makes us a unique homeless shelter in the Jackson County area.

Mother's Refuge is licensed for 18 girls and babies by the Missouri Children's Services as a residential maternity home located at 2820 S. 291 Hwy. Frontage Rd., Independence, MO, Jackson County. This location is a temporary site until we are able to rebuild in the next year at our permanent site located at 3721 Delridge, Independence, MO, Jackson County, which caught on fire October 8, 2012. Last year we provided 3,990 bed nights for 41 homeless teenagers and babies in our residential program in Jackson County. We also provided case management and support for 62 clients in our Aftercare Transitional Living program.

We provide access to emergency shelter and referrals to those who do not fit our criteria by working closely with other community resources. We involve the private sector in strategic collaboration in serving the homeless population by incorporating volunteers, mentors and other businesses and community members in planning ways to reach the homeless and provide comprehensive services. We also work with other social service agencies to combat homelessness by attending coalition meetings, seminars and informational forums. Some of the other agencies include but are not limited to the Missouri Alliance, the Jackson County Homeless Coalition, Missouri Child Health Coalition, and the Healthcare Foundation of Greater Kansas City.

Our mission is to shelter and educate homeless, pregnant and parenting young women by providing comprehensive services, empowering them to make successful life decisions for themselves and their babies. The need for our services is both great and urgent. Statistics from the United States Department of Health show that every 26 seconds another adolescent becomes pregnant, and every 56 seconds an adolescent gives birth. Homeless single mothers with young children comprise one of the fastest growing groups of the homeless in the Kansas City area. Young women from all ethnic groups are affected. They have little or no financial resources or family support. Our residents meet the definition of poverty established by the federal government. This population is uninsured and underserved.

The criterion for entering our program is young ladies must be 19 years of age or younger, pregnant and have no safe place to reside. In many cases, they are fending on the streets of Jackson County by themselves. Most often, they come from extremely dysfunctional families or they have no parents or guardian. They have run out of options or they would not consider living in a shelter.

One homeless, pregnant teenager we were able to help this past year, was literally living on the streets of Jackson County, pregnant, without money or a job and no contact with her family. She was able to seek refuge at our home, receive medical care she desperately needed and learn parenting and life skills to become an independent, successful mother and member of our community. She gave birth to a healthy baby girl, completed her GED, and graduated with her CNA certificate. She now lives independently and has been reunited with her grandmother and aunt.

A recent financial study, administered by the State of Missouri, found that the cost of housing and providing comprehensive services to pregnant and parenting teens was \$136.28 per day. Our services to the homeless women we serve include, but are not limited to housing, 24-hour supervision and security, food, clothing, access to public education, counseling, transportation, access to medical care, practical life-skill classes, job training, computer technology, childcare, diapers and infant supplies, utilities, linens, personal hygiene items and access to other community resources. We offer emergency bed nights for those that only need a shelter for one day to two weeks. However, most of our clients need and wish to enter our long-term comprehensive program that offers a curriculum to teach and motivate our clients to become independent and self-reliant.

High emphasis is placed on completing their education, whether it is public school or obtaining a GED. According to the Annie E. Casey Foundation only an estimated 33 percent of teen mothers eventually graduate from high school with only 1.5 percent receiving a college degree by the time they reach 30 years of age. We have implemented reading and homework programs to assist in our residents' educational pursuit. The young moms are taught to make healthy decisions for themselves and their unborn child while attending and participating in our practical living classes. We help them locate a long-term living arrangement while securing daycare for their babies. Our goal is for each girl to obtain self-sufficiency, earn their diploma or GED, and learn how to be a good mother while living in a safe, stable home free from abuse.

Proposed Program

Bed Nights--\$20,000 Mother's Refuge shelters homeless, pregnant and parenting teenagers and their babies in a residential, home-like shelter. The National Alliance to End Homelessness reports there are more than one million homeless youths. We provide housing, 24-hour supervision and security, case-management, counseling, food, clothing, transportation, baby supplies, lights, gas, linens, soap, access to proper medical care, etc. All residents in our program must also be enrolled in high school, community college or attend GED classes. In addition, each client attends our practical life-skills program.

The young mothers are able to stay in our home up to one year after her baby is born. We find this to be an exceptionally vulnerable time for these new moms. Not only are they experiencing many bodily changes but are dealing with the realization of being responsible for another person. They are all alone with nowhere to turn. During that time we assist them in finding a more permanent home and they enter into our Transitional Aftercare Living program and we continue to provide support and individualized case management.

Statistics by the Mid-America Assistance Coalition reports, "The Jackson County area continues to have the greatest number of emergency assistance and homeless service recipients in the Kansas City metropolitan region. According to the U.S. Census Bureau statistics, there are nearly 80,500 people in Jackson County living in poverty. Of these, nearly 20,500 are children 0-17 years of age. This is approximately 17 percent of all children living in the county." The report was compiled from information submitted by 235 social service agencies helping area low-income and homeless residents.

We can attest to these facts. Mother's Refuge receives on an average of 50 or more calls per month from desperate women seeking shelter and assistance. The vast majority of our calls are from Jackson County. Mother's Refuge has had a 44 percent increase in the number of pregnant teenagers we have assisted during the past three years. Many of these young ladies are among the "hidden homeless", because they are staying night to night with different friends, relatives, complete strangers, or in some cases, literally living on the streets of Jackson County. The need for our services has never been greater, not only to provide the necessities of shelter but the need for a program such as ours that provides a safe, secure environment and educational programs to enhance the young girls' lives in order to prevent future homelessness.

We maintain the confidentiality of all information that would identify individuals served by Mother's Refuge. Our services are offered specifically to homeless or near-homeless pregnant teenagers who are residents of Jackson County, Missouri. We offer emergency short-term and long-term shelter for the homeless in our community. We coordinate with other community resources to provide the most efficient and comprehensive services for homeless, pregnant and parenting teenagers and their babies.

We recently helped one young lady who came to our shelter that had no permanent place to live. She didn't know who her father was. Her mother was a drug addict and dropped her off at her grandmother's house when she was a baby. When she was 13- years old her grandmother passed away and she was shuffled around to relatives without a permanent home. She came to us four months pregnant and had not received any medical care for her pregnancy. We were able to help her receive the necessary medical treatment as well as provide the basic necessities of a safe, secure home. We are happy to report she now is a proud mother of a healthy baby girl; she obtained her high school diploma while living at our home and is attending community college while living independently. She thanked us for being there when she had nowhere else to turn. She said there was no way she would have been able to finish high school without the security and support of Mother's Refuge. She said she was so thankful for a safe home, food to eat and support to reach her goals. She finally feels like she is on the right path with a healthy and positive extended family at Mother's Refuge. This is one of many stories of the disadvantaged youth we provide bed nights for.

There are many more homeless, pregnant teenagers and babies that need our help. That is why it is of utmost importance we continue providing shelter for homeless teens and infants in Jackson County. We are requesting a \$10,000 match for 400 bed nights from Jackson County. We are one of the few maternity homes licensed by the state of Missouri to house both pregnant and parenting teenagers. Our 25-year history of providing services for homeless, pregnant teens demonstrates our commitment and stability to continue supporting this underserved population. We seek your financial support in continuing to provide bed nights for this at-risk, homeless population.

Target Population

Our target population is homeless, at-risk pregnant and parenting teenagers 19-years of age or younger. The criterion for entering our program is they must have no safe or permanent place to reside. Homeless means the parents, boyfriend or friends have asked them to leave their home, they have dysfunctional families, or they have no parents or guardian. Some are fending on the streets by themselves. Their backgrounds vary, but most are from homes that include physical, emotional, sexual, drug, and alcohol abuse, prostitution or families involved in crime. They have run out of options or would not consider living in a shelter.

In the past three years, out of the 144 homeless women we served, 28 were 16-years of age or younger. And some as young as 14-years old that were pregnant and unable to live on their own. There are particular issues in working with the younger teen population. They cannot legally sign contracts and are unable to rent an apartment or buy an automobile, sign themselves into clinics or hospitals, or get utilities installed in their name. They lack identification and maturity. Hospitals consider pregnant girls emancipated, but legally they are not. Girls less than 17-years old cannot speak to their health insurance companies due to age, or attend a dentist appointment by themselves.

Mother's Refuge does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, handicap, sexual orientation or geographical location. The vast majority of residents are from the Jackson County area. They meet the definition of poverty set by the federal government. They have little or no financial resources or family support. This population is uninsured and underserved.

The United States has the highest rate of teen pregnancy throughout the western industrialized world, according to PregnancyInfo.net. Even though recent reports state that teen pregnancies have

decreased by two-percent, the number of homeless, pregnant teenagers has increased. It is estimated that 80 percent of teen mothers end up on welfare; they are less likely to finish high school or attend college; and their children are more likely to be abused, end up in prison or become unwed teen parents themselves. Most of the pregnant young ladies that enter our program do not have health insurance, has not received pre-natal care, are not attending school, and are living under dire circumstances.

One such young lady, Amber (name has been changed), had no safe place to go when she entered Mother's Refuge. Her mother had been murdered by a jealous boyfriend and her father was in prison for molesting Amber. She was 15-years old and pregnant; the aunt she lived with was abusive and didn't want Amber in her home because she was pregnant. She called us desperate for help. While at Mother's Refuge she continued her education and has received above average grades, received medical care and gave birth to a healthy baby girl. She learned parenting and life skills, received therapy and worked toward goals of a life free from abuse. She told a staff member, "When I called for help I really thought my life would always be terrible and there was no hope for my future. I thought I would have to live on the streets but now I have hope. I see that there are people who care and will help me and my baby make a new life. You do believe in me and I can do it, even without my parents." There are many more Amber's in this community that are in need of the services and encouragement we provide.

Service Delivery Area

Mother's Refuge is located in Independence, Jackson County, Missouri. We will provide bed nights to the homeless, pregnant and parenting young women and babies living in this area. Occasionally, we receive calls outside of Jackson County and if we have room we will accept young moms into our program but they must agree to move to our shelter in Jackson County and work towards a life of independence and self-sufficiency. Most continue to reside in the area after they complete our program to contribute and give back to the Jackson County community.

Fund Separation

A complete initial assessment is conducted by our case management staff to ensure the validity of all potential residential clients. Prior address, income verification and family background is diligently researched for accuracy and verified. All homeless, pregnant and parenting teenagers and babies only receive the benefit of Jackson County funding while residing in our shelter located in Independence, Jackson County, Missouri. Funding through this grant opportunity is terminated upon completion of our residential program. This funding is solely used to provide shelter bed nights for homeless young women in Jackson County that live in our shelter.

Approach & Method

1. Provide short-term emergency shelter to homeless, pregnant and parenting teenagers.
2. Provide long-term emergency shelter to homeless, pregnant and parenting teenagers and babies.
3. Provide bed nights and comprehensive services which help homeless teenagers obtain more permanent housing at the completion of our residential program. To assist her with obtaining appropriate, safe housing, employment, continued follow-up and support for one year after successfully completing our residential program.

Detail specific methods you will use to achieve these objectives.

Our method is first to provide a loving, safe, environment for our clients. Most of our girls come from extremely dysfunctional homes so providing a home-like atmosphere is important. The majority have never been exposed to a safe-family environment. They have often been the victim of physical, verbal or sexual abuse. So our objective is to provide bed-nights in a safe family-like setting along with all the basic necessities of food, clothing, utilities, personal hygiene items, baby supplies, etc.

We work with other area resources, medical personnel, schools and counselors to reach homeless, pregnant teenagers that are in need of a safe place to reside. We offer both short and long-term support depending on the circumstances and needs of each client. We work closely with other organizations to help the teenagers deliver healthy babies, learn parenting and life-skills and obtain more permanent housing. We mail information to area resources, hold open houses, advertise on the internet, host a website, facebook page, twitter account, and are listed in various resource books and referral agencies.

Mother's Refuge offers individual strength-based case management for each client. We help the homeless teen develop a plan of action that will enable the young woman to acquire skills and resources needed to become self-sufficient. Together we develop her educational goals, discuss the skills needed to be self-sufficient once she enters into transitional living, and develop a plan of action to seek and learn the skills she will need. We talk about the significance of providing a stable environment for herself and her baby. We help her honestly evaluate the behavior and influence of the significant

people and relatives in her life. Our goal is to help her make wise decisions about destructive influences and about future possibilities.

Our case managers help the homeless teenagers obtain more permanent housing with the help of other area agencies and businesses. Once a girl leaves our program she enters into our Aftercare Transitional Living program. We provide case management for up to one year with personal contacts, home-visits, support and counseling, and telephone calls as well as provide her with basic necessities. We will continue to maintain a home as we have for 25-years, retain qualified staff, and obtain needed items to provide services.

We are constantly evaluating the success of our program. Our staff is diligent in making sure that surrounding community resources have our information so that any homeless pregnant teenager who needs a safe place to stay can come to our facility as soon as possible. After a young lady moves in, our staff begins the process of establishing a relationship with her, and making long-term goals and education plans. Our hope for every resident is that she follows through with her long-term goals that she set when she first arrived, and that she while living at Mother's Refuge she learns how to become a successful mother and an independent young woman who can learn to support herself and her child . . . without government assistance.

Mental Health

We accept homeless, pregnant teenagers, many who are struggling with mental health issues. These residents struggle daily with their issues, especially during pregnancy and while caring for a newborn. Our staff works closely with our residents on anger management, taking time alone to journal, or spending time doing something that helps them relax. This year we served a resident who would become easily overwhelmed with her infant, or would become easily angered by the other residents. Staff found that gardening helped her to calm down and think her problems through. She worked in our house garden throughout the spring and summer and was very proud of her accomplishment. At the same time she was allowed time to process through her issues and feelings in a way that was perfect for her.

Our case managers meet with clients on a daily basis. They assist them in working through past abuse issues and current personal issues. They help clients find solutions and healthy coping mechanisms. They ensure they receive any needed mental health medication and professional assistance. Clients are also partnered with adult mentors for additional emotional support.

Programs we have in place or utilize to address mental health issues for the homeless population.

We work very closely with other community resources who serve people with mental health issues specifically. Comprehensive Mental Health Services assists Mother's Refuge when needed with any residents who are suffering with severe mental health issues. Truman Medical Center Lakewood also has a great facility where we have transported many residents when their needs went beyond our abilities to serve them. Our residents meet with an outside professional counselor once a week for more intense therapy. They attend classes about depression, anger management, abuse and addiction recovery and other mental health issues. Our Case Managers attend doctor's appointments with the residents to make sure that if they do have mental health issues that our staff is fully aware of the issue and they can follow-up and properly dispense any prescribed medications. We provide additional emotional assistance through our mentorship program, interaction with various church and civic groups, volunteers and teachers. We also work closely with the Missouri Children's Division to ensure the safety of all homeless teens and babies.

WORK AUTHORIZATION AFFIDAVIT

As a condition for any service provided to the County, a business entity shall, by sworn affidavit and provision of documentation, affirm its enrollment and participation in a federal work authorization program with respect to the employees working in connection with the contracted services.

Business entity, as defined in section 285.525, RSMo pertaining to section 285.530, RSMo, is any person or group of persons performing or engaging in any activity, enterprise, profession, or occupation for gain, benefit, advantage, or livelihood. The term "business entity" shall include but not be limited to self-employed individuals, partnerships, corporations, contractors, and subcontractors. The term "business entity" shall include any business entity that possesses a business permit, license, or tax certificate issued by the state, any business entity that is exempt by law from obtaining such a business permit, and any business entity that is operating unlawfully without such a business permit.

Every such business entity shall complete the following affidavit affirming that it does not knowingly employ any person who is an unauthorized alien in connection with the contracted services. The completed affidavit must be returned as a part of the contract documentation.

This affidavit affirms that **Mothers Refuge**, is enrolled in, and is currently participating in, E-verify or any other equivalent electronic verification of work authorization operated by the United States Department of Homeland Security under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (IRCA); and, **Mothers Refuge**, does not knowingly employ any person who is an unauthorized alien in conjunction with the contracted services.

In Affirmation thereof, the facts stated above are true and correct. (The undersigned understands that false statements made in this filing are subject to the penalties provided under section 575.040, RSMo.)
