COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

AN AGREEMENT by and between JACKSON COUNTY, MISSOURI, hereinafter called "the County" and HOMELESS SERVICES COALITION OF GREATER KANSAS CITY, 3200 Wayne Avenue, Ste. 202, Kansas City, MO 64109, hereinafter called "HSCGKC."

WHEREAS, the County and HSCGKC desire to enter into an Agreement to provide funding to be used for homeless services in Jackson County; and,

WHEREAS, the County deems it to be in the best interest of its citizenry to support such programs and activities; and,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and the terms and provisions herein contained, the County and HSCGKC respectively promise, covenant, and agree with each other as follows:

- 1. <u>Services</u>. HSCGKC shall provide services as the Housing and Urban Development designated jurisdictional Continuum of Care for Kansas City, Independence, and Jackson County, as is more fully set out in the proposal attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. Terms of Payment. The County agrees to pay to HSCGKC the total amount of \$32,500.00 in quarterly installments of \$8,125.00 each, with the payment for the first quarter to be made upon execution of this Agreement. The remaining payments shall be made upon the County's receipt of the reports as set forth in paragraph 3 hereof. The County, through the Legislative Auditor, may approve

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adjustments to line items listed in Agency's budget/proposal contained in Exhibit A, in an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the total amount of the Agreement, so long as there is no additional total cost to the County.

- 3. Reports. Within 30 days after the conclusion of each calendar quarter under this Agreement, HSCGKC shall submit a quarterly report, including cancelled checks and/or a copy of the face of the check and corresponding bank statements, invoices, and any other documents requested by the Director of Finance and Purchasing, to establish that the funds provided pursuant to this Agreement were used for the purposes set forth herein. The report for the first quarter shall be submitted within 30 days after the execution of this Agreement. The last quarter's report shall include an annual report which shall summarize all of HSCGKC's activities pursuant to this Agreement. HSCGKC's failure to submit this annual report shall disqualify HSCGKC from future funding by the County.
- 4. <u>Submission of Documents</u>. No payment shall be made under this contract unless the contracting agency shall have submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing (1) a written proposal setting out in detail the intended use of the County's funding, including the target population to be served; (2) the agency's IRS Form 990, from the previous fiscal or calendar year; (3) a statement of the agency's total budget for its most recent fiscal year; and, (4) a detailed explanation of actual expenditures of County funds (pertains to final payments and payments on contracts for future years.) If an agency has previously received County funding, to be eligible for future payments, an agency must submit either an audited financial statement for the

agency's most recent fiscal or calendar year, by March 31 of the following year, or a certified public accountant's program audit of County funds, by January 31 of the following year. Any document described herein which was submitted to the Director of Finance and Purchasing as a part of an application for funding need not be resubmitted to qualify for payment. No payment shall be made if the contract agency is out of compliance on any other County contract.

- 5. **Equal Opportunity**. HSCGKC agrees and assures that no person eligible for services shall on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination for any service funded by this Agreement. Furthermore, HSCGKC agrees and assures that it will provide equal employment opportunities to applicants and employees and will not discriminate against them on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap, veteran status, or age.
- 6. <u>Audit</u>. The County further reserves the right to examine and audit, during reasonable office hours, the books, and records of HSCGKC pertaining to its finances and operations.
- 7. **Default.** If HSCGKC shall default in the performance or observation of any term or condition of this Agreement, the County shall give written notice setting forth the default and the correction required. If said default shall continue and not be corrected by HSCGKC within ten days of its receipt of said notice, the County may, at its election, terminate the Agreement and withhold any payments not yet made. Said election shall not in any way limit the County's right to seek legal redress.

- 8. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. HSCGKC warrants that no officer or employee of the County, whether elected or appointed, shall in any manner whatsoever be interested in or receive any benefit from the profits or emoluments of this Agreement.
- 9. **Severability**. If any covenant or other provision of this Agreement is invalid or incapable of being enforced by reasons of any rule of law or public policy, all other conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect and no covenant or provision shall be deemed dependent upon any other covenant or provision unless so expressed herein.
- any liability and Indemnification. No party to this Agreement shall assume any liability for the acts of any other party to this Agreement, its officers, employees or agents and HSCGKC shall indemnify, defend and hold the County harmless from any and all claims, liabilities, damages, costs (including reasonable attorney's fees directly related thereto) including but not limited to violation of civil rights and/or bodily injury to or death of any person and for damage to or destruction of property if and to the extent caused by the negligence, willful misconduct or omissions of HSCGKC during the performance of this Agreement.
- 11. <u>Term.</u> This Agreement shall be effective January 1, 2012, and shall terminate on December 31, 2012. This Agreement may be terminated prior to that date by either party upon written notice, delivered thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination. If this Agreement is terminated by either party, the County shall pay only for those services actually performed by HSCGKC as verified by the County's audit.
 - 12. <u>Incorporation</u>. This Agreement incorporates the entire understanding

The Homeless Services Coalition of Greater Kansas City (HSCGKC) is the jurisdictional Continuum of Care (CoC) for Kansas City/Independence/Jackson County. HUD recognizes a single entity as the functional provider for each Continuum of Care in the the state of MO. There are 8 MO CoC'sincluding; St. Joseph area, Columbia area, St. Louis City, St. Louis Co, St. Charles Co, Greene Co and Balance of State {101 counties throughout MO that are not a part of a specific continuum}. The HSCGKC/COC performs all of the functions of securing the \$9.4M (2012) in HUD funds that support the work of agencies in Kansas City/Independence/Jackson County that provide direct services to homeless individuals and families. At this time we receive no funding from the cities in the county or the county itself. In 2014 we will be able to expand our application for HUD funding throught the expansion of the homeless funding source, the HEARTH program when it replaces the current funding mechanism, the McKinney-Vento statute. At that point, HSCGKC will be able to reduce it's reliance on the County, the City CDBG pass through funds and other small grants that we struggle to secure because we do not provide direct services. The value of our program is serving as the jurisdictional vehicle to secure over \$9M in monies used by Jackson County agencies to serve the homeless.

- 1. Complete all of the work to obtain, monitor and document the HUD Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) each year that brings \$9.4M to agencies wholly within Jackson Co. MO, for the Continuum of Care (CoC).
- 2. Provide education to the agencies in Jackson Co. on best practices in serving homeless persons/families in their programs. We hold monthly meetings for the CoC and HSCGKC agency members.
- 3. Manage the inter-face between the HSCGKC/CoC agencies and the Mid-America Assistance Coalition (MAAC), the Homeless Management Information System(HMIS) of the KC/Jackson Co CoC.

Detail specific methods you will use to achieve these objectives.

Obj 1) This includes writing the CoC NOFA each fall and conducting training for the agencies to submit their portion of the application. Other responsibilities include conducting 2 Point-in-Time (PIT) Counts each year, completing the HUD required Homeless Inventory Chart (HIC), Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR), the Annual Performance Report (APR) with CoC and non-CoC agencies, the Grants Summary Worksheet (GSW), and providing HEARTH regulation interpretations as they are promulgated by HUD throughout 2012-2013. Obj 2) At these 12 monthly meetings we provide education and training on a wide array of direct services, public impact work, advocacy education, the HUD required workshops on the NOFA/CoC applications, the 2 PIT Count trainings including developing the surveys and censuses required to complete the PIT Counts and conduct quarterly workshops on HEARTH as the regulations are released throughout 2012-2013. Obj 3) HSCGKC has developed a monitoring format that keeps agencies and MAAC in constant communication to improve their outcomes on behalf of our CoC HUD submissions throughout the contract year. As the HMIS provider, MAAC accepts/inputs agency information and then provides it back to agencies in the forms of reports needed to complete the information noted in 1 above. The agencies have experienced difficulty in these transactions for reasons related to information technology issues and a

Indicate performance measures or statistics you will use to demonstrate the success of each program. Each of the above objectives include outcomes measured within the completion of the task. In the NOFA application for instance, success is measured by continued funding for renewal projects plus earning the performance bonus that allows us to submit new projects each year; in 2012 we were awarded \$483,000.00 bonus that allowed us to fund 3 new projects wich will increase our 2012 renewal from \$9.4M to \$9.9M in finding for Jackson Co. agencies serving the homeless. HSCGKC has achieved its bonus for the each of the past 5 CoC cycles, when we achieved hold harmless status for the first time. In the case of the PIT count, we release a public report in March of the count done in the previous January and in August of the count done in the previous July. For the HIC, the AHAR, GIW and the APR, all reports are submitted to HUD, to the City for the Consolidated plan and to the City Housing Dept. as a part of our reporting for/securing the CDBG contract. For the 12 monthly meetings of the HSCGKC/CoC success is measured by 75% attendance at the meetings by the membership; the attendance sheets and minutes are submitted to the MO Housing Development Corp each month. HSCGKC will submit all of these materials, which demonstrate our continued success, to the appropriate Jackson Co. Dept. for review and their monitoring. All of the mentioned reports can be submitted to Jackson Co. for the review of this application.

How will your organization make clients, the public and the media aware of the generous taxpayer funding received from Jackson County? (Please attach any examples) We have been striving to create diverse funding for the agency since I joined HSCGKC in 2010. We will publicize Jackson Co. support in our news releases, in our annual reports, at our yearly fundraiser in Novemebr of each year and in testimony at public hearings we participate in. We will hold a news conference if/when we receive funding since this will be the first time we have received other than federal funding on a pass thorugh basis from the City. We will add the Jackson County symbol/support to all of our printed materials. We will list the support in any other funding requests we make to demonstrate the Couny support for addressing the issue of homelessness in the community.

As the COC funding moves from HUD's McKinney Vento legislation to HEARTH legislation over the next 24-36 months it would be supportive if Jackson Co. reguired its HUD funded COC's and all homeless serving agencies to be active participants in HSCGKC; this is consistent with the federal *Opening Doors* strategy of the United States Inter-agency Council on Homelessness (USICH), the MO Interagency Council on Homelessness (MICH) and HUD HEARTH funding requirements for complete community participation in addressing this issue.
