AN ORDINANCE repealing sections 5000., 5002., 5005., 5011., 5013., 5014., 5015., 5018., 5019., 5020., 5021., 5023., 5024., 5025., 5026., 5028., 5029., 5030., 5035., 5036., 5037., 5038., 5040., 5041., 5042., 5046., 5049., 5059., 5066., 5069., 5071., 5072., 5073., 5080., 5081., 5082., 5083., 5084., 5090., <u>Jackson County Code</u>, 1984, relating to County parks and park operations, and enacting, in lieu thereof, thirty-nine new sections relating to the same subjects.

ORDINANCE NO. 5610, March 28, 2022

INTRODUCED BY Tony Miller, County Legislator

WHEREAS, the Director of Parks + Rec recommends the revision of many sections in chapter 50 of the County Code, relating to County parks and park operations, to incorporate best practices and current standard procedure for park visitors; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of the recommended revisions is in the best interest of the health, welfare, and safety of the citizens of Jackson County; now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Legislature of Jackson County, Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Enacting Clause

Sections 5000., 5002., 5005., 5011., 5013., 5014., 5015., 5018., 5019., 5020., 5021., 5023., 5024., 5025., 5026., 5028., 5029., 5030., 5035., 5036., 5037., 5038., 5040., 5041., 5042., 5046., 5049., 5059., 5066., 5069., 5071., 5072., 5073., 5080., 5081., 5082., 5083., 5084., 5090., <u>Jackson County Code</u>, 1984, are hereby repealed, and thirty-nine new sections in lieu thereof, to read as follows:

5000. Scope.

The provisions of this chapter govern the use and management of the Jackson County Park System, <u>Waterways</u>, the Rock Island Rail Corridor, and other County-owned properties used at least in part for recreation[s] purposes.

5002. Definitions.

When used in this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings. If any words and phrases are not defined by this chapter but are defined in the state law regulating the use of parks, the state law definition shall apply.

<u>5002.1</u> <u>Authorized Emergency Vehicles</u>.

<u>Authorized Emergency Vehicles shall include the following:</u>

- a. Ambulance. Any vehicle operated as an ambulance;
- b. State Highway Patrol. Any vehicle operated by the Missouri State

 Highway Patrol;
- c. Police. Any vehicle operated by a municipal police department within Jackson County;
- d. Fire. Any vehicle operated by a municipal fire department or fire protection district within Jackson County;

e. Sheriff. Any vehicle operated by the Jackson County Sheriff or any deputy sheriff; and

f. Park Ranger. Any vehicle operated by a Jackson County park ranger.

5002.2 <u>Director</u>.

The Director the Jackson County Parks + Rec Department or that officer's designee.

5002.[2] 3 Rock Island Rail Corridor.

The non-parkland property acquired by Jackson County for use as common carrier asset and for transit facilities, economic development, and multi-modal transportation services, including bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

50[19.1] 02.4 Waterfowl.

Any species of birds commonly known as swans, geese, brants, river and sea ducks, and any other waterfowl falling under the jurisdiction of the Missouri Conservation Commission or otherwise defined by the Commission as migratory waterfowl.

5002.[1] <u>5</u> <u>Waterway</u>.

Any body of water, lake, pond, stream, or waterway owned or controlled by Jackson County. Jackson County waterways include, but are not limited to, Longview Lake, Prairie Lee Lake, Blue Springs Lake and Lake Jacomo.

5005. Park Rangers.

Jackson County park rangers shall assist the Director in the control, management and protection of all Jackson County parks, park property, <u>Waterways</u>, the Rock Island Rail Corridor, and all wildlife, natural, and cultural resources of the parks.

5005.1 General Duties.

Jackson County park rangers shall strive to assure the convenience and safety of all persons using county parks as permitted by this chapter.

5005.2 <u>Enforcement of Park Regulations</u>.

Jackson County park ranger shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the officers of the Sheriff's Patrol to enforce all park regulations set out in chapter 50, Jackson County Code. (See sections 64.335 & 590.105 RSMo)

5005.3 <u>Enforcement of Nonmoving Traffic Violations.</u>

Jackson County park rangers shall have the jurisdiction to enforce the following provisions of chapter 52, Traffic Code, and chapter 55, Petty Offenses:

- 5240. Aggressive Driving;
- 5257. Vehicles on Roads to be Licensed; Display Required;
- 5270. Obstruction of Traffic Prohibited;
- 5271. Blocking Driveway Prohibited;
- 5272. Standing in Curb Loading Zone;
- 5273. Maximum Time at Curb Loading Zone;
- 5274. Buses;
- 5275. Taxicabs;
- 5276. Bus and Taxicab Stands, Use Restrictions;
- 5277. Parking Restricted on Certain Streets;
- 5284. Illegally Parked Vehicles;
- 5286. Vehicle Abandonment Prohibited;
- 5531. Disorderly Conduct;
- 5534. Weapons Offenses;
- 5539. Obedience to Sheriff, Deputy, or Park Ranger;
- 5540. Littering;
- 5545. Stealing;
- 5547. Possession of Controlled Substances
- 5549. False Report or Information;
- 5551. Fleeing or Attempting to Elude an Officer;
- 5552. Hindering an Officer/Resisting Arrest;
- 5554. Resisting Arrest; and
- 5556. Public Indecent Exposure.

5005.4 <u>Violation of Law Other Than Park Regulation.</u>

On observing any violation of this code, or the laws of the United States or the state of Missouri, the Jackson County park rangers may notify the Sheriff, the Highway Patrol, or any appropriate law enforcement authority of the United States, the state, or the county, or of the city in which the park is located.

5005.5 <u>Emergencies</u>.

In the event of emergencies involving illness or injury, or danger to life, the Jackson County park rangers shall take reasonable steps to obtain needed medical, rescue or other emergency assistance.

5005.6 Oath of Office.

Upon successful completion of required law enforcement training, each park ranger shall take an oath of office before the clerk of the county legislature.

5011. Sales and Concessions.

Sales or advertisement of merchandise or other goods <u>or services</u> for sale or hire, in <u>or on</u> any Jackson County park, facility, land, or water is prohibited, except by written permission of the Director or under license otherwise provided for by this chapter.

5011.1 Display of Written Permits.

Written permits issued by the Director pursuant to this section for the sale or advertisement of merchandise or other goods <u>or services</u> for sale or hire in <u>or on</u> any Jackson County park, facility, land, or water, must be conspicuously displayed at all times.

5011.2 Advertisement.

No person, group, or organization shall display or distribute literature, posters, fliers, or any other material in any Jackson County park except by written permission of the Director. If granted written permission by the Director, any person, group, or organization that has displayed posters, fliers, or any other materials shall take down said items at the conclusion of the event and/or activity for which the display was permitted and remove them from park property.

<u>5011.3</u> <u>Photography Permit Required.</u>

No person shall, for commercial purposes, photograph, record, video, videotape, or use any other means of capturing images and/or sounds within any Jackson County Parks + Rec park or facility for commercial purposes, without having obtained the appropriate photography permit from the Director. All forms of photography are prohibited at the Longview and Blue Springs swim beaches unless a written permit has been issued by the Director.

5013. Motor Vehicles.

The term "Motor Vehicle" shall include but shall not be limited to any automobile, truck, motorcycle, minibike, trailbike, <u>Segway, hoverboard</u>, snowmobile, dune buggy, all-terrain vehicle, trailer, camper, and other such <u>similar motorized</u> equipment. <u>An e-bike, as defined in subsection 5013.5 of this section, is specifically excluded from this definition of "Motor Vehicle." The operation of e-bikes on County park trails is governed by subsection 5013.5.</u>

5013.1 Motor Vehicle Operation.

Motor vehicles may only be operated on roadways and parking areas designated by the Director. No person shall operate any motor vehicle through, around or beyond a restrictive sign, recognizable barricade, fenced gate, or other traffic control barrier or device. No person shall operate any motor vehicle in any area other than on paved roadways and parking areas designated by the Director. The Director may also designate where certain "Other Power Driven Mobility Devices" may be limited or permitted.

5013.2 All Terrain Vehicles.

No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle in any Jackson County park without the written permission of the Director.

5013.3 <u>Truck Sizes</u>.

No person shall operate [the operator of] a truck rated over one and a half tons [is prohibited from operating said truck] in [all] any Jackson County park[s]. Woods Chapel Road, Longview Road, Raytown Road, and 109th Street are excluded from this prohibition.

5013.4 Horse Trailer Parking.

No person shall park a trailer or other conveyance designed to transport horses in any park or recreational area, including designated equestrian trailhead parking areas, without a permit issued by the Director. Permits will be issued for a definite time and duration and will not be transferable. Permits must be clearly displayed on the rear of the trailer or transport. Participation in a reserved event as designated by the Director does not require a permit.

<u>5013.5</u> <u>E-bike Usage on County Trails and Shared Use Paths.</u>

"E-bike," as used in this chapter, is defined as a pedal-assisted one, two, or three-wheeled electric bicycle that requires user interaction to propel the device with assistance from an electronic engine or battery (defined by the industry as a class 1 or class 3 type bike). Class 1 and Class 3 e-bikes shall be permitted on the following County trails and shared use paths: the Little Blue Trace, the Rock Island Trail, the Longview Trail, and all designated mountain bike, single-track trails at the Blue River Parkway, Lake Jacomo, and Landahl Park. The Director may designate other trails and shared use paths where e-bikes are permitted. No

person shall operate any Class 2 type e-bike, any throttle or full accelerator bike that does not require the operator to pedal to propel the bike, or any other combustion-powered bicycle of any type, on any park trail or shared use path. No person shall operate any e-bike on any County park trail unless such trail has been specifically designated for e-bike operation in this subsection or has otherwise been designated for such operation by the Director pursuant to this subsection.

5014. Hot Air Balloons and Other Transportation Equipment.

Hot Air Balloons may be launched from launching sites designated by the Director and are subject to permits and regulations promulgated by the Director. No person shall launch a Hot Air Balloon on any park land, lake, or waterway, except from a designated launching site or when authorized by the Director as a Special Event.

5014.1 Ultralight Aircraft.

No person shall operate any ultralight aircraft on any Jackson County park land, lake, or waterway except when authorized by the Director.

5014.2 Para-Sailing Equipment and Operation.

No person shall operate any para-sailing equipment, <u>kiteboard</u>, <u>or similar</u> device on any Jackson County lake or waterway except when authorized by the Director.

5014.3 <u>Bicycles/Mountain Bikes/All-Terrain Bikes/E-bikes</u>.

No person shall operate any bicycle, mountain bike, all-terrain bike, wide-tired bike, or other non-motorized, pedal-operated vehicle, <u>or e-bike</u>, in any Jackson County park except at areas designated by the Director and on marked <u>trails</u> <u>or</u> roads within any park.

5015. [Shooting Into Park] Firearms.

No person shall discharge a firearm or other weapon within the boundaries of any Jackson County Park, or into any park area from beyond the park boundaries, unless authorized by the Director.

5018. Animals, Fish, and Wildlife.

No person shall pursue, catch, kill, molest, possess, illuminate, spotlight, <u>feed</u>, or take in any manner or any quantity any wildlife nor <u>shall any person</u> destroy the dens or nests of any wildlife on park land except as otherwise permitted by this chapter, or by the express permission of the Director when necessary to control animal damage.

5018.1 Domestic Animals.

No person shall bring any domestic animal into any County park <u>or area used</u> <u>for recreation</u>, unless such animal shall be in the immediate control of such person on a leash not exceeding six feet in length.

5018.2 Horseback Riding.

No person shall engage in horseback riding in <u>any</u> county park <u>or area used for recreation</u>, except on <u>a marked</u> bridle path [and] <u>or</u> in <u>an</u> area <u>so</u> designated by the Director.

<u>5018.3</u> <u>Trapping.</u>

No person shall set or possess any [steel, plastic or wooden] trap for catching, pursuing, or killing wildlife in any Jackson County park without written permission from the Director. If granted, a copy of the written permit must be carried up any person while engaged in trapping on Jackson County park property.

5018.4 <u>Livestock</u>.

No person shall graze any livestock in any Jackson County park <u>without written</u> permission from the Director.

5018.5 Releasing of Wildlife.

No person shall bring any animal into a Jackson County park for release. This shall include an animal control officer, unless written permission is obtained from the Director.

501[9.1] <u>8.6</u> <u>Deer Stands, Prohibition</u>.

No person shall use, construct, or in any way attach a deer stand, or any other structure, or any portion thereof, including steps, to any tree or any other object, unless approved by the Director.

501[9.3] 8.7 Feeding or Baiting Wildlife, Prohibition.

No person shall feed or bait any wildlife, including all mammals, birds (excluding feeding at songbird stations), deer, raccoons, and any other species of wildlife, without the written permission of the Director [which feeding:

- a) Results in a threat to the public health, safety or welfare of park visitors, patrons, or employees; or
- b) Draws birds or wildlife to an area for any purpose including hunting or poaching].

501[9.2] <u>8.8</u> <u>Feeding of Waterfowl, Prohibition</u>.

No person shall feed any migratory waterfowl, or create any condition, or allow any condition to exist, which results in a congregation or congestion of migratory waterfowl and which:

a) results in an accumulation of waterfowl feces or droppings;

- b) results in damage to flora, fauna, or private public property;
- c) results in a threat to the public health, safety, or welfare; or
- d) results in a threat to the health, safety, or welfare of migratory waterfowl.

501[9.4] <u>8.9</u> Non-Game Fish, Feeding Prohibition.

No person shall feed non-game fish except at designated fish feeding stations.

5019.[5] Plants.

All trees, plants, and vegetation on County park land are protected. No person shall collect, destroy, or remove any tree, plant, or other vegetation from park lands or waterways except by permission of the Director. Dead fallen wood may be collected for use as firewood at park campgrounds and picnic areas. No person shall collect standing timber for use as firewood.

5020. Artifacts and Items of Antiquity.

All items of antiquity on County park land are protected. No person shall collect any artifact or item of antiquity from park land except as approved by the Director. If permission is granted by the Director, all County land and property shall be restored to its original condition after antiquities are collected.

5021. Fires.

No person shall ignite or maintain any fire on park land except in designated ovens, stoves, rings, or other fireplaces provided for that purpose by the County. No person shall leave a fire unattended, and all fires must be extinguished after use. <u>Prescribed burns</u> shall be permitted when authorized by the Director.

[5021.1 Fire Danger.

The use or possession of fireworks of any kind on county park land is permitted only when authorized by the director of parks and recreation for special events.]

5023. Littering.

[Only] No person shall dispose of any litter or trash generated from recreational activity in any Jackson County Park[s shall be disposed of] except in an appropriate container[s] provided by the <u>Director for that purpose</u>.

5023.1 Dumping.

No person shall dump[ing of] trash, brush, or other debris on park land, lakes, or waterways [is prohibited].

[Person Presumed Responsible.] Responsibility, Presumption.

The operator of a vehicle or vessel shall be presumed to be responsible for litter which is thrown, dropped, or left from the vehicle or vessel on County property or waters.

5024. Disorderly Conduct.

No person shall:

- a) Engage in disorderly conduct or any conduct tending toward a breach of the peace; or,
- b) Engage in any violent, tumultuous, offensive, or disorderly conduct by threatening, traducing, quarreling, challenging to fight or fighting, or by using obscene, offensive, profane or unseemly language to the annoyance, disturbance, or vexation of another.

5024.1 When Noises Constitute Disorderly Conduct.

The causing or making of any unnecessary loud noise, [or] shouting, or yelling, or by the use of amplified speakers or sound systems shall be considered disorderly conduct.

5025. Alcoholic Beverages.

The Director may prohibit possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages at certain park areas, park functions, and/or park facilities by the posting of signs to that effect.

5025.1 Possession of Alcoholic Beverages Prohibited, Where.

No person shall possess or consume any alcoholic beverage [within Prairie Lee Park, at Prairie Lee Lake,] at any swimming beach or archery range operated

by Jackson County [at any location within Jackson County], at the Fleming Meeting Hall, at any flying field, or at any historic site operated by Jackson County, except when authorized in writing by the Director [for park related events. This section shall also apply to lakeside residents of Prairie Lee Lake who are using the lake or park.]

5025.2 Alcohol, Possession or Consumption by Persons Under 21.

No person under the age of twenty-one years shall possess or consume any alcoholic beverage in any Jackson County park.

5025.3 Intoxication.

Any person in a state of intoxication on any Jackson County park property may be removed from park property.

5025. 4 <u>Contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor</u>.

No person shall give away, make readily available, or otherwise supply any ["intoxicating beverage"] alcoholic beverage to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) on any park property.

5026. Shelterhouse Reservations.

No person shall use or occupy any shelterhouse [on] <u>in</u> any Jackson County park without first making a reservation with and securing a permit from the Director. Shelterhouse reservations may only be made by a person twenty-one (21) years of age or older. The person making the reservation shall be held accountable for the condition of the

shelterhouse at the end of the use of the shelterhouse. Anything attached to picnic tables, restrooms, shelterhouses, etc., such as signs, banners, barricades, etc., must be removed and either disposed of or taken off park property at the conclusion of the event/activity. The person reserving the shelterhouse shall also be responsible for the actions of those in his party.

5028. Diving or Jumping From Bridges or Structures.

No person shall dive or jump from any bridge or natural <u>or man-made</u> structure into any Jackson County lake or waterway.

5028.1 Rappelling from Structures.

No person shall rappel by any means from any natural or man-made structure without written permission from the Director.

5029. Camping Areas.

No person shall engage in camping or the over night use of the County park lands except in areas and in such manner as shall be designated by the Director. The Director may [designate] <u>promulgate</u> rules and regulations <u>concerning camping</u> and such rules and regulations shall be posted at park camping areas.

<u>5029.1</u> <u>Campsite Minimum Age Requirement.</u>

Only persons age 21 and over shall be permitted to reserve a campsite. Each reserved site shall have a person age 21 or over physically at the campsite whenever the reserved campsite is occupied by any person.

5030. Time Limit.

No person shall camp[ing] at [one or more] <u>any combination of campsites in a Jackson</u> County park for a period longer than 14 consecutive days [is prohibited] without the written permission of the Director. Written permission <u>of the Director</u> is <u>also</u> required to camp in Jackson County park campground in excess of 14 days during any 30-day period.

5035. <u>Natural Terrain Maintained, Metal Detectors, Mining, and Prospecting Prohibited.</u>

No person shall disturb in any way the natural terrain, plants, or animals in any Jackson County park. No person shall operate a metal detector, <u>fishing magnet</u>, or mine or prospect for any mineral <u>or object</u>, in any Jackson County park without the written permission of the Director.

5036. Golf.

No person shall play or practice the game of golf, nor hit golf balls, in any Jackson County

Park, except at the designated Golf Course or during special events with written approval

of the Director.

5037. Construction of Docks on Prairie Lee Lake, Permit Required.

An owner of lakeside property at Prairie Lee Lake directly abutting the lake, may be permitted to construct a dock on the lake in accordance with this section. Each such dock shall be compatible with other docks and lakeside residences in terms of size, type, spacing between docks, and method of construction. No person shall erect, construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, improve, remove, convert, or demolish any dock or similar structure on the waters of Prairie Lee Lake, or cause or permit the same to be done, without first obtaining a valid permit from the Director of Public Works.

5037.1 No Fee for Lakeside Property Owners.

No fee for a permit under this section shall be assessed against an owner of lakeside property at Prairie Lee Lake.

5037.2 Standards.

The issuance of a permit under this section shall be governed by construction standards to be promulgated by the Director of Public Works. Such standards shall, to the extent practicable, comply with chapter 54 of this Code, the Uniform Building Code, and the policy enunciated in this section. A copy of all such standards shall be on file in the offices of the Clerk of the County Legislature and Director of Public Works. Any used dock or dock part to be utilized on Prairie Lee Lake shall be thoroughly cleaned prior to installation and shall contain no plant, animal, or other living organic matter.

5038. Personal Floating Facilities.

No person shall place or erect any free-floating dock, floating trampoline, or other elevated floating mooring/swimming/diving facilities on any Jackson County Waterway.

5040. Boating Regulations.

The use and operation of watercraft and motors on any Jackson County Waterway shall be in accordance with the laws <u>and regulations</u> of the State of Missouri and the Missouri [Water] <u>Highway</u> Patrol. The <u>County</u> Legislature may [prescribe rules and regulations] <u>enact ordinances</u> pertaining to licensing, permits, size, type, horsepower, and operation of watercraft and motors on Jackson County waterways. Also, the Director may promulgate rules and regulations pertaining to the use of the parks. As used in this chapter, the term "motor" shall include any inboard or outboard motor used to propel a watercraft, regardless of horsepower or type of fuel used.

5040.1 <u>Copies of State Regulations.</u>

The Director shall file a true copy of the Missouri Watercraft Manual with the Clerk of the County Legislature by January 15 of each year. Copies of the Missouri Watercraft Manual shall be made available to park patrons at park offices and through park rangers.

5040.2 <u>Personal Flotation Services, Class I, II, and III Motorboats.</u>

No person shall operate or otherwise ride as a passenger in any class I, II, or III motorboat (motorboats 16 feet and over in length) unless such boat shall have on

board at least one wearable personal flotation device of type I, II, or III, as approved by the United States Coast Guard, in serviceable condition and readily accessible, for each person on board said boat and for each person being towed by said boat who is not wearing such a device, and unless such boat shall have on board at least one approved type IV throwable personal flotation device. Ski belts and inflatables do not qualify as approved personal flotation devices.

5040.3 <u>Personal Floatation Devices, Class A Watercraft.</u>

No person shall operate or otherwise ride as a passenger in any class A watercraft (less than 16 feet in length) unless such boat shall have on board at least one personal flotation device of class I, II, III, or IV, as approved by the United States Coast Guard, in serviceable condition and readily accessible, for each person on board said boat and for each person being towed by said boat who is not wearing such a device. Ski belts and inflatables do not qualify as approved personal flotation devices.

5040.4 <u>Personal Floatation Devices, Persons Under the Age of Seven (7)</u> Years.

No person shall operate or otherwise ride as a passenger in any motorboat, sailboat, canoe, kayak, or any other similar watercraft, containing any person under the age of seven (7) years, unless each such person under the age of seven (7) years is wearing a United States Coast Guard approved personal flotation device. Ski belts and inflatables do not qualify as approved personal flotation devices.

5040.5 <u>Lighting</u>.

No person shall operate any motorboat, sailboat, canoe, kayak or other watercraft between the hours of sunset and sunrise unless such watercraft shall exhibit running lights in the following manner:

- a) positioned on the bow, a red light to the port and a green light to the starboard visible for 180 degree for one mile and,
- b) positioned on the stern a white light visible for 360 degree for two miles.

Each watercraft is required to illuminate a white light on the stern or on the highest point of the vessel, visible from all directions, whenever it is anchored or moored away from docks, between sunset and sunrise

5040.6 <u>Fire Extinguishers</u>.

No person shall operate any motorboat unless such motor boat shall carry on board United States Coast Guard approved fire extinguishers as follows:

- a) Every class A and every class 1 motorboat carrying or using gasoline or any other flammable or toxic fluid: one B1 type fire extinguisher;
- b) Every class 2 motorboat: one B2 or two B1 type fire extinguishers;
- c) Every class 3 motorboat:
 - 1) Three B1 type fire extinguishers; or
 - 2) One B2 type and one B1 type fire extinguisher; or

- 3) A fixed fire extinguishing system and one B2 type fire extinguisher; or
- 4) A fixed fire extinguishing system and two B1 type fire extinguishers.

5040.7 <u>Sounding Devices</u>.

No person shall operate any motorboat, sailboat, canoe, kayak, or other watercraft greater than sixteen (16) feet in length unless such watercraft shall carry on board an operable mouth, hand, or power operated sounding device audible for at least one-half mile.

5040.8 Age Limits.

The minimum age for operating a motorboat in the state of Missouri is fourteen (14). No person under fourteen (14) years of age shall operate any motorboat unless such person is under the direct on board supervision of a parent or guardian or other person sixteen (16) years of age or older, or unless such motorboat is moored. No person shall authorize or knowingly permit a motorboat owned by such person or under such person's control to be operated on any county waterway in violation of this subsection, nor shall a parent or guardian authorize or knowingly permit such a child under fourteen (14) years of age of such parent or guardian to operate a motorboat in violation of this subsection.

<u>5040.9</u> <u>Missouri Water Safety Course.</u>

In accordance with Missouri law, the operator of any watercraft on any Jackson Waterway born on or after January 1, 1984, must have completed the Missouri Watercraft Safety Course and must show proper ID and the certificate of completion, upon request by any park ranger and when renting a County-owned watercraft.

5041. Launching Areas.

No person shall launch a boat or raft <u>onto any Jackson County Waterway</u> from any area except [the] <u>from a launching ramp[s] or designated launch area</u> maintained by Jackson County for such purpose.

5041.1 Public Courtesy Dock Time Limits.

No person shall exceed [10] <u>ten</u> minutes docking time <u>for parking a motor vehicle</u> and/or trailer while loading or unloading passengers or materials at [the] <u>any</u> public dock[s and] <u>or ramp area[s] within [the] a County park [lands].</u>

5042. Boat and Motor Permits.

No person shall operate any watercraft on any Jackson County waterway, except for lakeside property owners at Prairie Lee Lake, without the appropriate boat and/or motor permit issued by the Director. Permits shall be issued on a seasonal or a one-day basis and are non-refundable and non-transferable. Season boat permits and combination boat

and motor permits shall be displayed on the port bow (left front) side of the watercraft. Season motor permits shall be displayed on the port bow (left front) side on the motor. One-day ramp permits shall be carried on the watercraft while on any Jackson County waterway. Lakeside property owners at Prairie Lee Lake will be issued identification tags and will not be required to obtain separate boat and motor permits to use Prairie Lee Lake. The identification tags shall be displayed on the port bow (left front) side of the watercraft.

5042.1 <u>Use of Boat Ramps</u>.

No person shall use a launching ramp at any Jackson County Waterway without having obtained the appropriate boat and/or motor permit from the <u>Director</u>.

5042.2 <u>Mooring, Dock, Dry Storage and Locker Permits</u>.

No person shall moor, dock, or store any watercraft on any specifically designated mooring dock, or dry storage facility owned or operated by Jackson County without having obtained the appropriate permit therefor. Dock and mooring spaces may be purchased as available with the actual permit issuance subject to verification of ownership and registration information. Dock and mooring permits will allow the permit holder to use any Jackson County Waterway for the time period indicated on the permit; however separate motor permits are still required. Dock and mooring permits shall be displayed on the port bow side (left front) of the watercraft. Permits are also required for the use of designated dry storage areas but these do not allow the permit holder use of Jackson County Waterways unless the holder also

purchases boat and motor permits as applicable. Dry Storage permits shall be displayed on the left front side of the trailer and port bow (left front) side of the boat.

[5042.3 Renewal of Permits.

All dock, mooring and dry storage permit holders of record as of January 1 may renew their permit options during January and February each year on payment of all fees and compliance with the terms and conditions of this chapter. Actual permit issuance will be subject to verification of ownership and registration information. For the purpose of this section, permit holder of record shall be defined as either the current holder of a valid permit if January 1 is included in the permit season or the holder of a valid permit on the last day of the last completed permit season immediately preceding January 1.]

[5042.4 Permits Issued After March 1.

On or after March 1 of each year, any remaining dock, mooring, and dry storage permits may be sold using a random drawing procedure or lottery. All interested parties shall register for said lottery between January 1 and February 28 of each year. The lottery shall be held before the third Monday in March. All registrants or their representatives must be present during the drawing in order to participate in the lottery. Any dock, mooring or dry storage purchases through the lottery process will require the full payment of fees at the time of selection. Actual permit issuance will be subject to verification of ownership and registration information.]

[5042.5 Permits Issued After July 31.

After July 31 of each year, the director of parks and recreation may issue seasonal boat, motor, combination boat and motor, mooring, dock, and dry storage permits for the remainder of the current season at one-half the fees established for the applicable full season.]

5042.[6] 3 Display of Permits.

No person shall operate, dock, moor, or store any watercraft, motor, or trailer on any Jackson County Waterway or other property owned or operated by Jackson County unless said watercraft shall display all applicable boat, motor, dock, mooring, and dry storage permits in accordance with this section.

5046. Boating on Prairie Lee Lake.

5046.1 Sailboats.

No person shall place or operate a sailboat on Prairie Lee Lake.

5046.2 Boats, Length and Width.

No person shall operate a boat, other than a pontoon boat, over ten feet (10') in width or over twenty-one feet six inches (21.5') in length on Prairie Lee Lake.

5046.3 Pontoon Boats, Length and Width.

No person shall operate a pontoon boat over ten feet (10') in width or over thirty feet (30') in length on Prairie Lee Lake.

[5046.4 Personal Watercraft.

No person shall operate a personal watercraft on Prairie Lee Lake on weekends or holidays.]

5046.[5] 4 Artificial Wake Enhancement.

No person shall operate a boat on Prairie Lee Lake that has been modified to or uses any device or means to create an artificially large or modified wake.

5049. Sailboards, Windsurfing, and Stand-Up Paddleboards.

No person shall operate a sailboard, windsurfer, <u>stand-up paddleboard</u>, or similarly-designed craft on any Jackson County lake or Waterway except in accordance with this section and the rules and regulations promulgated by the Director.

[5049.1 One Occupant.

Only one (1) person may occupy the sailboard during its operation.]

5049.[2] 1 Boat Permit and Personal Flotation Device Required.

The operator of any sailboard, windsurfer, <u>stand-up paddleboard</u>, or similarly designed craft must <u>display a current Jackson County boat permit and wear at all</u>

times [while sailboarding] a Type I, II or III Personal Flotation Device approved by the U.S. Coast Guard.

5049.2 Day and Time Reservations.

The Director may allow <u>sailboarding</u>, windsurfing, and <u>stand-up paddleboarding on any Waterway</u> [Longview and Blue Springs Lake] between sunrise and sunset, Monday through Thursday. No person shall <u>sailboard</u>, windsurf, or <u>stand-up paddleboard</u> on Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, or on any holiday on any Waterway, other than Lake Jacomo.

[5049.3 Wet Suit Required.

From October 1 through May 15 the operator and any passenger of any sailboard or personal watercraft must wear a wet suit designed to protect the trunk, arms and legs.]

[5051. Windsurfing.

The director of parks and recreation may allow windsurfing on Longview and Blue Springs Lakes between sunrise and sunset, Monday through Thursday. No person shall windsurf on Friday, Saturday, Sunday or on holidays. Windsurfing shall be allowed on Lake Jacomo without restrictions.

5051.1 Windsurfing Regulations.

Any person windsurfing on Longview or Blue Springs Lakes shall first obtain a permit and shall be subject to all regulations promulgated by the director of parks and recreation.]

5059. [Maximum Speed on Lake Jacomo.

Except for lake patrol boats operated by the county or the state, motorized boats may not be operated on Lake Jacomo in excess of ten miles per hour (10 mph).]

[5060] 5059. Horsepower Limits on Prairie Lee Lake.

No boat with an attached or installed motor having more than one hundred and ninety (190) horsepower (outboard) and/or one hundred and sixty-five (165) horsepower (inboard) may be placed on Prairie Lee Lake on Saturdays, Sundays or holidays.

5066 Water Skiing.

The operator of any vessel being used to tow a person on water skis or other appropriate device approved for use on Jackson County lakes and waterways must have in addition to himself another person on board seated so as to observe the progress of the person being towed or the vessel must be equipped with a ski mirror and red ski flag. All water skiing and other approved activity shall be conducted only from sunrise to sunset.

5066.1 <u>Direction of Skiing on Prairie Lee Lake.</u>

On Prairie Lee Lake both the operator of the towing vessel and the person or

persons being towed will maneuver counterclockwise so that the skis or other device or any person will not strike or collide with another object or person.

5066.2 Waterskiing Conduct.

No person will manipulate water skis or other device in a reckless or negligent manner endangering the life or property of any person. No person shall manipulate water skis or other device while intoxicated or under the influence of any narcotic drug, barbiturates or marijuana.

5066.3 Flotation Devices for Water Skiing.

Any person involved in water skiing or other approved similar activity must wear a type I, II or III coast guard approved personal flotation device. Ski belts and other inflatables are not allowed.

5066.4 <u>Water Skiing at Lake Jacomo</u>.

No person shall water ski on Lake Jacomo except by special permission of the Director.

5066.5 Skier Down Flags.

A skier down flag shall be displayed when required by Missouri law on all Waterways.

5069 Authority to Issue Written Notice of Violation.

Jackson County park rangers shall have authority to issue written notice of violation to any [permit holder] <u>boat operator</u> who fails to comply with the boating and watercraft regulations of this chapter. [Park rangers shall report the notice of violation to the director of park and recreation.]

5069.1 <u>Revocation and Suspension</u>.

The Director may suspend or revoke any <u>boating-related</u> permit issued under authority of this chapter. The appeal procedure may be obtained from the <u>Director</u>.

5071. Riding on Bow and Gunwales Prohibited.

The operator of a motorboat 26 feet in length or less, shall not ride or sit, or allow any passengers to ride or sit on either the starboard or port gunwales or on the decking over the bow railing, top of seat back, or decking over the back of the motorboat while under way, unless such person is inboard of adequate guards or railings which could prevent someone from being lost overboard. As used in this section, the term "adequate guards or railings" means guards or railings having a height parameter of at least six inches but not more than eighteen inches.

5071.1 Exceptions.

a) The operator may allow a person to temporarily occupy the decking over the bow for a necessary purpose such as docking, mooring to, or casting off from a mooring buoy.

b) Vessels being propelled by sail are not [included] within the prohibition of this section.

5072. Removal of Park Patrons.

Jackson County park rangers [shall have the right] <u>are authorized</u> to remove any person from the County's lakes and Waterways for <u>any of</u> the following <u>reasons</u>:

- 1) Severe weather conditions;
- 2) Other dangerous conditions where personal safety or property is endangered; or
- 3) [Infractions] $\underline{\text{Violations}}$ of the County's $\underline{\text{code}}$, rules, [and] $\underline{\text{or}}$ regulations.

5073. Traffic Movement.

[All] <u>Any</u> watercraft operator[s] shall stop [their] <u>the operator's</u> craft upon the signal of <u>any</u> park ranger and shall obey all reasonable signal direction given by any park ranger in directing the movement of traffic on any Jackson County lake or Waterway.

5073.1 Right of Way to Emergency Watercraft.

When any emergency watercraft gives an audible signal by siren, or visible signal,

with red or blue emergency lights, the operator of any watercraft shall immediately stop or position [their] the operator's watercraft in such a manner as to give the right of way to the emergency [vehicle] watercraft.

5080. Operation of Radio/Remote Controlled [Aircraft] Devices.

No person shall operate any remote radio/remote controlled device, including but not limited to, aircraft, aerial drones, cars, trucks, rock crawlers, and boats, except in areas designated for such operation by the Director.

[5081. Display of Frequency and Channel.

Any person operating a radio controlled aircraft within designated areas in Jackson County parks shall prominently display on the transmitter at all times frequency flags and channel numbers.]

508[2] 1. <u>Liability Insurance Required</u>.

No person shall operate a radio controlled [aircraft or boat] <u>device</u> on or above park land or Waterways unless [he] <u>such device</u> has liability insurance of at least the minimum limits, <u>with proof of coverage in the person's possession while operating said device</u>, offered by the Academy of Model Aeronautics to its members, with regard to aircraft, <u>or comparable governing body or agency coverage for other devices</u> [the minimum limits offered by the American Power Boat Association to its members, with regard to boats]. Any person holding a current Academy of Model Aeronautics membership card will be presumed to have met the above requirement with regard to aircraft. [Any person holding a current American Power Boat Association membership card will be presumed to have

met the above requirement with regard to boats.]

508[3] <u>2</u>. <u>Permit</u>.

[It shall be unlawful for any] <u>No</u> person <u>shall</u> [to] operate any type of radio controlled equipment for the purpose of operating miniature or model airplanes, ground running vehicles, water borne boats or vehicles, rockets or any other similar device within the physical boundary of any park that is under the jurisdiction of Jackson County, Missouri, without first [purchasing] <u>obtaining</u> the proper operating permit issued by Jackson County. <u>Said permit must be in the possession of the permit holder while operating radio/remote controlled devices in a County park.</u>

508[4] 3. Radio-Controlled Flying Field Sound Level.

No person shall operate any radio-controlled flying device with a sound level in excess of ninety-eight (98) decibels on <u>an a</u> weighted scale when measured from a distance of fifty (50) or more feet.

508[5] 4. [Permission to Dive] Diving, Permit Required.

Any person wishing to scuba dive in <u>any</u> Jackson County lake[s and] or waterway[s] must <u>obtain written approval from the Director</u> [contact the Jackson County Rangers' Station located at Lake Jacomo] twenty-four (24) hours prior to [their] <u>the</u> dive and inform the [senior ranger on duty] <u>Director</u> of the time, location, purpose, and number of persons involved in the dive.

5090. Abandoned Property.

Any boat, <u>boat lift</u>, craft or other property of value found abandoned, adrift, or left unattended in or near County lakes or on County park land may be taken by the County.

5090.1 Lien for Expenses.

The County shall have a lien on such property for all expenses of taking, towing, and storing that property and for all damage caused by that property to the property of the county, or to any other person.

5090.2 <u>Procedure for Property Disposal.</u>

If the owner of the property does not claim the property and redeem the lien within [6 months] <u>ninety (90) days</u>, the property may be disposed of in the same manner as surplus County property.

AN ORDINANCE repealing sections 3301., 3302., 3303., 3305., and 3306., <u>Jackson County Code</u>, 1984, relating to property assessed clean energy and enacting, in lieu thereof, eleven new sections relating to the same subject.

ORDINANCE NO. 5619, April 18, 2022

INTRODUCED BY Dan Tarwater III, County Legislator

WHEREAS, the County has participated in property assessed clean energy (PACE) programs since 2014, through the Missouri Clean Energy District as set out in chapter 33 of the County Code; and,

WHEREAS, under PACE, commercial and residential property owners may finance qualifying clean energy projects on their properties with the proceeds of loans that are repaid by means of charges on their real property tax bills; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 3302. of the code, the Greater Kansas City Clean Energy Board (GKCCEB) is also designated as an eligible PACE funding provider within the County; and,

WHEREAS, the Legislature has determined that it is appropriate to revise the procedures contained in section 3305. of the code for the appointment of membership to the GKCCEB; and,

WHEREAS, the Legislature has also determined that it is appropriate to designate the Show Me PACE Clean Energy District as a qualified PACE provider in the County; and,

WHEREAS, the amendments to chapter 33 embodied in this Ordinance provide an appropriate means by which to implement the intent of the Legislature; now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the County Legislature of Jackson County, Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Enacting Clause.

Sections 3301., 3302., 3303., 3305., and 3306., <u>Jackson County Code</u>, 1984, are hereby repealed, and seven new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 3301., 3302., 3303., 3305., 3306., 3310., 3311., B, C, D, and E, to read as follows:

3301. Title and Definitions.

3301.1 <u>Title</u>. This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Jackson County, Missouri Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) Ordinance."

3301.2 <u>Definitions</u>. Except as specifically defined below, words and phrases used in this chapter shall have their customary meanings. Words and phrases defined in section 67.2800.2 of the Missouri Revised Statutes (2016), as amended, shall have their defined meanings when used in this chapter. As used in this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings indicated.

"Commercial Property" means any property owned by a non-profit or notfor-profit entity classified by the Jackson County Assessment Department as "commercial," any governmentally-owned property, and any multi-family residential property in excess of four residential units.

"Greater Kansas City Clean Energy Development Board" or "Board" means the Greater Kansas City Clean Energy Development Board.

"Missouri Clean Energy District" or "Missouri District" means the Missouri Clean Energy District.

"PACE Act" means Missouri Property Assessed Clean Energy Act, sections 67.2800 – .2835, RSMo, as amended.

"PACE Assessment" means a special assessment made against qualifying property in consideration of PACE Funding.

"PACE Funding" means funds provided to the owner(s) of qualified property by the <u>Board, Missouri</u> District, or <u>Show Me District</u> for an energy efficiency improvement.

"Qualifying Property" means real property located in Jackson County,
Missouri.

"Show Me PACE Clean Energy District" or "Show Me District" means the Show Me PACE Clean Energy District.

3302. Program Administration.

The Missouri Clean Energy District [shall], the Show Me PACE Clean Energy District, and the Greater Kansas City Clean Energy Development Board shall be empowered to administer the functions of the PACE Program within the County by:

- a. Providing property owners with an application in order to apply for PACE Funding;
- b. Developing standards for the approval of Projects submitted by <u>Qualifying</u> Property owners;
- c. Reviewing applications and select qualified projects;
- d. Entering into assessment contracts with **Qualifying** Property owners;
- e. Providing a copy of each executed notice of assessment to the Jackson County Director of Assessment and causing a copy of each such notice of assessment to be recorded in the real estate records of the Jackson County Recorder of Deeds;
- f. Authorizing and disbursing the PACE Funding to Qualifying Property owners;

- g. Receiving the PACE Assessment from the County Collector; and
- h. Recording any lien, if needed, due to nonpayment of a PACE Assessment.
- i. Exercising all powers granted by section 67.2810.2, RSMo, as amended, including, but not limited to, the power to levy and collect a PACE Assessment pursuant to an assessment contract with a Qualifying Property owner.

3303. Liability of County Officials; Liability of County.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, officers and other officials of the County, the Board, the Missouri District, the Show Me District, and the County, including, without limitation, tax assessors and tax collectors, shall not be personally liable to any person for claims, of whatever kind or nature, under or related to the County's PACE program, including, without limitation, claims for or related to uncollected PACE Assessments. The County has no liability to a property owner for or related to energy savings improvements funded under the PACE program. The Board, the Missouri District, and the Show Me District shall for all purposes be considered independent entities and shall not be considered subdivisions of the County.

3305. <u>Greater Kansas City Clean Energy Development Board, Established.</u>
The Greater Kansas City Clean Energy Development Board is established.

3305.1 Membership. The Board shall consist of five members:

- a. [Chair of the Jackson County Legislature;
- b.] The Mayor of the City of Sugar Creek, MO;
- [c. The Legislative Auditor of Jackson County, MO;]
- b. Two Jackson County residents appointed as permanent members by nominators selected by the Chairman of the County Legislature; and,
- c. Two [members selected] <u>Jackson County residents appointed</u> by majority vote of the [three permanent] members[, who shall serve terms of two years] <u>designated or appointed pursuant to subsections 1.a and 1.b of this section</u>.

3305.2 Terms and Vacancies.

The terms of office for the nominators and for the appointed members of the Board shall be as follows:

a. The two nominators shall begin their terms when named by the Chairman of the County Legislature and, once they have discharged their duties of appointing two permanent members to the Board, their terms and duties shall end.

- b. The two permanent members of the Board appointed by the nominators shall begin their terms on the day they are appointed by mutual agreement of the nominators. The terms of the two initially appointed permanent members of the Board shall end on December 31, 2025. Thereafter, the terms of the two permanent appointed members of the Board shall end every fourth year on January 31.
- c. Whenever a vacancy occurs in either of the two permanent appointed

 Board members, the secretary of the Board shall notify the Chairman of the

 County Legislature who shall in turn appoint two nominators. The

 nominators shall then appoint a new member or members by mutual
 agreement.
- d. The terms of the two non-permanent appointed members shall begin when they are chosen by the majority of the Board. The term of the initial two non-permanent Board member shall end on December 31, 2024.

 Thereafter, the terms of the two non-permanent appointed members of the Board shall end every fourth year on December 31.
- e. Subject to the right of resignation and to the terms described herein, all members shall hold office until their successors are duly elected or appointed and qualified.

3305.[2] 3 Expenses.

The Board [shall] <u>may</u> establish reasonable procedures for Board members to be reimbursed for expenses incurred due to their Board service.

3305.4 Proxies.

Any board member may name a proxy, authorized to vote on that member's behalf, by submitting the name of such person in writing to the Board's chair before any meeting during which the proxy is authorized to vote.

3306. Greater Kansas City Clean Energy Development Board, Authority.

The Board is authorized to exercise all powers which may be exercised by similar boards pursuant to the PACE Act, as it may be revised from time to time, and to adopt such bylaws addressing its operations as are consistent with the PACE Act and this chapter.

3306.1 Commercial Properties Only.

The authority of the Board to administer the PACE Program within the County shall extend to Commercial Properties only.

3306.[1] 2 Start-Up Phase.

The Missouri Clean Energy Authority, LLC (MOCEA) shall serve as Program Administrator for the Board during its initial or start-up phase. Such start-up phase shall extend for a period of one (1) year, and may be extended by vote of the Board

for a period up to three (3) years. During the start-up phase, MOCEA shall be responsible for all costs and fees associated with the Board's operations.

3306.3 Cooperative Tax Agreements.

The Board shall be authorized to enter into cooperative agreements with the County governing the collection of PACE Assessments.

3308. Consumer Protections.

The <u>Missouri District</u>, the <u>Show Me District</u>, and the Board shall adopt, before any project may be approved [by the Board], consumer protection policies and standards that address, at a minimum, the following areas:

- a. Consumer eligibility;
- b. Minimum required disclosures and documentation to be provided to the consumer;
- c. Maximum rates and fees to be charged to the consumer; and post-funding support for the consumer;
- d. Data and cyber-security standards to protect consumer data and personal information that comply with the Financial Services Modernization Act of 1999, Title V;

e. The prohibition of PACE program practices that are misleading, deceptive, or violative of federal, state or local laws regarding marketing practices;

f. Compliance with all federal, state, or local laws regarding protected classes;

g. Availability of the program to low-income homeowners who are otherwise eligible for the program; and,

h. Implementation of a reasonable maximum finance amount.

These consumer protections shall either meet or exceed the national PACE standards as outlined in the Residential PACE Nation Consumer Protection Policies, as revised from time to time, viewable at http://pacenation.us/consumer-protections/. <u>These standards</u> shall not apply to any project involving or improvement to any Commercial Property.

3310. Existing Laws Not Superseded.

Any project or improvement to any Qualifying Property which is funded in whole or in part with PACE Funding shall be subject to all ordinances, rules, and regulations in effect at the time of the initial funding.

3311. County as a Non-Party.

The County shall not be a party to any PACE Funding agreement, loan, or other

<u>Commitment, however dominated, executed between the Missouri District, the Show Me</u>

<u>District, or the Board and the owner(s) (or their representatives, together with any successors and assigns) of any Qualifying Property.</u>

Section B. Severability Clause.

If any section or provision of this Ordinance is determined to be unconstitutional, contrary to state law, or incapable of being enforced, by reason of any law or public policy, all other sections or provisions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect and no section or provision shall be deemed dependent upon any other section or provision unless expressly stated herein.

Section C. Jackson County declares its intent that the provisions of this Ordinance shall be in conformity with federal and state laws. The County enacts this Ordinance pursuant to sections 67.2800 to 67.2835, RSMo, as amended.

Section D. The County does hereby request that the County be approved by the Board of Directors of the Show Me District as a duly authorized participant in the District. The County hereby approves the Show Me PACE Cooperative Agreement among the District and the participating municipalities in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A (the "Cooperative Agreement"). The County Executive is hereby authorized and directed to execute the Cooperative Agreement on behalf of the County.

Section E. The election of the County to join the Show Me District shall in no way constitute an obligation of the County necessitating any corresponding appropriation.

EXHIBIT A

SHOW ME PACE COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

THIS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT ("Cooperative Agreement") is made and entered into by Show Me PACE, a Missouri clean energy development board ("Show Me PACE") and the municipalities of the State of Missouri that, from time to time, may execute this Cooperative Agreement (each, a "Municipality," and together, the "Municipalities").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, on (date), the Jackson County Legislature adopted Ordinance No. 5619, authorizing participation in Show Me PACE, pursuant to Sections 67.2800 to 67.2835 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri (the "PACE Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 67.2810 of the PACE Act, more than one municipality may form a clean energy development board; and

WHEREAS, clean energy development boards serving more than one municipality are in the best interest of the participating municipalities because it allows for economies of scale and concentrations of expertise that will benefit the approval, financing and installation of energy efficient and renewable energy improvements pursuant to the PACE Act; and

WHEREAS, other municipalities may participate in Show Me PACE by adoption of an ordinance in accordance with the PACE Act and execution of this Cooperative Agreement.

AGREEMENT

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of each municipality's participation in Show Me PACE, each Municipality hereby agrees as follows:

- 1. Representations. Each Municipality has taken all legislative actions necessary to approve such Municipality's participation in Show Me PACE.
- **2. Approval of Bylaws.** The current bylaws of Show Me PACE (the "Bylaws") have been provided to the Municipality and the Municipality approves such Bylaws.
- **3. Board of Directors.** The members of the Board of Directors of Show Me PACE shall be appointed in the manner described in the Bylaws.

- 4. Clean Energy Development Board Powers. Each Municipality agrees that Show Me PACE is authorized to exercise all clean energy development board powers permitted by the PACE Act or other statute within the boundaries of the Municipality.
- **5. Counterparts.** This Cooperative Agreement is intended to be signed in counterparts as Municipalities, from time to time, elect to participate in Show Me PACE. No action from any Municipality already participating in Show Me PACE shall be required for a new Municipality to participate in Show Me PACE.
- **6. Withdrawal.** No Municipality shall withdraw from participation in Show Me PACE if such withdrawal will impact any existing property assessment clean energy financing undertaken by Show Me PACE in the Municipality's boundaries. However, a Municipality may request, in writing, that Show Me PACE no longer undertake clean energy financing in the Municipality's boundaries.

Failure to submit reports by the deadline dates may result in delay for reimbursement requests and/or cancellation of the contract.
- 6. Project Income: The Subrecipient agrees to account for project income/federal forfeitures generated by the activities of this contract, and shall report receipts and expenditures of this income on the monthly Claim report. The Subrecipient understands that all project income generated as a result of this contract shall be expended during the life of the contract.
- 7. **Procurement:** The Subrecipient assures that all procurement transactions whether negotiated or competitively bid and without regard to dollar value shall be conducted in a manner to provide maximum open and free competition. In addition, the Subrecipient assures that all procurement transactions will meet the minimum

standards set forth in the *Financial and Administrative Guidelines* section of the TITLE II solicitation and identified here:

- A. All quotations and the rationale behind the selection of a source of supply shall be retained, attached to the purchase order copy, and placed in the accounting files.
- B. Purchases to a single vendor totaling less than \$10,000 may be purchased with prudence on the open market.
- C. Purchases (not unit cost) estimated to cost between \$10,000 but less than \$100,000, shall be competitively bid, but need not be solicited by mail or advertisement.
- D. - 9. <u>Buy Missouri:</u> The Subrecipient also acknowledges <u>Sections 34.070 and 34.073 RSMo</u> regarding the preference given to all commodities and tangible personal property manufactured, mined, produced, or grown within the state of Missouri and to all firms, corporations, or individuals doing business as Missouri firms, corporations, or individuals, or which maintain Missouri offices or places of business, when quality is equal or better and delivered price is the same or less, quality of performance promised is equal or better and the price quoted is the same or less, or when competing bids are comparable.
- 10. <u>Debarment and Suspensions</u>: This certification is required by Executive Order 12549, Debarment and Suspensions, and implemented at 28 CFR Part 67, for prospective participants in primary covered transactions, as defined at 28 CFR Part 67, Section 67.510.

The Subrecipient certifies that it and its principles:

- A. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, sentenced to a denial of Federal benefits by a State or Federal court, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
- B. Have not within a three-year period preceding this application been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State, or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of Federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements or receiving stolen property;
- C. Are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a governmental entity (Federal, State, or Local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph (1)(b) of this certification; and
- D. Have not within a three year period preceding this application had one or more public transactions (Federal, State, or Local) terminated for cause or default
- 11. <u>Audit</u>: The Subrecipient agrees to comply with the organizational audit requirements of <u>CFR Part 200 Audit Requirements</u>. This guidance states that non-federal entities that expend \$750,000 or more in federal funds (from all sources including pass-through sub-awards) in the agency's fiscal year (12-month turnaround reporting period) shall have a single organization wide audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of as further described in the <u>OJP Financial Guide</u>, <u>Chapter 3.19</u>, <u>Audit Requirements</u>. - 12. <u>Termination of Award</u>: The Missouri Department of Public Safety, Office of the Director, reserves the right to terminate any contract entered into as a result of this application at its sole discretion and without penalty or recourse by giving written notice to the Subrecipient of the effective date of termination. In the event of

termination pursuant to this paragraph, all documents, data, and reports prepared by the Subrecipient under the contract shall, at the option of the Missouri Department of Public Safety, become property of the State of Missouri.

In the event that the Missouri Department of Public Safety determines that a Subrecipient is operating in a manner inconsistent with the provisions of the application or is failing to comply with the applicable regulations, the Missouri Department of Public Safety may permanently or temporarily terminate the contract. If this occurs, the Subrecipient has the right to an appeal hearing. In the event a contract is permanently terminated, the Missouri Department of Public Safety may take action as deemed appropriate to recover any portion of the contract funds remaining or an amount equal to the portion of the contract funds wrongfully used.

- 13. **Enforceability:** If a Subrecipient fails to comply with all applicable federal and state requirements governing these funds, the State of Missouri may withhold or suspend, in whole or in part, funds awarded under the program, or recover misspent funds following an audit. This provision is in addition to all other remedies provided to the State of Missouri for recovery of misspent funds available under all applicable state and federal laws.
- 14. <u>Compensation</u>: The Subrecipient understands that funds may not be used to pay cash compensation (salary plus bonuses) to any employee of this grant at a rate that exceeds 110% of the maximum annual salary payable to a member of the federal government's Senior Executive Service (SES) at an agency with a Certified SES Performance Appraisal System. The Subrecipient understands it may compensate an employee at a higher rate, provided the amount in excess of this compensation limitation is paid with non-federal funds.

Programmatic:

- Time Records Requirement: The Subrecipient assures that, all project personnel funded through this contract
 will maintain signed timesheets that detail 100% of their time along with the activities/services provided. These
 timesheets must be provided to the Missouri Department of Public Safety personnel upon request.
- 2. Claims Schedule: The Subrecipient assures that Claims for Reimbursement and all required supporting documentation will be submitted via WebGrants by the 5th of each month. If the specified due date falls on a weekend or holiday, the Claim for Reimbursement must be received by the first working day after the weekend or holiday. Claims for Reimbursement submitted after deadline may not be processed until the following month. Claims for Reimbursement are due each month whether or not any funds were expended.

Claims for Reimbursement will be submitted within 60 days of the time the expense was incurred. DPS reserves the right to deny reimbursement of any expense that falls outside the 60 day requirement, is not identified in the approved budget, or is unallowable. Final expenses must be submitted within 35 days of the end of the contract period.

Failure to submit the required forms and supporting documentation on time shall be considered a failure to adhere to the terms of the Subaward and may result in the delay of reimbursement and/or termination of the subaward contract.

- 3. <u>Coordination of activities:</u> The Subrecipient shall fully coordinate all activities in the performance of the project with those of the Missouri Department of Public Safety, Office of the Director.
- 4. <u>Data Collection:</u> The Subrecipient assures that it shall maintain such data and information and submit such reports, in such form, at such times, and containing such information as the Missouri Department of Public Safety, Office of the Director, may require. This includes any additional information that may be necessary in follow-up to monitoring and/or audit issues, and in response to requests from the Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs or the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. In addition to information that may be necessary in follow-up to monitoring and/or audit issues, and in response to requests from the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

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- 5. Annual Performance Report: The Subrecipient agrees to provide information on the activities supported and an assessment of the effects that the Title II Juvenile Justice funds have had on services to youth for a one year period. That period will October 1 through September 30. This information will be submitted annually on the DPS "Title II DCTAT Annual Performance Report" no later than 30 days following the end date of the reporting period each year.
- 6. <u>Access to Records:</u> The Subrecipient authorizes the Missouri Department of Public Safety and/or the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and/or the Office of the Comptroller, and its representatives, access to and the right to examine all records, books, paper or documents related to the Title II grant.
- 7. Confidentiality of Research Information: The Subrecipient assures that except as otherwise provided by federal law, they shall not use or reveal any research or statistical information furnished under this program by any person identifiable to any specific private person for any purpose other than the purpose for which such information was obtained in accordance with the Missouri Department of Public Safety, Crime Victim Services and Juvenile Justice Unit. - 8. - 9. (Court staff will be in attendance as well, however, the Court will support the cost.)

The Gender-Sensitive Juvenile Probation Officers (JPO) provide counseling and coordinate services designed to meet the habilitative and rehabilitative needs of youth born female and their families which is accomplished through casework techniques, such as assessment, treatment development, counseling, and direct supervision. Their duties also include planning special activities, twice-week pro-social activities, mentor trainings (in-services), Mother/Daughter events, and other special activities based on topics relevant to the curriculum. There is continual planning and evaluation throughout the program process.

There will be two Gender-Sensitive JPO's attending the Spring or Fall Conference. The cost of two Gender-Sensitive Program staff attending the Missouri Juvenile Justice Conference (Spring or Fall as travel is allowable due to the pandemic or to pay for virtual conference attendance.) 2 staff x conference registration of \$300.00 plus lodging \$300.00 and per diem \$35 x 3 days x 2 people = \$210 (total costs **\$1410.00**)

Supplies/Operations Justification

The Gender JPO's and the contract therapist/counselor will provide the clinical groups twice a week with the youth and once a month to include a parent/family member or mentor.

Books, Workbooks, and education/Program materials for distribution to youth during the twice-weekly groups and monthly events. In addition to the Voices curriculum, the 16th Circuit also purchases culturally and age-appropriate reading materials.

Voices Facilitatrs Guide (4 copies X \$95.00 = 380 plus shipping \$40.00) \$420.00

Voices Participants Guide (30 copies X \$15.00 (includes shipping) = \$450.00

Assorted Books for Gender Sensitive Lending and Resource Library $15.00 \times 40 = 600.00$ (we encourage the young participants to keep the books as we have discovered that many youth served by the Court do not have books to read for pleasure at home.)

A variety of tickets for Mother/Daughter events and activities and Mentor/Youth activities are needed to support and incentivize the relationships. The average cost per participant is \$25 per ticket x 2 participants (parent or mentor) x 120 = \$6000.00. This allows mentors to take youth and in some cases parents as well on events at least once or twice a month. Not all tickets or events will be \$25.00 but the program is designed to encourage mentors to take youth to unique, culturally relevant, and engaging activities. Examples include the VaGogh Exhibition, The KC Rep Theatre, conferences/talks related to Girl Power/Gender Equity, Worlds of Fun, Main Event, Movies, Concerts, Sporting events like the Kansas City Current which is a new women's soccer team in KC housed in a new stadium where every element is meticulously designed to tell the story of who the women are, how they play and what they represent as a club etc... We understand the importance of identifying events that portray females as resilient and strong. The total cost is \$6000.00.

In reviewing the research from various positive youth development programs, prosocial involvement opportunities and activities are significant and important elements for the healthy development of adolescents. (1) The involvement of adolescents in prosocial activities serves the functions of making adolescents aware of and able to accept the social norms and moral standards of society. This involvement will bring positive changes to the adolescents and consequently benefit society as a whole.

Social learning theories maintain that most human behavior is learned, molded, and shaped by environmental events, especially rewards, punishments, and modeling. From the perspective of social learning, prosocial involvement is interpreted as the consequence of reinforcement or punishment. (2) A number of findings attest to the positive influence that prosocial involvement exerts on individual functioning and interpersonal transactions. On the individual level, findings from developmental research show that prosocial involvement is positively correlated with psychosocial adjustment in children and adolescents. (3) Studies also indicated that children with prosocial reputations tended to be high in constructive social skills and attentional regulation and low in negative emotionality.(4) There is evidence that prosocial involvement

promotes integration in the community, enhances positive mood and helps individuals to stay healthy and have better life satisfaction. (5) Other studies indicate that prosocial involvement serves as a protective factor that fosters self-enhancement, self-acceptance, and successful psychosocial adaptation.

The relationship between prosocial involvement and adolescent development outcomes has also been studied by investigating the relationship between prosocial involvement and adolescent problem behavior. One of the studies indicated that involvement in legitimate activities inhibits deviance because active participation in these activities consumes time. There is consistent evidence that prosocial involvement not only reduces crime and delinquency but also serves a rehabilitation and correctional function in delinquent youths. Thus, it is suggested that prosocial involvement be included in discussions about possible solutions to crime, drug use, offender treatment, or youth probation programs. (6)

The long-term effect of prosocial involvement is evident in studies. These findings are consistent with studies that engagement in prosocial activities earlier in life facilitates prosocial development later in life. (7) Study findings showed that youth who frequently act prosocially might be prone to develop prosocial traits that might strengthen their moral sense of self. (8) Other findings also show the positive effect that behaving prosocially has across all stages of adult life (9), and that there is substantial continuity in prosocial involvement from adolescence through the transition to adulthood.

Request Summary

This resolution awards \$1,000,000 in Jackson County American Rescue Plan funds targeted for support of disadvantaged communities to three agencies directly involved in the provision of homeless prevention in jackson County. These three agencies were identified after an RFP process conducted by the Housing Resource Commission and referred to the County Executive for American Rescue Plan funding. The County Executive's Office subsequently asked these three agencies for more specific proposals. The three requests totaled \$2,010,000 with the intent to award \$1,000,000 from ARPA funds.

A total of \$455,000 will be provided to ReStart Inc. of Kansas City to add 20 permanent beds to their downtown shelter facility. It is hoped that the Jackson County contribution will be matched by other philanthropic or governmental agencies to fully fund the requested 40 permanent bed expansion. A total of \$370,000 will be provided to Metro Lutheran Ministry to provide funding for homeless individuals and families needing assistance with utility and rental deposits to be able to move out of shelters and into permanent housing. Lastly \$175,000 will be provided to Community Services League of Independence for one-year of support for their Bridge Housing Program. Up to 8-10 1 and 2 bedroom units will be made available to Jackson County residents needing assistance to move from homelessness to permanent housing

This resolution further authorizes the County Executive to enter into agreements with these three agencies.

Background and Experience

Founded in 1916 – 106 years ago – Community Services League (CSL) is the largest and most comprehensive social service agency serving Eastern Jackson County. CSL's mission is to assist communities in reaching their potential by providing immediate relief to people in need, assessing their situations, and providing solutions that lead to economic stability. We know that a crucial pillar of stability is housing, and CSL is the lead agency in Eastern Jackson County addressing the needs of residents who are homeless or at-risk of losing their housing. CSL has a long history of serving households of all sizes, compositions, and barriers to remain stably housed and work toward long-term stability.

CSL has successfully executed three Permanent Housing grants through the Office of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD's) Continuum of Care (CoC) programming, which provides longer term housing for the communities most vulnerable individuals. We are also adept at shorter term rapid rehousing, which aims to stabilize and move households to self-sufficiency more quickly. Between these two housing types, CSL currently supports over 80 households through the following tools:

- Medium- and long-term rental assistance
- Dedicated housing case managers who assist in finding affordable safe housing, obtaining mainstream and private benefits, accessing healthcare needs, transportation, housekeeping, etc.
- Employment coaches who assist clients with obtaining and retaining employment for those who are ready and able to work
- Financial coaches who work with households to create and follow budgets and work on credit repair and asset building
- Providing basic needs such as food, clothing, personal care items, and seasonal needs.

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic crisis, CSL has been on the front lines to serve neighbors who have been impacted by the virus. CSL offices have remained open and have consistently experienced a 300-400% increase in requests for service. We have sought out and successfully executed COVID-related grant funds in order to keep Eastern Jackson County families stably housed and basic needs met during the pandemic event. While CSL has worked hard to quickly mobilize to assist our neighbors, rental assistance programs such as ERAP and SAFHR are inundated with applicants and for some neighbors, assistance does not come in time to prevent eviction.

Housing in the Community and Gaps in Available Services

The Kansas City Metro area sees approximately 1,800 people experiencing homelessness on any given night. The Independence Housing Authority alone had 4,376 households waitlisted in 2021. The waitlist for HUD funded housing programs is bottlenecked, and only those homeless households with the most vulnerabilities will receive housing. Households often wait a year or more to be selected for voucher or

housing program spots and by then, the households' circumstances have significantly deteriorated. When a household has finally been selected for an available spot, is often difficult to locate them and this lengthens the process significantly. In addition, the emergency shelter system is overburdened, and time spent in the homeless service delivery system is costly.

Put simply, there are not enough available programs with which to assist Jackson County residents who are homeless or are at risk for homelessness. Community Services League continuously seeks out all available funding sources to help increase our capacity to assist vulnerable households. This opportunity through American Rescue Plan funds will help fill a serious gap in the housing continuum.

Proposed Project - CSL Bridge Housing Pilot

Too many households continue the traumatic cycle of homelessness while languishing on a wait list. The community is in desperate need of an interim housing opportunity that would allow households a safe and sanitary unit of their own while they await a more permanent housing solution.

CSL intends to take our learning from our permanent and rapid rehousing programs and implement a Bridge Housing Program. We will prioritize our neighbors in Independence and Eastern Jackson County, who struggle with access to many of resources that are situated in downtown Kansas City.

What this program will look like:

- Priority will go to single member households experiencing category 1 homelessness (defined by HUD as a person(s) living in a place not meant for human habitation) in Independence and Eastern Jackson County who have experience hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic
- Neighbors in Bridge Housing must be willing to work with staff to create a housing goal (housing program, public housing, etc.) Staff will ensure that the neighbor qualifies for an existing housing opportunity
- CSL will provide up to 24 months of rental assistance for households in bridge housing
- Neighbors in bridge housing will be offered the opportunity to engage in CSL's income and employment support programs
- The bridge housing program will operate in alignment with Housing First, which does not require readiness standards (sobriety, engagement in treatment or mental health services, etc.) and incorporates client choice.
- A dedicated Housing Case Manger will provide regular case management and ensure that neighbors are working towards their permanent housing goals
- Housing Case Managers will also work with homeless households who are not enrolled in the Bridge Housing Program to access resources / housing systems navigation.

Measurable Outcomes

- Enroll 12 homeless households into Bridge Housing Program
- 85% of neighbors will successfully transition into permanent housing opportunities after 24 months of Bridge Housing services
- 75% of neighbors will increase or maintain earned income
- 30% of neighbors will work with SOARS trained staff to complete benefit applications
- 100 homeless households in Eastern Jackson County (not enrolled in Bridge Housing) will receive assessment and connection to resources / systems navigation services

Funding Request and Length of Investment

Community Services League respectfully requests a grant of \$350,000 to support the Bridge Housing Pilot Program. The length of the investment is two years - \$175,000 per year.

Sustainability

In order to support and sustain all of our services and programs, CSL writes 75-100 grant and contract proposals per year. We host three large-scale and several smaller-scale fundraising events annually and have a robust individual fundraising plan that targets supportive community members and businesses. Specific to the Bridge Housing Program, CSL is in discussions with two of the largest foundations in Kansas City who are interested in supporting and sustaining this work.

Metro Lutheran Ministry

American Rescue Plan - Jackson County

Scope of Services

Founded in 1971, Metro Lutheran Ministry (MLM) is a Missouri 501(c)(3) nonprofit social service agency serving low-income individuals and families in the urban areas of Jackson, Clay, and Platte counties in Missouri, and Wyandotte & Johnson Counties in Kansas. The agency has 30 paid staff persons, over 1,700 volunteers, and five locations which serve thousands of people each year. In FY 2021, MLM assisted over 38,000 individuals through various services and programs. MLM serves people of all ages, races, ethnicities, and spiritual affiliations. MLM's mission states: "With abiding faith in the intrinsic value of all God's children, Metro Lutheran Ministry connects those in need with food, housing, health care, education, employment services and other resources in order to nurture greater hope, health, opportunity and peace."

For five decades, MLM has pioneered emergency assistance and housing programs, some of which have become successful, stand alone non-profits such as Harvesters Community Food Network, Sheffield Place (transitional housing for women & children), Parvin Estates (low-income apartments), and Kansas City Community Gardens (gardening materials/education for low-income groups to grow their own food). MLM has been a key member of the Kansas City economic safety net for low-income and homeless families for 50 years. MLM provides the following programs and services to the Kansas City community through its three Community Assistance Centers (CACs) located in Jackson and Clay counties in Missouri and Wyandotte County in Kansas:

- Food assistance through three traditional food pantries, a mid-town fresh produce mobile pantry, and free Saturday breakfasts in Kansas and Missouri;
- Christmas store;
- Emergency housing assistance through utility/rent/mortgage/hotel payments;
- Minor Home Repair program;
- Case management;
- Employment services;
- Financial coaching;
- Homelessness Prevention for at-risk households;
- Affordable supported housing through Eileen's Place;
- Permanent Supportive Housing program; for those experiencing chronic homelessness/mental illness/substance abuse; and
- Rapid Re-Housing for literally homeless households.

As a leading provider of emergency housing stabilization assistance in the metro area, and having successfully administered over \$1,500,000 in/ federal CARES Act assistance in 2020, and over \$5M in ERAP and ARPA in KCMO, Clay & Wyandotte Counties in 2021, MLM is uniquely situated to quickly and efficiently serve the needs of Jackson County households facing a housing crisis. **MLM has the capacity to administer an additional \$750,000 or more in federal ARPA funds for Jackson County,** adhering to guidelines put in place by the U.S. Department of the Treasury, and any additional guidelines the County may implement. Services will be provided to eligible households of Jackson County through MLM's community assistance center locations in Kansas City, MO in Clay & Jackson Counties.

In accordance with U.S. Treasury Guidance, and outlined in the attached budget, MLM will provide the following homelessness prevention and mitigation services to residents of Jackson County, Missouri:

- Rent, rental arrears, mortgage, mortgage arrears, utilities and home energy costs, utilities and home energy costs arrears, and other expenses related to housing, including hotel/motel. The payment of existing housing-related arrears that could result in eviction of an eligible household, and payments to assist in obtaining housing to end a household's homelessness is prioritized. Housing stability services provided to assisted households include connections to mainstream benefits and internal and external resources, including food, ID, medical, dental, and other basic needs services. Other COVID-19 mitigation services that may be provided to eligible clients include PPE, personal hygiene items, prepackaged food, etc.
 - o \$675,000 total Direct Assistance
- Housing stability services and administrative costs include case management salary and benefits, administrative and accounting staff time and administrative costs.
 - o \$75,000 total services/administrative

Housing related assistance provided to an eligible household will not be duplicative of any other federally funded rental assistance provided to such household. An application for assistance may be submitted by an eligible household directly to MLM. Households experiencing homelessness or imminently at-risk of homelessness will be prioritized for assistance.

ARPA funds will be integrated into existing homeless assistance programming provided by MLM, and are understood to be non-renewable, temporary in nature, to assist in addressing the immediate needs of those served during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Reporting will be provided by MLM to Jackson County, MO on a basis determined by the County.

Housing is healthcare and while that has always been true, the realities of homelessness in the healthcare context have come to light during the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic. According to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation "People experience trauma on the streets or in shelters which has long-standing adverse impacts on psychological (and physical) well-being. These and other challenges can result in persistently high healthcare expenditures due to emergency department and inpatient hospital use. Residential instability is associated with health problems among youth, including increased risk of teen pregnancy, early drug use and depression."

One hundred percent of those served by reStart, Inc.'s Emergency Shelter, live at or below the federal poverty level and experience multiple co-morbidities such as obesity, high blood pressure, diabetes and other chronic conditions that put them at high risk of death.

Poverty, unemployment, and lack of affordable housing are commonly recognized causes of homelessness. These risk factors can be exacerbated by personal vulnerabilities such as mental and substance use disorders, trauma and violence, domestic violence, justice-system involvement, sudden serious illness, divorce, death of a partner, and disabilities.

reStart's Emergency Shelter is the only continuous emergency shelter operating in Jackson County. Continuous sheltering means that people are not just provided overnight shelter, they are provided 24/7 shelter for 45-90 days while they work closely with a case manager on a housing plan. Almost 80% of people exit from reStart's programs into stable housing. The model of continuous shelter with the proper wrap around support of case management, access to mental health, substance use treatment and employment services is an effective strategy to ending homelessness.

The 2021 Point in Time count revealed that 986 individuals, including families and children, were experiencing homelessness in Jackson County. Over 400 were unsheltered and on the street. We know the Point In Time Count underrepresented the number of people experiencing homelessness in Jackson County due to the pandemic and the eviction moratorium.

reStart, Inc. is one of two emergency shelters in Jackson County that serves families and children. reStart, Inc. received over 570 calls specifically for family shelter from January through September 2021; with 42% of those calls happening in August and September, after the eviction moratorium was lifted. Families continue to be the most at risk of homelessness and are the most impacted by the economic ripple effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Even with the rental assistance that has been administered it has not been enough to keep all households housed, we must now focus on re-housing them. reStart is highly skilled at utilizing every community resource and relationship to house even the most challenged households. We work to ensure that there will be true housing stability for each household. Emergency Rental Assistance is intended to be the Prevention tool for homelessness amid the pandemic and for the first time in history it is being funded at a level to make a significant impact.

Unfortunately, interim housing/shelter has not been funded at an appropriate level to meet the high demand. For all of those who still became unhoused despite best efforts to prevent it, we must have an option. By funding shelter at the highest capacity possible and continued work being done on affordable housing we can make an impact together. This will take time, but in the interim we can support people in a safe environment with access to all the wrap around support they need to exit homelessness.

As we continue to move thru the pandemic we continue to see persons experiencing homelessness be infected with COVID-19 at higher and higher rates. reStart has operated a COVID Positive hotel program since August 2021 and the number of people needing the hotel in December doubled and in January it tripled. Over 200 people have been served at the hotel since August.

reStart does operate as a congregate setting at our main location, however there are no more than two people to each room and we have continued a mask mandate in the building since March of 2020. Those efforts have resulted in less than 10 clients contracting COVID-19 and there has been zero transmission from one person to another since March 2020. Congregate settings with the proper precautions and design can continue to serve and mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and be highly effective at ending homelessness. We have proven is it not necessary to place people in hotels with limited to no support.

reStart's Street Outreach Teams have continued to serve people throughout the pandemic, now more than ever it is critical to be able to have an interim shelter option to offer to people living on the street and in encampments. Over the course of the pandemic reStart has mapped encampments across Jackson

County and we saw encampments grow from 100 to over 175 over the course of 2020/21.

Expanding reStart's Shelter capacity will assist outreach teams in being more successful in getting people to exit camps and enter into shelter with a goal of obtaining and exiting to permanent housing. The only way to reduce encampments is to ensure there is appropriate access to interim shelter and a pathway to permanent housing.

reStart's Emergency Shelter operates as a hybrid interim transitional or supportive housing program which helps to stabilize people with mental health issues and substance use disorders who are experiencing homelessness. Shelter programs that are continuous and focused on housing can help address the root causes of homelessness through a range of essential recovery support services, including mental and substance use disorder treatment, employment, and mainstream benefits.

reStart is requesting support from Jackson County to expand shelter bed capacity at our main location at 918 E. 9th Street, Kansas City, Missouri. We have capacity to offer 40 additional shelter beds while still maintaining no more than 2 people to a room. This will allow us to bring 40 people at a time off the street and into a safe haven where they can focus on exiting homelessness. People typically exit reStart in 45-90 days, this will allow us to serve a minimum of 160 people over the course of 12 months.

When we leave people on the street they must live in survival mode, this does not allow people to think about anything other than meeting their basic needs every day. Desperate people do desperate things and the street becomes a game of survival of the fittest which is why we have continued to see violent crime continuing to increase. When we can provide a safe haven that meets a person's basic needs of food, shelter and safety they can begin focusing on taking the steps needed to change their situation. With a case manager by their side they will be sure to succeed.

It will take approximately \$908,000 to support all 40 beds/160 people; an average of \$5,678 per person. Our agency and team are very experienced and highly successful at assisting people in overcoming their housing barriers and exiting people out of homelessness and into safe, stable, affordable housing so they can thrive.

More and more agencies that support very vulnerable populations are reducing capacity or closing all together due to labor shortages and an inability to meet compliance requirements. As this continues to happen over the course of this

year we will see more and more very ill and vulnerable people end up homeless and they will enter the homeless service system and/or the criminal justice system.

Homelessness has always been a matter of life and death. COVID-19 has underscored that it's a public health crisis for us all. We hope that you will consider supporting shelter capacity at the maximum to your ability to ensure there is a safe haven for people to call upon that has the ability to meet their individual needs and assist them in exiting homelessness. We must seize this opportunity to reduce homelessness and work to ensure that everyone on the street has an opportunity to be connected to a safe accommodation.
