

# Jackson County - PDMP

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## What is the timeframe of the user agreement?

Jackson County signed a 3 year user agreement. The agreement took effect on January 1, 2017. St. Louis County is currently working on creating a renewal agreement, which Jackson County should receive in the next few weeks. The renewal agreement will be through October 2021.

## What is the annual cost of the PDMP for the County?

There is no annual cost at this time due to grant funding for St. Louis County. The current grants will cover PDMP costs through September 2022.

## Who at Jackson County is currently receiving data from the St. Louis County PDMP?

The data is currently going to a County employee. JACOHD has requested access to this data.

## What data is currently available for each jurisdiction?

Weekly user files are sent to contacts above. This data includes the providers in the jurisdiction by city, state, and zipcode. St. Louis County is currently looking at expanding the amount of data and increasing the frequency of data given to local health departments.

## What counties have PDMP Coordinators?

St. Louis County is the only health department with a PDMP Coordinator. All administrative operational tasks must be performed by St. Louis County and there are very few things that can be done by outlying jurisdictions. There are two counties with PDMP epidemiologists, yet it was explained that the PDMP data analysis is only a small portion of their role.

## What is the Jackson County Health Department (JACOHD) doing related to the opioid epidemic?

- 1) Signed a MOU with DHSS agreement on 6/13/2018 to be a naloxone distribution site for first responders, such as law enforcement, ambulance services, fire departments, etc. This MOU will remain in effect until September 30, 2021. As of 2/19/2020, JACOHD has distributed 314 units. Of those distributed, 117 units went to the Jackson County Sherriff's office and 15 went to the Jackson County Drug Task Force.
- 2) Collaborated with DHSS and hospitals in EJC on the reporting of non-fatal overdoses. Through this process, JACOHD served as consultants for DHSS on data needs and custom reports.<sup>i</sup>
- 3) Created an [opioid data dashboard](#) using EMS, law enforcement, hospital, and DHSS data.<sup>ii</sup>
- 4) Partnered with KCHD to develop a communications campaign focusing on stigma<sup>iii</sup>
- 5) Our [2019-2021 Community Health Improvement Plan](#) identified mental and behavioral health as a priority area in our community. There are strategies within this priority area related to substance use prevention.
- 6) Created and provided education, training, and related programs for first responders around naloxone distribution.<sup>iv</sup>
- 7) When staff are available, they participate on biweekly PDMP calls hosted by St. Louis County.
