WHEREAS, U.S. President Donald J. Trump, Missouri Governor Mike Parson, and County Executive Frank White, Jr., have all declared, in one form or another, the ongoing Coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic to be a public health emergency; and,

WHEREAS, the County, through its various efforts, plays a significant role in the public health of its citizens; and,

WHEREAS, an appropriate response by the County to this emergency will require significant expenditures from the County CARES Act Fund, which consists of monies provided by the U.S. Treasury for this purpose; and,

WHEREAS, the Kansas City Public Library of Kansas City, MO, has submitted a proposal for a project to address internet connectivity issues for students and citizens in the County brought on by the migration to telehealth services and virtual classrooms for the 2020-

2021 school year, triggered by COVID-19 pandemic, at a cost to the County not to exceed \$50,000.00; and,

WHEREAS, the Library of is requesting Jackson County provide \$50,000 to allow the library to purchase fifteen additional laptop computers for the Library's device lending program; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive and County Administrator recommend the funding of this project; now therefore,

## Kansas City Public Library

Tech Access Health & Education Lending Program

### Project Background and Description

The Kansas City Public Library respectfully requests \$50,000 in matching CARES Act funds from Jackson County, MO to support the purchase of 15 additional laptops for its device lending program that will serve patrons and community partners needing such resources for telehealth or education purposes plus the annual fees and scholarships required to provide free access to Career Online High School for qualified students.

The Kansas City Public Library's Technology for Health & Education Lending Program (TechHELP) will grant community members access to technology for the purposes of telehealth and education. Since the pandemic began affecting our community in March 2020, the Kansas City Public Library has received numerous inquiries from patrons and community partners about how to access important technology and digital resources.

KCPL has been able to accommodate a few requests from community partners including, for example, Hope Faith Ministries. They borrowed three laptops, a mobile hotspot, and other peripherals to offer telehealth appointments for their clients, primarily individuals experiencing homelessness. The library's limited resources, through this arrangement, have enabled Hope Faith's continued service to KCMO's most vulnerable populations during a pandemic.

The goal for KCPL's Health & Education Lending Project is to accommodate more such requests from community partners and patrons, especially as the need for technology and internet access remains a priority. The need for TechHELP has already been demonstrated through conversations with established community partners as they struggle to serve individuals who have few, if any, other options for connectivity. One existing such partnership is with KC Degrees, an initiative managed by Mid America Regional Council that provides support for adults earning a degree or trade certification. As KCPL staff surveyed existing partners regarding community need and interest in preparation for this project proposal, KC Degrees' director, Cedric Deadmon, stated the following.

Tech Access Health & Education Lending Program

"There are many equity gaps around access to technology; magnified by COVID-19. We field several requests monthly from adults who lack access to technology or simply cannot afford the monthly cost. Most referrals are sent to Connecting for Good but there is still a financial investment involved. Higher education partners are providing some technology access, too for currently enrolled students. Adding another resource like the one in your proposed project, would be of great benefit to adult learners throughout the region."

Additional established partnerships include six low-income housing complexes managed by a long-time community partner agency, Phoenix Family Services. Three of these five sites are exclusive to over 120 senior citizens each, most of whom have now been quarantined to their apartments for over three months. Providing a collection of internet-connected devices for residents to safely access telehealth services, from the safety of their homes, in addition to other healthcare resources such as a patient portal hosted by their physicians would fill a great need.

Three other Phoenix Family Services housing complexes regularly served by KCPL are home to diverse populations that include a mixture of senior citizens, families, immigrants, and refugees. At our pre-pandemic drop-in services sessions at these locations, KCPL staff and volunteers have assisted residents with the pursuit of or engagement with higher education, especially community college or professional certification programs. We therefore understand there are in fact students in residence at these low-income housing sites that would benefit from KCPL's Health & Education Lending Program. Lending a collection of internet-connected devices to community partners such as Phoenix Family, KC Degrees, and others, enables students to stay on track to earn their degrees as most instruction moves to exclusively virtual platforms.

In addition to the described priorities of Tech Health & Education Lending Program, KCPL's Strategic Initiatives team will designate a portion of Jackson County, MO support to K-12

education by continuing to provide a unique opportunity for marginalized populations to pursue their high school diploma through Career Online High School (COHS.) In partnership with Mid Continent Public Library and Literacy KC, KCPL awards scholarships for the COHS program to up to 50 students per year so that cost is not a barrier to this important milestone in life. COHS is especially valuable to students for whom the traditional high school experience was not successful. COHS students are able to work at their own pace, via a completely online platform, to complete a career-focused high school program that not only results in an accredited diploma, but also integrates real-life applicable concepts to give them an advantage within the career path they have selected.

Please find attached an outlined proposal of a collaboration between Jackson County and Children's Mercy to provide COVID-19 testing for the children of Jackson County. As children are returning to school, it is more important than ever to ensure we have adequate COVID-19 testing available for our children to limit their exposure to the virus as well as to achieve an accurate assessment of the rate of spread among them. The true incidence of infection in children is not known due to a prioritization of testing for adults and those with severe illness, but we know the number of cases in children has been rising steadily since March.

Our goal is to maximize the amount of COVID-19 testing available for children in Jackson County to ensure sufficient testing resources are in place to test all symptomatic children in a timely fashion with highly sensitive and specific tests. We seek to make available multiple testing platforms, including less invasive testing where validation can be performed. A percentage of testing would also be provided for asymptomatic children with the least invasive method possible to aid with population sampling.

Through this collaboration, we expect to perform internal validation of noninvasive testing methods at Children's Mercy and to increase the lab capacity to perform numerous types of COVID-19 tests. We also intend to increase the capacity for Children's Mercy to do drive-thru testing in Jackson County and to provide community pediatricians with testing supplies and courier service to transfer their tests to Children's Mercy for lab analysis. In addition, we would pursue opportunities to collaborate with Jackson County school districts for on-site testing and school nurse resources.

We stand ready at Children's Mercy during this pandemic to be a community resource as needed, and we appreciate your consideration of this proposal, Please let us know anything we can do to further the efforts to move forward with this collaboration.

#### 3. Goal:

- a. Maximize the amount of COVID-19 testing available for children in Jackson County
  - Ensure that sufficient testing resources are available to test every symptomatic child in Jackson County and the results of the tests are provided in a timely fashion using highly sensitive and specific tests.
    - Testing can currently be performed using NP swabs and mid turbinate swabs (halfway into the nose). This is performed by trained health care providers and requires PPE. Less invasive testing has recently been released that may be more kid-friendly but local internal validation needs to be performed. These can be done by child and parent or school nurse requiring less PPE.

- b. Home or self-administered swab in anterior nare (just in the tip of the nose)
- Because of the current status of COVID-19 in our community, nation and world, there are significant demands for materials for tests, including swabs and test reagents. Having the availability of multiple COVID-19 testing platforms helps increase the likelihood of maintaining supplies as the need increases.
- Provide a percentage of testing for asymptomatic children for the least invasive method possible while ensuring accurate results to aid with population sampling.

#### 4. Desired Results

- a. Perform internal validation on noninvasive testing methods at Children's Mercy with our local population.
- b. Increase (maximize) the lab capacity of Children's Mercy Hospital to perform numerous types of COVID-19 tests, hopefully including noninvasive testing.
  - i. Currently we have capacity to perform 1500 tests per week with a 24 hour turnaround time. To increase capacity, we would like to run 2500-3000 tests per week. This includes all platforms of COVID-19 testing which will hopefully include less invasive methods if the internal validation provides adequate sensitivity and specificity. Increasing the capacity to run 2500-3000 tests per week with various testing platforms will allow the flexibility to shift testing between platforms based on which testing reagents are readily available in the fall/winter. needed to obtain limited supplies.
- c. Increase the capacity of Children's Mercy to conduct drive-thru testing within Jackson County
  - Currently Children's Mercy East Urgent Care center located at I-70 and Little Blue Parkway in Blue Springs is holding a drive thru clinic for 4-6 hours a day M-F testing 10-15 children per day. We would like to increase the hours available to provide more testing.
- d. Provide community pediatricians in Jackson County who would like to test within their offices, testing supplies and courier to run their tests at CMH. This would ensure local offices can have a faster turn around time than sending them out to private labs in other states.
- e. Explore the possibility of funding a collaborative testing program involving the school districts of Jackson County (details to be agreed to at a later date)
  - i. On-site testing (provided by school personnel/nurses) for both symptomatic and some voluntary sampling of asymptomatic children.



All recipients are subject to the specific requirements governing the development, reporting, and disposition of rights to inventions and patents resulting from financial assistance awards are in 37 C.F.R. Part 401 and the standard patent rights clause in 37 C.F.R. § 401.14.

#### Article XXII - Procurement of Recovered Materials

All subrecipients must comply with section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 C.F.R. Part 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition.

### Article XXIII - Contract Provisions for Non-federal Entity Contracts under Federal Awards

In addition to other provisions required by the Federal agency or non-Federal entity, all contracts made by the non-Federal entity under the Federal award must contain provisions covering the following, as applicable.

- Contracts for more than the simplified acquisition threshold currently set at \$150,000, which is the inflation adjusted amount determined by the Civilian Agency Acquisition Council and the Defense Acquisition Regulations Council (Councils) as authorized by 41 U.S.C. 1908, must address administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where contractors violate or breach contract terms, and provide for such sanctions and penalties as appropriate.

- 3. Equal Employment Opportunity. Except as otherwise provided under 41 CFR Part 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 CFR Part 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 CFR 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 CFR Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor."
- 4. Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C 3141-3148). When required by Federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federal Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contracts must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the

Federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3, "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States"). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.

- 5. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C 3704 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Under 40 U.S.C. 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchase of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.
- 6. Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement. If the Federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 CFR 401.2(a) and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency.
- 7. Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q.) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387), as amended- Contract and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the non-Federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

#### Article XXIV - SAFECOM

All subrecipients who receive awards made under programs that provide emergency communication equipment and its related activities must comply with the SAFECOM Guidance for Emergency Communication Grants, including provisions on technical standards that ensure and enhance interoperable communications.

#### Article XXV - Terrorist Financing E.O. 13224

All subrecipients must comply with U.S. Executive Order 13224 and U.S. law that prohibit transactions with, and the provisions of resources and support to, individuals and organizations associated with terrorism. #### Article XXIX - USA Patriot Act of 2001

All subrecipients must comply with requirements of the Uniting and Strengthening America by Providing Appropriate Tools Required to Intercept and Obstruct Terrorism Act (USA PATRIOT Act), which amends 18 U.S.C. §§ 175–175c.

#### Article XXX - Use of DHS Seal, Logo and Flags

All subrecipients must obtain DHS's approval prior to using the DHS seal(s), logos, crests or reproductions of flags or likenesses of DHS agency officials, including use of the United States Coast Guard seal, logo, crests or reproductions of flags or likenesses of Coast Guard officials.

#### Article XXXI - Whistleblower Protection Act

All subrecipients must comply with the statutory requirements for whistleblower protections (if applicable) at 10 U.S.C § 2409, 41U.S.C. 4712, and 10 U.S.C. § 2324, 41 U.S.C. §§ 4304 and 4310.

### Article XXXII - SEMA Specific Acknowledgements and Assurances

All subrecipients must acknowledge and agree to comply with applicable provisions governing SEMA access to records, accounts, documents, information, facilities, and staff.

- 1. Subrecipients must cooperate with any compliance review or complaint investigation conducted by SEMA.
- Subrecipients must give SEMA access to and the right to examine and copy records, accounts, and other
  documents and sources of information related to the grant and permit access to facilities, personnel, and
  other individuals and information as may be necessary, as required by SEMA regulations and other
  applicable laws or program guidance.

- Subrecipients must submit timely, complete, and accurate reports to the appropriate SEMA officials and maintain appropriate backup documentation to support the reports. Future awards and fund drawdowns may be withheld if these reports are delinquent.
- 4. Subrecipients must comply with all other special reporting, data collection, and evaluation requirements, as prescribed by law or detailed in program guidance.
- 5. If, during the past three years, the recipient has been accused of discrimination on the grounds of race, color, national origin (including limited English proficiency), sex, age, disability, religion, or familial status, the recipient must provide a list of all such proceedings, pending or completed, including outcome and copies of settlement agreements to the SEMA.
- 6. In the event any court or administrative agency makes a finding of discrimination on grounds of race, color, national origin (including limited English proficiency), sex, age, disability, religion, or familial status against the recipient, or the recipient settles a case or matter alleging such discrimination, recipients must forward a copy of the complaint and findings to the SEMA Component and/or awarding office. The United States has the right to seek judicial enforcement of these obligations.

### Article XXXIII- Disposition of Equipment Acquired Under the Federal Award

When original or replacement equipment acquired under this award by the recipient or its sub-recipients is no longer needed for the original project or program or for other activities currently or previously supported by SEMA, you must request instructions from SEMA to make proper disposition of the equipment pursuant to 2 C.F.R. §200.313.

### Article XXXIV - Prior Approval for Modification of Approved Budget

Before making any change to the SEMA approved budget for this award, you must request prior written approval from SEMA by requesting a Subaward Adjustment.

### Article XXXV - Incorporation by Reference of Notice of Funding Opportunity

The Notice of Funding Opportunity for this program is hereby incorporated into your award agreement by reference. By accepting this award, the sub-recipient agrees that all allocations and use of funds under this grant will be in accordance with the requirements contained under the 2020 Notice of Funding Opportunity and the Missouri 2020 EMPG Program Manual.

## Article XXXVI - Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging while Driving

All subrecipients are encouraged to adopt and enforce policies that ban text messaging while driving as described in E.O. 13513, including conducting initiatives described in Section 3(a) of the Order when on official government business or when performing any work for or on behalf of the federal government.

### Article XXXVII – National Environmental Policy Act

All subrecipients must comply with the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) Regulations for Implementing the Procedural Provisions of NEPA, which requires recipients to use all practicable means within their authority, and consistent with other essential considerations of national policy, to create and maintain conditions under which people and nature can exist in productive harmony and fulfill the social, economic, and other needs of present and future generations of Americans.

### Article XXXVIII – Nondiscrimination in Matters Pertaining to Faith-Based Organizations

Sub-recipients are encouraged to submit Claim Requests throughout the quarter to allow for more up-to-date tracking of grant progress and prevent reimbursement delays.

Status Reports and Claim Requests for each billing period are due to SEMA as follows:

- a. Quarter 1 (January 1 to March 31) and Quarter 2 (April 1 to June 30): Due July 15, 2020
- b. Quarter 3 (July 1 to September 30): Due October 15, 2020
- c. Quarter 4 (October 1 to December 31): Due January 15, 2021
- d. Quarter 5 (January 1 to March 31): Due April 15, 2021
- e. Quarter 6 (April 1 to June 30): Due July 31, 2021
- Subrecipients must maintain an annual Training and Exercise Plan (TEP) and participate in Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) updates.

\*EMPG funded exercise officers and management personnel involved in the design and evaluation of exercises must complete L-146 HSEEP within 24 months of hire and record proof of completion.

**AN ORDINANCE** appropriating \$800,000.00 from the undesignated fund balance of the 2020 CARES Act Fund to allow for allocation to food banks and other food providers in Jackson County to insure that food insecurity is minimized in the wake of the full economic impact of the ongoing Coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic and authorizing the County Executive to execute cooperative agreements with the Community Services League of Independence, MO, and One Good Meal of Lee's Summit, MO, at an aggregate cost to the County in the amount of \$170,000.00.

**ORDINANCE NO. 5420, October 5, 2020** 

INTRODUCED BY Theresa Cass Galvin, County Legislator

WHEREAS, U.S. President Donald J. Trump, Missouri Governor Mike Parson, and County Executive Frank White, Jr., have all declared, in one form or another, the ongoing Coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic to be a public health emergency; and,

WHEREAS, the County, through its various efforts, plays a significant role in the public health of its citizens and employees; and,

WHEREAS, an appropriate response by the County to this emergency will require significant expenditures from the County CARES Act Fund, which consists of monies provided by the U.S. Treasury for this purpose; and,

WHEREAS, by Ordinance 5371 dated June 22, 2020, the Legislature authorized a contract in the amount of \$500,000.00 with Harvesters- The Community Food Network of Kansas City, MO, to begin the process of ensuring that food insecurity is minimized in the

wake of the full economic impact in connection with the fight against the ongoing Coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, this Ordinance will provide \$100,000.00 to the Community Services League of Independence, MO, and \$70,000.00 to One Good Meal of Lee's Summit, MO to further address food insecurity in the County brought on by the economic recession triggered by COVID-19 pandemic; and;

WHEREAS, the Country Administration will solicit and receive proposals from other outside agencies to further address food insecurity issues with the remainder of the appropriated funds; now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the County Legislature of Jackson County, Missouri, that the following appropriation be and hereby is made:

Subject: CSL Food Needs

Thank you Jeanie for reaching out. As we talked about I oversee Blue Springs, Oak Grove, Buckner and Grain Valley offices. We also have Noland, Hawthorne, Fairmout, Farview and 29<sup>th</sup> Street locations in Independence. We are now 6 months into this pandemic and we have done a great job of leveraging our partnership with Harvesters to obtain free food through the TEFAP program however most of our offices also rely on community donations. All of our offices lost huge food drives like Stamp Out Hunger through the Postal Service and Harvesters, Boy Scout drives, School driven drives etc. Blue Springs Community Unity Week netted over 64K items a year and that helped all of our offices. We will not obtain any of that. We have received some funding through a few grants but when you are talking about sustaining this level of food insecurity it is daunting to keep up.

My East offices alone served over 600 families last month. Noland alone serves 650-700 families every other week during a food distribution day. If you say they are all a family of 4 (which is low) then do the math, thousands of folks have been affected by this pandemic by loss of a job, a parent having to stay home for the kids etc. Some folks have not even gotten their first round of unemployment and many other reasons. We have never seen these numbers. Additionally we have been the one consistent agency that has remained open the entire pandemic. So many have closed.

Most of the funding my offices receive are CDBG funding through the City. Oak Grove received some funding as well but it is all for direct assistance such as rent and utility payments. Of course this is a very appreciated and needed fund and we are helping so many folks. Through United Way we receive EFSP funding and that too is for direct assistance. There is a small portion that is used for food purchases throughout the organization so it does not go far.

You asked me an amount that would get us through the end of the year and I am not sure how to answer that. We are getting very low in all offices from our community donations which is a supplement to the Harvesters food we provide. If we just gave Harvesters our clients would be back every week because it is not enough. We also could purchase more food through Harvesters at a much lower rate than a grocery store, even though they give us all the discounts they can. I would say organizational wide we would need \$50000.0 or more to keep this pace up. We try to give each family enough to get by for several weeks.

Also keep in mind we are working with Harvesters with the Farm to Family initiative and having that helps but it is fresh food and we have to get rid of it quickly due to storage space and spoilage. It is a wonderful additional to have fresh fruit and veggies and dairy products but we can only get limited amounts.

I hope this gives you some direction and we so appreciate anything you could do. We are committed to keeping our families fed here in Eastern Jackson County and taking that one worry off the plate. So many folks are struggling right now and we don't see this changing for a while.

Many thanks my friend. Let me know if you need anything else. Also Lynn Rose is our Senior Vice President and she is an excellent source regarding our funding.

On behalf of One Good Meal, I respectfully request an additional investment of \$70,000 from the Jackson County legislature in support of our work to feed and provide informal health checks for vulnerable seniors and other home-bound persons in Jackson County.

We are incredibly grateful for the steadfast support of the Jackson County Legislature. We respect that you are investing the public support dollars on behalf of our citizens and that you must be good and careful stewards on their behalf. I am pleased to remind you that One Good Meal has no paid staff and little administrative overhead. We even operate out of donated space to eliminate overhead costs of rent and utilities. Almost 89% of our annual budget is for the direct actual cost of food and delivery containers.

One Good Meal is facing a critical challenge. Tragically, our clients are those most at risk in the COVID-19 pandemic. Seniors and persons with underlying health conditions are warned to remain home and avoid public spaces. In response, referrals to One Good Meal from our community partners have substantially increased. With the coming winter months and difficulties faced in simply getting out in snow, ice and cold, we anticipate even greater need.

In the months of January-March of 2020, we served approximately 132 people per day, 5 days a week. To date, we have seen increased need of approximately 8 persons per day and based on historic trends, anticipate another 10-12 over the coming winter months. We have also had a reduction in volunteers due to Covid 19 which has greatly increased our transportation costs

This request is based on our anticipated funding gap of almost \$86,000 (direct cost of meals), offset by pending requests of \$17,500 from the Health Forward Foundation and \$7,000 from the Greater Lee's Summit Health Foundation. Those requests are not guaranteed but are hoped for. One Good Meal uses every cent of the grants awarded to pay for food – any other expenses come from fundraisers and client payments.
