

C.O.I.P Presents Saturday, July 25, 2015 Bernard Kerik, Former New York Police Commissioner



Keynote Speaker

Mr. Kerik was well-known for leading the heroic New York Police Department's response to the September 11, 2001 terrorist attack. He rose to national prominence; at the same time being considered for Director of Homeland Security in 2004. Mr. Kerik was sentenced to four years in prison for felony charges, including tax fraud and lying to White House officials. While admitting his guilt, he shared this statement: "I make no excuses," I take full responsibility for the grave mistakes I've made. Believe me, when I say I have learned from this and I will become and will continue to become a better person. Please, allow me the opportunity to return to my family."

He was released in 2013 after serving three years of a four year sentence. In recent months, Mr. Kerik has devoted his time to promoting his book "From Jailer to Jailed . . .My Journey from Correction and Police Commissioner to Inmate # 84888054". Kerik also works with the American Coalition for Criminal Justice, an advocacy group.

Mission Statement:

The purpose of the COIP program is to promote and encourage cooperation among health services, human services, and community services to create a healthy environment for children of incarcerated parents. The organization's mission is to be a support system for children of incarcerated parents by modeling healthy family interaction. The program's goal is to reduce the rate of recidivism for the incarcerated parents and to aid in the process of family reintegration. To accomplish these ends, COIP will provide services such as anger/grief counseling, domestic violence counseling, individual/group counseling, peer-to-peer groups, life skills, parenting classes, clothing and shoe vouchers (school uniforms, Christmas, or emergencies), drug/alcohol counseling, transportation to visit parents, etc.

BILL OF RIGHTS FOR CHILDREN OF INCARCERATED PARENTS THE VOICES OF THE CHILDREN

- 1. I have the right to be kept safe and informed at the time of my parents' arrest.
- 2. I have the right to be heard when decisions are made about me.
- 3. I have the right to be considered when decisions are made about my parents.
- 4. I have the right to be well-cared for in my parents' absence.
- 5. I have the right to speak with, see, and touch my parents.
- 6. I have the right to support as I face my parents' incarceration.
- 7. I have the right not to be judged, blamed, or labeled because of my parents' incarceration.
- 8. I have the right to a lifelong relationship with my parents.

STATISTICS

- l. according to sentencingproject.org, nearly 10 million children nationwide have a parent who is or has been under some form of criminal-justice supervision. In 2007 alone, 1.7 million children, half of who were younger the age of 10, had a parent in prison.
- 2. Most law-enforcement agencies lack training and protocols on how and where to place children when a parent is arrested and incarcerated.
- 3. Women offenders and children: Approximately 7 in 10 women under correctional sanction have minor children, more than 1,300.00.
- 4. 10% of incarcerated mothers have a child in foster home or other state care.
- 5. 11% of children in foster care have a mother who was incarcerated for at least some period of time while her children were in foster care.
- 6. 85% of the children of an incarcerated mother were placed in foster care prior to the mother's incarceration. The average stay in foster care for a child with an incarcerated mother is 3.9 years.
- 7. Children of incarcerated mothers are 4 times more likely to be still in foster care than other children. They are more likely to age out of the foster care system and less likely to reunify with their parents. They are more likely getting adopted and enter into subsidized guardianship. The are less likely to go into independent living on leave through some other means.
- 8, Reunification is 21% for children of incarcerated mothers versus 4% for all children. Adoption is 37% for children of incarcerated mothers versus 27% for all children.

TYPICAL EFFECTS ON CHILDREN AND OTHER FAMILY MEMBERS WHO ARE LEFT BEHIND WHEN A PARENT IS INCARCERATED

- 1. More likely than other children to be incarcerated as adults.
- 2. Financial instability/hardship.
- 3. Instability in family relationships and structure/higher residential mobility.
- 4. More likely to display behavioral problems at school.
- 5. More like to achieve lower academic performance.
- 6. More like to feel the social/institutional stigma of shame.
- 7. There is evidence that maintaining contact with one's incarcerated parents improves a child's emotional response to the incarceration and supports parents-child attachment.

There are no studies on how many children have been murdered or died from a car accident or medical diseases while a parent has been incarcerated. Likewise, there are no studies on how many parents who are left behind have died from cancer, heart and liver diseases, etc., while the other parent was incarcerated.


