#### **Teens in Action**

Camp Fire believes teen service and leadership are vital to building healthy communities and a better world. Teens in Action guides teens through impactful community service and leadership experiences providing a variety of opportunities to help teens develop as effective and engaged citizens *now*.

Teens in Action is youth-led and youth-driven, guided by highly trained adult role models, who encourage young people to be all they can be. Through our service-learning framework, teens learn to identify community needs, decide what issues they want to advocate for, then take action to make a difference in their schools and communities.

#### **Thrive**

Thrive is a theory of change that helps youth envision and work towards their full potential by developing and accomplishing goals. Thrive has four stages:

- 1. Identifying sparks- the thing they are truly passionate about
- 2. Developing a "can do" or growth mindset
- 3. Self-reflection about indicators of thriving and risk factors in the way
- 4. Learning to set and achieve goals using GPS (Goal selection, Pursuit of strategies, and Shifting gears in the face of challenge).
