The Hickman Mills C-1 Schools District would like to ask COMBAT for financial support in the amount of \$12,000 for a pilot program in three of our schools: Freda Markley, Ervin Early Learning Center, and Smith-Hale Middle School to participate in Trauma Sensitive training. This training will be conducted by Truman Medical Center staff to address the increasing emotional and mental needs of our students.

District administration, and the three building principals are committed to the effort of fully engaging in the learning process to implement trauma sensitive strategies within the Hickman Mills C-1 Schools District. The Superintendent has publicly voiced his support of infusing trauma sensitive strategies in the manner in which we serve children and families to foster an environment in which staff are prepared to effectively meet the needs of our students suffering from trauma. Most importantly, as a result future professional development in the area of trauma sensitive strategies, staff will train students to self-regulate so they are able to be successful at home and school.

As a result of receiving the funds from COMBAT, the Hickman Mills C-1 Schools District will send three teams to the Trauma Sensitive Summit offered through Truman Medical Center. As a result of participating in the upcoming summit, those three teams will implement trauma sensitive strategies in each building beginning the 2016-17 school year. The team members will work collaboratively with the building principal to plan, implement and train building staff to effectively implement the planned trauma sensitive strategies and become Trauma Informed Schools.

The 2016-17 school year and beyond in the Hickman Mills C-1 Schools District will foster a long-range plan to ultimately establish teams in every building in the district. District administration will work to ensure there are long lasting impacts of the funding offered by COMBAT. We will utilize a train the trainer framework to infuse trauma sensitive strategies district wide in which the three original teams will train and mentor other teams until all buildings have been trained.
