During 2014, as part of the Anti-Violence Special Initiative COMBAT began working with Law Enforcement departments throughout Jackson County to identify Violent Crime Hotspots; eighteen (18) such hotspots of relative intensity were identified in the County. In 2015 COMBAT Administration decided to attempt Targeted Neighborhood Initiatives in the top three areas. The South Kansas City/Ruskin area was the top Hotspot. Over the course of the last year COMBAT has assembled meetings with representatives of ten neighborhoods; the Kanas City Police Department, the superintendent and other administrators for the Hickman Mills School District, officials from Jackson County Family Court, faith based representatives, officials from the Kansas City Codes department, COMBAT agencies that could be expanded into the area. Our planning was informed by the following assumptions that were developed along the way:

Assumptions

- 1. <u>Youth need COMBAT services in in South KC, a Violent Crime Hotspot identified in 2015, an area with few accessible youth services and few COMBAT services.</u>
- 2. Youth in SKC are responsible for an inordinate amount of violent crime
- 3. These youth (and others) can benefit from Mental Health/Substance Abuse screening and follow up services.
- 4. Youth who are screened, even if no SA/MH services are indicated, can benefit from Case Management and other services.
- 5. <u>These services would best be served by Youth Development services that are in accessible locations.</u>
- 6. <u>A Coordinator will be necessary to: develop a location, coordinate services and activities; seek services for youth at this location and elsewhere; market; fund-raising.</u>
 - After the result of yearlong meetings, a Temporary location has been secured at Bethel Family Worship Center, near Ruskin High School, for what is being called Hope Center services.
 - The existing Hickman Mills Prevention Coalition is willing to serve as the fiscal manager for this project.

Youth considered for services:

Tier 1

High Risk —e.g., gang involved, have been identified by KCPD as involved in violent crime, Family Court has opened a case file and is supervising diversion;

Tier 2

At Risk — e.g., at risk for long term suspension by Hickman Mills School District; identified by KCPD as potentially involved in crime and "associates" of those committing crime but no current case by Family Court. Those <u>needing Intervention services because of SA/MH needs, or</u> referrals for behavioral issues

Tier 3

All Kids who need General Prevention; those who need supervised activities during non-school hours.

Conclusion:

- NO SERVICES FOR Tier 1 AT THE CENTER
- ALL CENTER SERVICES AVAILABLE TO REFERRALS FROM Tier 1 & Tier 2

Number to be served- currently KCPD has identified 85 and HMSD has 150 that would be eligible. These would probably be considered Tier 2.

More specifics on those referred from KCPD?—May have been identified by a call to the home by parents; may have been apprehended shoplifting, but not arrested and Family Court did not decide the child and family need services.

<u>More specifics those referred from Hickman Mills School District</u>—suspended for more than 5 days and those at risk for long term suspension

Needs – Assessments; considerations of need for Substance Abuse/Mental Health services; a variety of activities and programs in which they can participate

Gender Considerations – Services for Male and Female (both gender specific & gender mixed)
Age Considerations – eventually, activities/services for 10 to 24 (youth/young adults)

Hickman Mills Prevention Coalition – Can serve as Fiscal manager
