General:

- 1. The Subrecipient assures that it shall comply, and all its sub-contractors shall comply, with the applicable provisions of the "JAG Solicitation", the "DPS Financial and Administrative Guidelines", the "DPS Subrecipient Travel Guidelines", any applicable federal nondiscrimination requirements, which may include the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. § 3789d); the Victims of Crime Act (42 U.S.C. § 10604(e)); the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 2002 (42 U.S.C. § 5672(b)); the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (42 U.S.C. 13925(b)(13)); the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d); the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. § 794); the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. §§ 12131-34); the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. §§ 1681, 1683, 1685-86); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 U.S.C. §§ 6101-07); 28 C.F.R. pt. 31 (U.S. Department of Justice Regulations OJJDP Grant Programs); 28 C.F.R. pt. 42 (U.S. Department of Justice Regulations Nondiscrimination; Equal Employment Opportunity; Policies and Procedures); Ex. Order 13279 (equal protection of the laws for faith-based and community organizations); and 28 C.F.R. pt. 38 (U.S. Department of Justice Regulations Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations), and other applicable federal and state laws, orders, circulars, or regulations.
- 2. <u>Compliance Training</u>: As a recipient of grant funds, the Subrecipient is required to attend the Compliance Training hosted by the Missouri Department of Public Safety. The Compliance Training may be hosted inperson or as a webinar to provide post-award information to include, but not limited to, award acceptance, project implementation, reporting requirements, subaward changes, civil rights compliance, monitoring responsibilities, record retention, internal controls, and accounting responsibilities
- Non-Supplanting: The Subrecipient assures that federal funds made available under this subaward will not be
 used to supplant other federal, state, or local funds but will be used to increase the amount of funds that would,
 in the absence of these funds, be made available for the activities of this project.
- 4. <u>Change in Personnel</u>: The Subrecipient agrees to notify, within a timely manner, the Missouri Department of Public Safety if there is a change in or temporary absence as it affects the 'My Profile' module, 'Contact Information' form, and/or 'Budget' form within WebGrants. The notification shall be sent through the 'Correspondence' component of WebGrants to the appropriate Internal Contact with the *Change of Information* form attached.
- 5. <u>Subaward Adjustments:</u> The Subrecipient understands that any deviation from the approved subaward must have prior approval from the Missouri Department of Public Safety. No additional funding shall be awarded to a Subrecipient but changes from one budget line to another budget line may be possible if the request is allowable and within the scope of the guidelines. Prior approval must be requested via the 'Subaward Adjustment' component of WebGrants.
- 6. Monitoring: The Subrecipient agrees to maintain the records necessary to evaluate the effectiveness of the project. In addition, the Subrecipient assures that all documentation or records relating to this subaward shall be made available to monitoring representatives of the Missouri Department of Public Safety, Office of the Director, immediately upon request. The Subrecipient assures that fund accounting, auditing, monitoring, and such evaluation procedures as may be necessary to keep such records as the Missouri Department of Public Safety, Office of the Director, shall prescribe, will be provided to assure fiscal control, proper management, and efficient disbursement of funds received under this subaward.

7. Criminal Activity: The Subrecipient assures to formally report to the Missouri Department of Public Safety within 48 hours of notification that a Missouri Department of Public Safety grant-funded individual is arrested for or formally charged with a misdemeanor or felony regardless if the criminal offense is related to the individual's employment. The Missouri Department of Public Safety reserves the right to suspend or terminate grant funding pending the adjudication of the criminal offense.

The Subrecipient shall not make false statements or claims in connection with any Office of Justice Programs or DPS state-funded grant. The result of such false statements or claims includes fines, imprisonment, and debarment from participating in state and federal grants or contracts, and/or other remedy by law. The Subrecipient must promptly refer to the Department of Justice, Office of Inspector General and the Missouri Department of Public Safety any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subcontractor, or other person has either:

- a. Submitted a false claim for grant funds under the False Claims Act or
- b. Committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving grant funds

8. Non-Disclosure Agreements: The Subrecipient understands it cannot require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information.

The foregoing is not intended, and shall not be understood by the Subrecipient, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department of agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

In accepting this subaward, the Subrecipient:

- Represents that it neither requires nor has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements
 from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to
 prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above;
 and
- b. Certifies that, if it learns or is notified that it is or has been requiring its employees or contractors to exercise agreements or statements that prohibit or otherwise restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict), reporting of waste, fraud, or abuse as described above, it will immediately stop any further obligations of award funds, will provide prompt written notification to the Missouri Department of public Safety, and will resume (or permit resumption of) such obligations only if expressly authorized to do so by the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

 Lobbying: The Subrecipient understands and agrees that it cannot use any federal funds, either directly or indirectly, in support of the enactment, repeal, modification or adoption of any law, regulation or policy, at any level of government,

Applicants for DPS awards with total costs expected to exceed \$100,000 are required to certify that (1) they have not made, and will not make, such a prohibited payment, (2) they will be responsible for reporting the use of non-appropriated funds for such purposes, and (3) they will include these requirements in consortium agreements and contracts under grants that will exceed \$100,000 and obtain necessary certifications from those consortium participants and contractors.

- 11. Employment of Unauthorized Aliens: Pursuant to Section 285.530.1 RSMo, the Subrecipient assures that it does not knowingly employ, hire for employment, or continue to employ an unauthorized alien to perform work within the State of Missouri, and shall affirm, by sworn affidavit and provision of documentation, its enrollment and participation in a federal work authorization program with respect to the employees working in connection with the contracted services. Further, the Subrecipient shall sign an affidavit affirming that it does not knowingly employ any person who is an unauthorized alien in connection with the contracted services.

In accordance with <u>Sections 285.525 to 285.550</u>, <u>RSMo</u> a general contractor or subcontractor of any tier shall not be liable when such contractor or subcontractor contracts with its direct subcontractor who violates subsection 1 of Section 285.530, RSMo if the contract binding the contractor and subcontractor affirmatively states that the direct subcontractor is not knowingly in violation of subsection 1 of Section 285.530, RSMo and shall not henceforth be in such violation and the contractor or subcontractor receives a sworn affidavit under the penalty of perjury attesting to the fact that the direct subcontractor's employees are lawfully present in the United States.

- 12. <u>Relationship</u>: The Subrecipient agrees that they will represent themselves to be an independent Subrecipient offering such services to the general public and shall not represent themselves or their employees to be employees of the Missouri Department of Public Safety or the Office of the Director. This provision is not applicable to the Missouri Department of Public Safety or any of its divisions or programs. Therefore, the Subrecipient shall assume all legal and financial responsibility for taxes, FICA, employee fringe benefits, workers' compensation, employee insurance, minimum wage requirements, overtime, etc.
- 13. <u>Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)</u>: The Subrecipient assures that its law enforcement agency is in full compliance with the state provisions of <u>Section 43.505 RSMo</u> relating to uniform crime reporting and will remain in full compliance for the duration of the project period.
- 14. <u>Racial Profiling</u>: The Subrecipient assures that its law enforcement agency is in full compliance with the state provisions of <u>Section 590.650 RSMo</u> relating to racial profiling and will remain in full compliance for the duration of the project period.
- 15. <u>Federal Equitable Sharing Funds</u>: The Subrecipient assures that its law enforcement agency is in compliance with the state provisions of <u>Section 513.653 RSMo</u> relating to participation in the federal forfeiture system and the reporting of proceeds received therefrom to the Missouri Department of Public Safety and the Missouri State Auditor.
- 16. <u>Custodial Interrogations</u>: The Subrecipient assures that its law enforcement agency is in full compliance with the state provisions of <u>Section 590.700 RSMo</u> relating to custodial interrogations and has adopted a written policy to record custodial interrogations of persons suspected of committing or attempting to commit the felony crimes described in subsection 2 of this section.

- 17. <u>DWI Law:</u> The Subrecipient assures that its law enforcement agency is in full compliance with <u>Section 43.544</u> <u>RSMo</u> relating to the "DWI Law" and has adopted a written policy to forward arrest information for all intoxication-related traffic offenses to the central repository as required by <u>Section 43.503 RSMo</u>. In addition, the Subrecipient assures that its county prosecuting attorney or municipal prosecutor is in full compliance with <u>Section 43.544 RSMo</u> relating to the "DWI Law" and has adopted a written policy to forward all charge information for intoxication-related traffic offenses to the central repository as required by <u>Section 43.503</u> RSMo.
- 18. <u>Texting While Driving</u>: Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," 74 Fed. Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), the Missouri Department of Public Safety encourages the Subrecipient to adopt and enforce policies banning employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this grant, and to establish workplace safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.
- 19. <u>Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988</u>: The Subrecipient assures that it will comply, and all its subcontractors will comply, with the <u>Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988</u>. The Law further requires that all individual contractors and grant recipients, regardless of dollar amount/value of the contract or grant, comply with the Law.
- 20. <u>ACORN</u>: Subrecipients understand and agree that it cannot use any federal funds, either directly or indirectly, in support of any contract or subaward to either the Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now (ACORN) or its subsidiaries, without the express prior written approval of OJP.
- 21. Civil Rights:

- Enforcing Civil Rights Laws: The Subrecipient acknowledges that all recipients of Federal financial

- 4. Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP): The Subrecipient agrees to comply with the applicable requirements of 28 C.F.R. pt 42, subpt. E., DOJ's Equal Employment Opportunity Program (EEOP) Guidelines. The Subrecipient will maintain an EEOP Utilization Report if the Subrecipient (1) is a state or local government agency or any business; and (2) has 50 or more employees; and (3) receives a single award of \$25,000 or more from the Office of Justice Programs (OJP), Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), or Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).

The Missouri Department of Public Safety will act as the liaison in all civil rights matters with DOJ's Office for Civil Rights (OCR).
- 7. <u>Unlawful Employment Practices</u>: The Subrecipient assures compliance with <u>Section 213.055 RSMo</u> in regards to non-discrimination in employment practices as it relates to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, ancestry, age, or disability.
- 8. <u>Discrimination in Public Accommodations</u>: The Subrecipient assures compliance with <u>Section 213.065</u>
 <u>RSMo</u> in regards to non-discrimination in public accommodations as it relates to accommodations, advantages, facilities, services, or privileges made available in place of public accommodations.

Financial:

- 1. <u>Fund Availability:</u> The Subrecipient understands all subawards are subject to the availability of appropriated funds and any modifications or additional requirements that may be imposed by law. MoWIN is comprised of twenty-eight (28) members. Thirteen (13) of them are JAG funded positions within the Drug Task Force and are made up from the following agencies; Kansas City, Missouri Police Department BOPC two (2) positions, Clay County Sheriff's Department five (5) positions, Platte County Sheriff's Office four (4) positions, and the Jackson County Sheriff's Office has two (2) positions. Thirteen (13) are agency funded positions from either KCPD BOPC or Clay County Sheriff's Office. The remaining two (2) positions are HIDTA funded KCPD BOPC positions through the Metro Meth Task Force.

The job responsibilities of the MoWIN Drug Task Force are divided into two categories. The first category is Interdiction, the second is Non-Interdiction. The Interdiction side has 18 committed members and the Non-Interdiction side has seven full-time and one part-time detectives.

The Interdiction side is responsible for interdicting the flow of illegal narcotics, contraband, or wanted fugitives as they attempt to travel or be sent thru the metropolitan Kansas City, Missouri area. Interdiction efforts are focused on methods of transportation such as bus, train, highway and plane. Additionally, emphasis is placed on companies and entities that ship parcels. The Interdiction Side works with the DEA, HSI, and the USPIS on a daily basis. Interdiction is responsible for preparing case files and charges for those caught smuggling or possessing narcotics.

The Non-Interdiction side is responsible for processing all field possession arrests made by the municipal officers whose parent agencies fall within the jurisdictional boundaries of Platte, Clay and Caldwell counties. The Non-Interdiction side is responsible for conducting undercover drug buys, following up on tips about drug houses, and executing search warrants on those homes identified as being involved in illegal narcotics activity.

Both the Interdiction and Non-Interdiction sides share responsibilities of community involvement, drug education and prevention efforts. Both sides are active in Veterans Court, Drug Court, community meetings. drug take-backs, drug awareness and education programs for both law enforcement officers and civilians.

BOPC-TFO A.G. has been in the interdiction unit since 2002. TFO A.G. is currently a K-9 handler within the interdiction squad and works all forms of public transit through Kansas City as well as parcel companies. TFO A.G. was responsible for forming the existing parcel squad within the Interdiction Unit. TFO A.G. traveled to the main UPS sort facility in Louisville, Kentucky with TFO B.R. and was trained on parcel interdiction. TFO A.G. was named Interdiction Detective of the Year by a national interdiction association. TFO A.G. was named K-9 Team of the Year 2013 in Narcotics Detection by The National Police Canine Association and Runner up Narcotics Detection Case of the Year 2014. TFO A.G. is POST certified and received interdiction training certification in 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015. TFO A.G. attended H.I.T.S. Canine Training in St. Louis, MO 2013. TFO A.G. attended the three week canine handler's course at Vohne Liche Kennels, Denver, IN 2006.

Det. Y.A. has been with the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department since October of 1997 since he was appointed to Regional Police Academy. He graduated in April of 1998 and was assigned to Central Patrol Division where he remained until February 2002 when he was transferred to the Narcotics and Vice Division. Since his assignment to Narcotics and Vice in 2002, he has served as an Undercover Detective with the Street Narcotics Unit, Detective in Drug Enforcement Unit, and a Detective in the Metro Meth Task Force before being transferred to the Interdiction Unit where he remains today. Det. YA is also a certified K-9 handler by NPCA. His duties will be to interdict the flow of narcotics and contraband as it flow thru the Kansas City, Missouri metropolitan area.

CCDTF-TFO A.B. began their law enforcement career in 2005. TFO A.B. completed basic training at the Missouri Western State University Law Enforcement Academy in St. Joseph, MO, where they graduated with a Class A license from the Department of Public Safety. In February of 2006 TFO A.B. was hired by the Clay County, Missouri Sheriff's Office. In February of 2008 TFO A.B. was hired by the Excelsior Spring Police Department. TFO A.B. returned to the Clay County, Missouri Sheriff's Office in April of 2013. While employed with Clay County, TFO A.B. has held positions within the Detention Division, Judicial Services and Road Patrol.

CCDTF-TFO C.J. began their law enforcement career in 2003 with the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department. Received basic training as an entrant officer in the 122nd Entrant Officer Class with the Kansas City Regional Police Academy where they graduated with a Class A license on February 6, 2004. Sqt. CJ was hired by the Clay County Sheriff's Office in 2004. Since being employed with the Sheriff's Office TFO C.J. has worked as a Deputy Sheriff, Field Training Officer, Corporal, where they supervised the Traffic Safety Unit, TFO C.J. was promoted to the rank of Detective in 2012 and worked as a general investigator until promoted to Sergeant in August of 2013 and returned to the Road Patrol.

Throughout their career, Sgt. CJ has received many specialty certifications to include, Radar/Laser Instructor, CPR/AED Instructor, and 3 Gun Firearms Instructor. To compliment this firearms instruction certificate, Sgt. CJ is a certified Glock Armorer. Sgt. CJ was also a member of the Special Tactics and Response Team for approximately 6 years and served as a ballistic shield operator. TFO C.J. held the rank as Team Leader and had the privilege of attending the National Tactical Officers Association Team Leader and SWAT Commander level courses. Sqt. CJ also holds a certificate as a certified Computer Voice Stress Analysis examiner. Sqt. CJ attended interview and interrogation training and basic criminal investigations in 2012 and crime scene training in January of 2013.

Sgt. CJ attended an 80 hour Basic Narcotics Training Course August 8 to 19, 2016 at Camp Dodge in Johnston, Iowa and attended a Supervising Narcotics Unit class September 19 to 21, 2016 in Lees Summit, Missouri.

CCDTF-TFO D.G. (Smithville PD) began his law enforcement career in February 2008 after completing Basic and Advanced Individual Training at the United States Military Police Academy at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. While serving on active duty, he remained stateside where he worked as a patrol officer, member of the special reactions team and dispatcher. Det. DG was accepted to The Military Academy at West Point. Due to a line of duty injury, he was released from Cadet Status. He remained at West Point and worked as a cadre member while awaiting a medical discharge. He was promoted to Sergeant in 2012 before receiving an honorable discharge.

In November of 2011, Det. DG obtained his Missouri Peace Officer Standards and Training certification through the Missouri Department of Public Safety. Det. DG then worked as a Lieutenant for the Cleveland Public Library Safety & Protective Services from 2012 to 2016. In February 2016, Det. DG was hired by the Smithville, Missouri police department. In May of 2017 he interviewed and to be assigned to the MoWIN Task Force. Det. DG will be assigned to the non-interdiction side of MoWIN. His responsibilities will be related to handeling narcotics activities in Clay County not related to Interdiction.

CCDTF-TFO N.C. graduated from the University of Central Missouri in December of 2006 with a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice and a minor in Psychology. Det. NC began their law enforcement career in 2007 with the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department. TFO N.C. received basic training as an entrant officer in the Kansas City Regional Police Academy and graduated with a Class A license in August 2007. TFO N.C. was hired by the Clay County Sheriff's Office in 2008. Since being employed with the Sheriff's Office, TFO N.C. has worked as a Deputy Sheriff in Detention and as a Detention Investigator. TFO N.C. was originally promoted to the rank of Detective in November of 2010 and worked as a narcotics investigator with an emphasis in conducting undercover operations.

In January of 2013, TFO N.C. was reassigned to the Detention Center as a Deputy Sheriff, as a member of the Detention Emergency Response Team until leaving the unit in June of 2014. At that time, TFO N.C. was reassigned to the Road Patrol, later becoming a Field Training Officer. TFO N.C. was temporarily assigned as a general investigator in the Clay County Investigations Unit from January of 2017 until March of 2017. After the temporary assignment, Det. NC was reassigned to narcotics investigations.

The Interdiction side is responsible for maintaining coverage of a public transit system that operates on a

twenty-four hour (24), daily schedule, 365 days a year. For officer safety issues, a minimum of four (4) detectives is required when working a transit system. Trying to accomplish this mission without overtime compensation reduces the impact of this task force and the positive effects on society that occurs when narcotics, contraband, and fugitives are taken into police custody as a direct result of the interdiction contact.

Interdiction detectives will need to work their normal tour of duty and be able to respond back to all tips provided by public transit and/or private parcel and freight investigative sources. Interdiction detectives will also need to vary the times that they arrive and depart these modes of public transit, working late nights and or weekends in an effort to disrupt or confuse those narcotics couriers that carefully plan their "transportation runs" in an effort to go undetected by law enforcement personnel. In the past, when varying times and shifts of interdiction contacts, some arrests have advised detectives that they had specifically designed their trip to arrive late at night or on a holiday or weekend believing that the police would not be working. This is a valuable tool that should not be underestimated. Without the use of overtime a large majority of the transit schedules would go unobserved.

The five (5) detectives from Clay County assigned to the Non-Interdiction Side are responsible for undercover operations and narcotics investigations which consist of, but are not limited to narcotic purchases, handling of informants, applying for, executing, and processing search warrants, and assisting other agencies with the interviewing of offenders and filing the appropriate case files for prosecution. Detectives will be on call twenty-four hours (24), 365 days a year to cover the narcotic investigation needs of all local municipalities within the Clay, Platte, Jackson, and Caldwell Counties. The detectives are varying schedules in regards to operational times in an attempt to disrupt criminal activity. The assistance the group is providing the agencies with interviews, evidence handling and charges has increased drastically over the past few years. The increase in assistance is reaching a critical stage as the day-to-day operational demands and providing personnel with time off. The personnel share on-call status and routinely take as many as 7 to 8 additional narcotic cases after their regular duty hours and on their leave days. With the continually increasing case load, the group will need additional funding to cover any overtime incurred.

Platte County Missouri is surrounded by increasing high drug crime areas such as Kansas City, Kansas to the south, Leavenworth, Kansas to the west, St. Joseph Missouri to the north and Kansas City, Missouri, which City limits cover approximately half of Platte County and border the County to the east. The cities of Kansas City, Kansas and Kansas City, Missouri have been proven to be major bulk narcotics storage locations, making large quantities of narcotics easily attainable at a reduced price. Bulk narcotics historically flow from south to north, placing Platte County, Missouri directly in the north south narcotics smuggling pipeline. The cities of Kansas City, Missouri and Kansas City, Kansas are positioned directly in the center of the United States making these locations and the surrounding areas such as Platte County very susceptible to drug crimes. Platte County Missouri is typical in that narcotics flow from south to north, but in recent years Platte County has proven to be non-typical in that Interstate 29 runs from north to south through the center of the United States and directly through Platte County. Narcotics traffickers from Oregon, Washington, Colorado and California have now discovered that by traveling east on Interstate 80 to Interstate 29 south, they can avoid the Highway Interdiction teams in the State of Kansas and ultimately successfully deliver more narcotics to the Midwest and points east.

Due to the proximity of bulk narcotics to Platte County, the flow of narcotics from south to north through Platte County and the non-typical north to south flow of narcotics through Platte County, the need for highly trained and skilled narcotics detectives is crucial to fighting this growing problem in Platte County.

Platte County narcotics detectives assigned to MoWIN's non-interdiction side are responsible for assisting Patrol deputies with these highway interdiction investigations which many times include bulk narcotics, with multiple suspects, from multiple states. These factors make conducting thorough and complete investigations very time consuming for these detectives. These cases create additional needs concerning the handling of bulk narcotics, jail space and prosecutor needs.

In addition to assisting patrol deputies, Platte Counties MoWIN detectives are responsible for supporting eleven smaller communities that are located inside the county with combating narcotics crimes. Platte County detectives also conduct undercover operations, which require the handling and supervision of confidential informants. Platte County detectives are responsible for responding to narcotics related tips provided by citizens and other law enforcement agencies in the County. Platte County is home to the Kansas City International Airport which brings an element of narcotics related crime involving high volumes of air cargo which are often used as narcotics smuggling methods. Platte County detectives are responsible for obtaining and serving Search Warrants, conducting knock and talks, appearing in court, maintaining case files and C/I files.

In addition to those task force officers whose salaries are included, the following detectives also will receive overtime.

TFO R.G. has been with Kansas City Police Department since 1994 and attended the Regional Police Academy from September 1994 until March of 1995. TFO R.G. performed the duties of a patrol officer from March of 1995 until March of 1998. During that time, served as a FTO and in a proactive squad titled PACT, From March of 1998 until February of 2002, TFO R.G. served as a motorcycle officer in the Traffic Enforcement Unit. In February of 2002 was assigned to the Street Narcotics Unit in an undercover capacity where purchases for street level narcotics were made and remained in that capacity until being reassigned to the Drug Enforcement Unit in May of 2003, TFO R.G. served the Drug Enforcement Unit by purchasing large-scale narcotics until July of 2005. In July of 2005, TFO R.G. transferred to the Intelligence Unit until being promoted to the rank of Sergeant in June of 2007. After promotion, TFO R.G. was transferred to South Patrol Division serving as a supervisor for the front line police officer and remained in that role until May of 2010 when reassigned to the South Patrol Property Crimes Unit. He remained in Property Crimes until March of 2016 when he was transferred to his current assignment with Interdiction Unit, TFO R.G. is POST certified and is scheduled to attend the INIA conference in June of 2017.

The TFO's assigned to MoWIN Interdiction from the BOPC [A.G. & Y.A. (formerly B.R.)] and One BOPC Supervisor (R.G.) are each requesting to receive 175 hours of paid overtime for the 2017-2018 JAG Grant Year. The OT funding will pay for them to stay past or respond after normal business hours to conduct Interdiction related activities. The funding will also be spent on OT expenses related to participating in education, prevention, and training efforts including the National DEA Drug Take-Back efforts twice annually. The TFO's will average approximately 3.4 hrs per week.

The TFO's assigned to MoWIN Interdiction from JACO (D.A. & R.P) are requesting to receive 175 hours of paid overtime each for the 2017-2018 JAG Grant Year. The OT funding will pay for them to stay past or respond after normal business hours to conduct Interdiction related activities. The funding will also be spent on OT expenses related to participating in education, prevention, and training efforts including the National DEA Drug Take-Back efforts twice annually. The TFO's will average approximately 3.4 hrs per week.

Vehicle Leases

Board of Police Commissioners (BOPC)-Transportation entails the use of lease vehicles that enable the detectives to respond to as many as seven different surveillance locations on a daily basis. There are no other vehicles assigned to these detectives to operate. The (2) requested vehicles would be assigned to the (2) BOPC JAG funded taskforce officers.

Clay County Drug Task Force (CCDTF)- Clay County Deputies are requesting two (2) lease vehicles to be used in an undercover capacity. The vehicles are the detective's only form of transportation and will be used in undercover buys and day to day operations in surveillance.

Jackson County Sheriff's Office (JACO)- Transportation entails the use of (2) lease vehicles that enable the detective to respond to many different locations on a daily basis. There are no other vehicles available for the (2) detective to operate.

The task force now covers a total of 1882 square miles with over a million citizens. It is important that all the detectives are in unmarked lease vehicles that will not be recognized by suspects in the four county region.
