DaRon McGee, Chairman, called the meeting of the Jackson County Legislature to order.

1 ROLL CALL

2 THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

3 APPROVAL OF THE JOURNAL OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

A motion was made by Jeanie Lauer, seconded by Manuel Abarca IV to approve the journal of the previous meeting held on June 15, 2023. The motion passed by a voice vote.

4 HEARINGS

Representatives Dan Wehmuller, Project Coordinator and Jeff Jenkins, Project Director, from JCDC Partners LLC and JE Dunn – Axiom, gave an update on the Detention Center Project. Gail McCann Beatty, Director of Assessment, and William Birkle, from Tyler Technologies, gave an update on the assessment process. Ms. McCann Beatty said her role is to place a market value on properties in Jackson County, pursuant to state statutes. She does not set the tax rate. The tax levies are set by the taxing jurisdictions in the fall. Tax levies are set annually which is why a tax bill may vary even if the property value remains the same. Each taxing jurisdiction will have public hearings on its tax rates. Jackson County is responsible for collecting the taxes which are then distributed to the taxing jurisdictions.

Ms. McCann Beatty said that the Chapter 20 report, states:

On or before May 31 of each year, the Director of Assessment shall file with the clerk of the county legislature and the legislative auditor a report showing every real estate tax parcel classified "residential" with an increase in assessed valuation from the previous year in excess of 50% of the previous valuation or in excess of \$50,000, and every parcel classified "commercial" with an increase in assessed valuation from the previous year in excess of 50% of the previous year's valuation or in excess of \$100,000. The report need not include any parcel classified "agricultural" or assessed by the Missouri State Tax Commission as railroad or utility property.

This is required by Jackson County Code to be sent to the County Clerk on May 31. State law changed after this code section was adopted, requiring values to be certified by July 1. The Assessment Department sent values as of May 31 to comply with the County Code, but those values will change as the valuation process continues through June. Once the values are certified July 1, her office will produce an updated Chapter 20 report.

Jackson County has 300,000 parcels. Jackson County is the second largest county in the state. It is impossible to get every property correct. One property may vary from another property because of upgrades and remodels. There could also be an input error. The 2020-2021 assessment process was interrupted by Covid, which caused property values to be even more behind. To date there have been 12,143 appeals which is 4% of the total parcels. In 2019 there were 22,000 appeals which account for 7.3% of the total parcels. St. Louis County is estimated to have 33,000 appeals representing 8% of its parcels. The standard is to have about 10% appeals. Jackson County is no different than any other large county. Staff are meeting with about 250 people per day to review their property. The Assessment Department is trying to accommodate more people. People who have gone through the evaluation process have stated that they are treated fairly, and the staff is polite. It takes about 10 minutes to complete an appeal online. If a taxpayer does not have access to a computer, the Assessment staff are available to help. The Board of Equalization deadline to appeal is July 10. This date is set by state statue. Taxpayers have adequate time to file an appeal. They are not required to have all

information at the time they appeal. The BOE will start hearings July 10. That is not the last day. Property owners may consult with the County's real estate brokers at no cost. Ms. McCann Beatty said she does not encourage people to spend money on an appraisal.

Jeanie Lauer, County Legislator, asked if they could schedule expanded hours. Ms. McCann Beatty said on Tuesday and Thursday the staff work until 6 p.m. Walk-ins are allowed until 5 p.m. Ms. McCann Beatty said this informal review process is part of the reassessment process. Part of this year's problems occurred because of an update to the software while also conducting a parcel by parcel review. Property owners can see the date their property was reviewed by looking at the date stamp on Parcel Viewer (https://jcgis.jacksongov.org/parcelviewer/). Every property should have a photo in the parcel viewer system. When a property owner files an appeal, staff will pull the comps used to set the value. If those comps seem off, then updated comps may be pulled from the MLS system. There is a discussion, and the staff will reach an agreement on the value. If the taxpayer is still not satisfied with the value, they can go before the BOE and the State Tax Commission (STC). The goal is to get the properties within a 10% +/- range of the fair market value.

Jalen Anderson, County Legislator, said he is requesting the Board of Equalization extend the deadline from July 10 to the end of July. He also requests that the BOE find a place to have hearings in Eastern Jackson County and for the County to help people understand the process.

Donna Peyton, County Legislator, asked what options are available to the Legislature and the County to help people. Ms. McCann Beatty said the Collection Department has a quad pay system to allow taxes to be paid in four installments. There is also a new law freezing values for certain citizens on Social Security, but that has not yet been signed by the governor. Everyone has the right to appeal their value. The tax rates will not be set until the fall when jurisdictions set the levies. The school districts receive the greatest portion of the taxes, followed by municipalities.

12 COUNTY EXECUTIVE ORDERS

23-14 Pursuant to section 706.1, Jackson County Code, 1984, I hereby promulgate the following amendment to Rule 9 of the Jackson County Personnel Rules for Jackson County associates. This amendment shall be effective immediately.

Rule 9 is amended to the revision of 9.15, to reads as follows:

Personnel Rule 9.15 - Active Duty

Associates called to active duty, active-duty training, and or inactive duty training in the National Guard or any reserve component of the armed forces of the United States shall be entitled to receive their county compensation for a period not to exceed one hundred and twenty hours in the period bound by law, October 1 through September 30, (the federal fiscal year). An associate may receive military leave only for hours that the associate would otherwise have worked and received pay.

Members of the National Guard or any reserve component of the armed forces intending to use military leave, (paid or unpaid) for periods of active duty, active-duty training or inactive duty training shall provide their orders in advance, when possible, to their Appointing Authority of any period of military leave. This verification at attendance may include applicable pay documents or other written confirmation from the associate's military unit of assignment. Any period of applicable service or training in the National Guard or reserve components of the armed forces, beyond the limit of one hundred and twenty hours per federal fiscal year will be designated as unpaid military leave.

23-15 Pursuant to chapter 82 of the Jackson County Code, I hereby make the following appointments to the Jackson County Community Children's Services Fund Board of Directors:

Monica Meeks is appointed as a District 6 member to fill the vacancy occasioned by the expiration of Justice Horn's term for a new term to expire March 31, 2026. A copy of Ms. Meek's resume is attached.

Meg McCall is appointed as a District 4 member to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Anthony Mondaine for a new term to expire March 31, 2026. A copy of Ms. McCall's resume is attached.
