Theresa Galvin, Chair, called the meeting of the Jackson County Legislature to order.

1 ROLL CALL

2 THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

3 APPROVAL OF THE JOURNAL OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

A motion was made by Dan Tarwater III, seconded by Scott Burnett to approve the journal of the previous meeting held on June 24, 2019. The motion passed by a voice vote.

4 HEARINGS

Presiding Judge David Byrn was present to give an update on the condition of the courtrooms that were damaged as a result of flooding at the courthouse in January. Judge Byrn said that while he is aware of significant repairs to the building systems located in the basement of the courthouse, repairs to the courtrooms and jury rooms have not yet happened. He expressed his frustration with the lack of progress in these areas.

Eric Winebrenner, MARC Public Safety Program Director, presented an update on the Jackson County 911 System. He distributed a report of the number of calls to 911. He said that currently 911 is funded through a fee on landlines. With the passage of Senate Bill 291, the County may have flexibility on how it funds 911. This bill is currently on the Governor's desk for signature. Because it has an emergency clause, it will take effect as soon as it is signed. This new statute requires Jackson County to put a measure on the General Election ballot by 2020 for a fee on cell phone

subscriptions for the funding of 911. Mr. Winebrenner said that the current law enacted a fee on prepaid cell phones beginning on January 1, 2019. He does not have a report from the state showing how much has been raised through this fee on prepaid cell phones. Copies of the handouts distributed by Mr. Winebrenner are available in the Clerk of the County Legislature's office.

Beth Low-Smith, Vice President for Policy with KC Healthy Kids, presented information about the KC Healthy Kids program. Ms. Low-Smith said that KC Healthy Kids addresses issues of food insecurity as it relates to food assistance programs such as SNAP, WIC, and school meal programs. She introduced poet Natasha Ria El-Scari who created one of three works of art that are on display in July at the downtown courthouse. Other works of art on display were created by Cheyenne Bands and J.T. Daniels. At this time, Crystal Williams, County Legislator, presented Resolution #20189 recognizing KC Healthy Kids on the occasion of its collaborative project, Art for KC Voices, to promote awareness of food policies in our community.

5 COMMUNICATIONS AND REPORTS OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE

Frank White, Jr., County Executive, and Ed Stoll, Chief Administrative Officer, spoke to the Legislature regarding the reassessment process. Frank White said that he ran for office to better the lives of citizens of Jackson County. He said that he understands that people are upset and angry about the reassessment. Mr. White stated that he has confidence in the assessment process and in Gail McCann Beatty, the Director of Assessment. Mr. White said that the assessment staff are committed to fair and accurate values. He said that state statutes do not allow him to raise property values incrementally. He reiterated that the Administration will follow state law. He encouraged citizens and legislators to speak with their state representatives to have laws changed related to the reassessment process. Mr. White encouraged everyone to attend Ms. Beatty's presentation to the Board of Equalization that is scheduled for July 3, 2019 at 10 a.m.

Ed Stoll said that the July 8th deadline for appeals to the BOE are set by state statute and the Administration does not have the authority to change it. Crystal Williams, County Legislator, asked about the provision in the Charter for the County Executive to correct errors in Assessment. Jay Haden, Chief Deputy County Counselor, said that he does not believe that disagreements in valuation is considered an "error." He said that an example of an error that can be corrected is if a property was listed in the wrong jurisdiction or mistakes in classification such as a residential

property classified as commercial.

Dan Tarwater III, County Legislator, said that the Administration has acknowledged that errors were made in the valuation of vacant land. He said that in 2013 errors were made and the assessor reviewed 60,000 properties and the appeal date was extended to August. Ed Stoll said that after the values are certified the Assessment Department can make changes with BOE approval.

Scott Burnett, County Legislator, said that he had reviewed the report that the Assessment Department had submitted to the County Clerk in compliance with Chapter 20 of the Jackson County Code. His review had found several parcels that had an increase but were not included in the report. Mr. Stoll said that they were aware of that problem and staff was preparing a corrected report.

Jeanie Lauer, County Legislator, said that there were over 21,000 appeals to the BOE. She asked what actions are being taken to assist with this workload. Mr. Stoll said that several appraisal firms are under contract to assist in the process. He said that he hopes the BOE will agree to accept informal appeals as BOE appeals and expects the Board to make a decision on that at its meeting on Wednesday. The Assessment Department will continue to review the informal appeals attempt to reach a stipulated agreement with taxpayers.

Mr. Stoll said that the final step in this process will be when the taxing jurisdictions set their tax levies later this year. A report of the aggregate assessed valuations was sent to the taxing jurisdictions today. The final certified aggregate assessed values will be released in September and the taxing jurisdictions will set their tax levies then which will determine each taxpayers final tax bill that is due December 31st.

Jerry Roseburrough said that he hopes the state legislature will consider a proposal to freeze tax rates for people over the age of 65 until the property is sold. He said that this is an inopportune time to raise taxes when developers are being given 25 year tax abatements.

Alan Young, a resident of the Ivanhoe Neighborhood said that he has worked to revitalize their community over the past 30 years. He said these tax increases will hurt the residents of Ivanhoe who have an average income of \$21,000.00 per year.
