Theresa Cass Galvin, Chairman, called the meeting of the Jackson County Legislature to order.

1 ROLL CALL

Jalen Anderson's absence was excused by Resolution #20541 adopted by the County Legislature on Monday, October 26, 2020.

2 THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

3 APPROVAL OF THE JOURNAL OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

A motion was made by Dan Tarwater III, seconded by Scott Burnett to approve the journal of the previous meeting held on October 12, 2020. The motion passed by a voice vote.

4 HEARINGS

Dr. Mark T. Steele, Executive Chief Clinical Officer for Truman Medical Centers and Bridgette Shaffer, Director of the Jackson County Health Department, gave an update regarding the COVID-19 pandemic. Dr. Steele said to date they have tested 58,000 people for COVID-19. They are averaging 480 tests per day and they are close to rolling out the saliva testing that will greatly expand the testing ability. At that point they will have the potential to complete 4,500 tests per day. Bridgette Shaffer said as of Friday there have been 9,323 cases in Eastern Jackson County and 117 deaths. Right now Jackson County has a 10.96% positivity rate with a 12.92% positivity for the 14-day rolling average. The Kansas City metropolitan area has had over 50,000 cases and 710 deaths. There has been an increase in hospitalizations. Currently 34% of all hospital beds are available. The Health Department has hired 64 associates. Of those, 38 are full-time staff supporting a wide range of needs from community health workers, nurses, investigators, and other staff support. The Health Department is testing five days a week and they average 123 tests per day. The State of Missouri and the National Guard will begin providing assistance for testing through the end of the year. Of the \$5.5 million allocated to the Health Department, they have spent \$1.3 million.

Theresa Cass Galvin, Chairman, asked if they are still assisting the Kansas City Health Department with contact tracing. Ms. Shaffer said they are not. They are focusing on contact tracing within Jackson County. Ms. Shaffer said long-term health facilities statistics are not split out separately because they are less than 10 percent of their total cases and would not make a significant difference in the statistics. The state transitioned to a different web-based system which is why the Health Department is currently unable to update the hospital data. But the hospitalization data is available from the Kansas City reporting software.

Jeanie Lauer, County Legislator, asked about another mask distribution in the community. Ms. Shaffer said the Ford Motor Company is undergoing a mask distribution of about 4,500 masks. Ms. Lauer also said that someone she knows tested positive and contact tracing determined the infection was from touching cash rather than exposure to a person. She said hand washing continues to be important.

Dan Tarwater III, County Legislator, asked about contact tracing. Ms. Shaffer said they are slightly behind their queue for contact tracing. The software update is causing a slight delay. Mr. Tarwater asked Dr. Steele what he sees happening in the future. Dr. Steele said the immunity piece is still an unknown. They believe approximately 10% of the population has been exposed to the virus. The death rate is going down. Death rate is a lagging indicator, but hospitalizations are up and the worry is that the death rate might increase. The highest risk of infection is indoors where people are not social distancing and wearing masks. Ms. Shaffer said they are testing symptomatic and asymptomatic people. They are seeing a higher positive rate coming back on the testing.

Ronald E. Finley, County Legislator, asked Troy Schulte, County Administrator, for a report of what has been purchased and provided through legislation. He asked how much money is available for future purchases of supplies. Mr. Finley asked about the reports that hospitals are turning away ambulances. Dr. Steele said it depends on the hospital. They have not had that problem at Truman Medical Center. St. Luke's Hospitals and KU Medical Center have been under pressure and a number of these cases are coming from rural areas.

Crystal Williams, County Legislator, said she has heard of multiple cases of people not social distancing and not wearing masks. She said she thinks there is a sense of urgency here. She also wondered if there was a specific population not taking this seriously.

Theresa Cass Galvin expressed her appreciation for the updates.

Theresa Cass Galvin opened the public hearing for Ordinance #5414. Anyone wanting to speak will be allowed three minutes.

Preston Smith from Blue Springs addressed Ordinance #5414. Mr. Smith read the following statement:

"I reviewed the RFP for this project in February and seriously considered submitting a proposal, along with former County Assessor Curtis Koons and data expert Marlene Jeffers. In fact, the three of us spent more than 200 hours compiling a bid proposal in what we believed would have been a very competitive proposal. However, when we discovered that the Jackson County-based IAAO (International Association of Assessing Officers) was going to team up with Tyler Technologies, as opposed to remaining an unbiased, not-for-profit association, we thought twice about going forward with our proposal. (I have not reviewed the winning bid documents, so I do not know if this was true in the final bid.)

The RFP that the County issued in February received more than 100 questions from bidders because the RFP was poorly written and constructed. A second RFP issued by the County later was more focused, but it contained several sentences that caused us to believe that the County had already selected the bidder they wanted. The last RFP was so narrowly written, there were few, if any, competitors nationwide to Tyler Technologies that could qualify to bid on this project.

By awarding this extremely large project based on such a narrowly written RFP, the public is not served properly and this was not a true competitive process. My firm has competed on dozens of competitive bids nationwide, so we are familiar with the RFP process for public entities. This was not a

well-thought-out RFP having clear end-products and inputs. That ultimately was the final reason that my firm did not bid on it—it was too big a risk to do business with Jackson County, and trust them to pay on time for this project, without changing the parameters of the project. Our bid was going to be around \$5M, but it is clear that Tyler Technologies had to bid so much more to account for the huge unknown level of expenses that was still in the second RFP.

I strongly believe that by awarding this bid so incredibly late in the assessment process, it is going to be extremely difficult for any bidder to successfully complete this project. It may be impossible for the bidder to complete the project with the amount bid without throwing more resources at this.

I do not believe that it is physically possible to inspect every parcel that would be receiving a 15 percent increase, under the new state law and the 2019 County Legislative ordinance, unless there are very few parcels in that category. Based on plans submitted to the State Tax Commission, Jackson County Assessment is planning for 35,000 appeals in 2021, which would be a considerably higher number than what we had in 2019.

You simply cannot have a large number of appeals without having equally large estimated tax assessment increases.

I do believe that the County Assessment department intends to ignore the state law, increase as many parcels as much as they want, and dare the citizens of the County to try to win in court against them. That has been the pattern the last year when citizens have tried to take the Assessment department to court. I would be very surprised if the Tyler Technologies bid included enough manpower to physically inspect as many parcels that will need to be inspected between now and June 2021, when the estimated tax assessments are supposedly to be mailed. This might have been able to be accomplished when they submitted the bid documents, but I doubt that is physically possible now unless they have been working for the last six months on this project already.

As a taxpayer in Jackson County, I believe this bid is going to empower an out-of-state firm to conduct our entire assessment, freeing the local assessment staff to blame them for any issues and to take no responsibility for anything. And they are going to do the assessment at a price tag that is multiple times more expensive than has ever been done before.

By the Assessment Department coming forward now for the approval of this RFP in October, they have essentially forced the Legislature and taxpayers to swallow this huge expense. To vote this down would force a completely incompetent Assessment Department to conduct the assessment. So, this is a lose-lose either way."

Ronald E. Finley asked Mr. Smith why his firm decided not to bid. Mr. Smith said they could not trust the County and there are too many loopholes in the process.

Ms. Galvin asked if there were any other public comments. There were none. *Ms.* Galvin closed the public hearing.

Dan Tarwater III asked Gail McCann Beatty, Director of Assessment, if this plan will address the data problems. Ms. Beatty said one of the requests for proposals is to bring in additional staff to clean up the data.
